Arthur Hansen, life guard at the Natatorium, rescued two girl swimmers from Rogue river near Bybee bridge yesterday when they were being swept down stream by the current. The girls' names were not learned.

Hansen said he was standing on the bank fully clothed when he noticed the two swimmers struggling in the water. He tore off his clothing, and swam to the girls. He said the maids were calm and collected. He took one by the hand, while the other placed a hand around his neck. Hansen said he swam with them about 20 feet. One of the girls fainted when ashore, but quickly responded to first aid treatment.

At the Cantrall swimming hole on the Applegate yesterday, Wilbur Stevens, Jr., 8, stepped off the bank into a deep hole, and was swept away by the current. His father, standing by, leaped into the stream and saved the boy. His mother was also nearby.

LOST COUPLE FIND CALAMITY CAMP

Charles Curtis, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Curtis of 305 Beatty street, and a girl companion whose name was not procured returned safely Saturday morning to Calamity camp on the Four-Mile road after wandering about all night, lost on Mt. McLoughlin, Rogue River national forest headquarters reported today.

The couple started to climb the mountain Friday morning and when they had not returned at 10 p. m. John Sarginson, ranger in charge of the Lake of Woods district, led a searching party of six men who scoured the mountainside throughout the night, headquarters said. The boy and girl worked their own way back to camp after dawn.

The boy was quoted as saying that Fish lake could be seen at all times but no way could be found to descend to it.

NAVY ASKS MORE MONEY FOR SHIPS

Washington, July 7.—(P)—The navy asked congress to appropriate an additional \$385,000,000 to augment its shipbuilding program. James V. Forrestal, acting secretary, said in a letter that most of the \$500,000,000 previously authorized for shipbuilding facilities has been obligated. The \$385,000,000, he said, would allow the allotment of \$300,000,000 for additional shipbuilding facilities at naval or private establishments, and \$185,000,000 for repair facilities.

PWA AID FOR AREA TALKED ON BASIS OF CANTONMENT

E. W. Oldham of Seattle, Wash., region 11 public works administration financial examiner, conferred today with the army cantonment civilian coordination board and various local officials regarding public works that might have to be enlarged or built if construction of the proposed camp is authorized and Medford is designated a defense area.

Under the \$150,000,000 appropriation recently voted by congress, designated defense areas are to be given federal financial help in expanding or increasing public works, including hospital, school, sanitation, water and similar facilities. Purpose of Mr. Oldham's conferences today was to make preparatory plans seeking such financial aid if and when Medford is designated a defense area, Frank J. Van Dyke, civilian coordinator, said.

Also in conference here today was Don Orput, field recreational representative of the federal security agency for Oregon. Mr. Oldham, who opened his conferences here with the coordination board's recreational advisory committee and a number of Ashland officials at the Hotel Medford yesterday, continued discussions today with various officials regarding the recreational problems establishment would create. He conferred also with the Jackson County Council of Defense. One of his aims was to procure coordinated effort in working out recreational plans, Mr. Van Dyke said.

CONFIRM JACKSON DESPITE TYDINGS

Washington, July 7.—(P) The senate confirmed today the nomination of Robert H. Jackson to be an associate justice of the supreme court after Senator Tydings (D-Md) had bitterly assailed the attorney general as "unfit for judicial office."

Tydings said Jackson had refused to press a criminal libel action against Drew Pearson and Robert S. Allen, Washington columnists, because of a 1939 radio broadcast. Tydings told his colleagues they "should be trying Jackson on impeachment instead of confirming him for the supreme court."

Tydings shouted that Jackson had been "reached" before directing that the proposed libel prosecution be dropped, and said the attorney general lacked "the character, integrity and judicial temperament" for the court.

Jackson declined to prosecute Pearson and Allen for accusing Tydings in 1939 of having the WPA improve Tydings' Maryland properties by building a road and a yacht basin. Jackson's confirmation came on a voice vote with Tydings shouting "no!"

101 LAW GRADUATES SLATED FOR EXAMS

Salem, July 7.—(P)—A total of 101 law school graduates who seek admission to practice law in Oregon will take the state bar examinations in the legislative chambers Tuesday and Wednesday.
