F. D. R. WILL SEEK 7 BILLION MORE IN CURRENT WEEK

Army, Navy and Lend-Lease
Program Will Share New
Appropriation, Says Early

Washington, July 9. — (U.P.) — President Roosevelt will ask congress this week for an additional appropriation for both defense and lend-lease operations.

Some administrations said the figure would equal the original \$7,000,000,000 lend-lease bill. Without announcing the exact sum, Stephen T. Early, White House press secretary, told reporters that the supplemental estimates would be for the army, navy, and maritime commission in connection with increased domestic defense and an increase in the lend-lease program.

More Needed Soon
Budget Director Harold D. Smith brought the new estimates to the White House today for a final check with the president.

Informed persons had predicted the request earlier. They said that all of the first fund would be allocated by the end of August and that a new appropriation of approximately the same size would be needed almost immediately to plan further arms production.

The first \$7,000,000,000, they added, already has been expended by administrative action to approximately \$8,000,000,000. They explained that the lease-land act authorized the use of \$1,300,000,000 of other appropriations for British aid purposes, but left to the president's discretion whether this supplementary money should be repaid from the lease-land appropriation. In practice, it was said, little of this "other money" is being reimbursed, so actually it serves to swell the original \$7,000,000,000 fund.

Great Britain has been getting nearly all the lease-land material, although some has gone to China and there is now a possibility that shipments eventually may go to Russia.

GAME SUPERVISOR ROTARY SPEAKER

Frank B. Wire, state game supervisor, discussed Oregon wildlife at the Tuesday luncheon meeting of Medford Rotary club, at the Hotel Medford. Following his brief address a moving picture was shown featuring the great antelope herds of the Hart Mountain area.

"Oregon is the seventh state in the nation in big game, third in elk and third in antelope," Wire told the Rotarians. "There is still lots of wildlife in this state although the natural habitat of wild life is gradually being invaded by the increasing number of people coming to Oregon to live," he said.

The state game official reminded his audience of steps taken by the state to improve fishing in Rogue River. If and when the army cantonment comes to southern Oregon, added restrictions must be expected. A high tribute to the scenic beauty of the Crater and Diamond lake and the Rogue River area was paid by Mr. Wire.

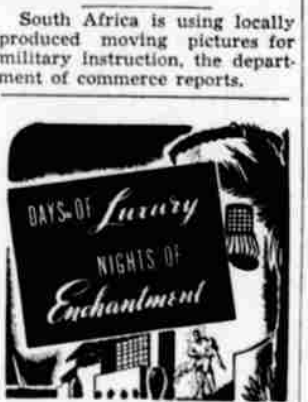
The boat sailed from a Gulf coast port June 5.

HUGE BOMBERS RECEIVE BOOST IN FORD PLANT

Auto Unit Is Turned Over to
Production of Landing
Gear to Speed Work

Detroit (U.P.) — A production shortcut to speed output of badly-needed landing gears for the 28-ton, 300-mile an hour Consolidated B24D bomber has been installed by the Ford Motor company.

Edsel Ford, president, said the company is going to build the 1,000-pound tricycle landing gears in the River Rouge tire plant until its \$18,000,000 bomber parts plant near Ypsilanti, Mich., is ready for use late this year.

"The job of building this landing equipment is a tough one," he said, "so we are not going to waste any time in getting the production problems licked."

5-a-Day at Start

Landing gears for five bombers a day will be produced in the temporary plant's production unit, which Ford said can be moved to the new bomber parts plant later. The parts plant is separate from the \$21,000,000 airplane engine factory under construction within the 1,200-acre tract embraced by Ford's River Rouge plant.

Slow production of the landing gears, or so-called "oleos," is threatening to delay the huge four-engined army bombers. With the exception of the engines the "oleos" are regarded as the most complicated part of the B-24Ds.

They must be rugged to absorb the shock of landing the 35,000-pound plane at a speed of about 100 miles an hour. They also must not be unwieldy as they fold up into the wings when the ship is in flight.

Seek Shortcut

Ford engineers, confronted by heavy demand for the "oleos," are experimenting with the design, hoping to simplify production and thereby facilitate delivery of bomber planes on schedule. They plan to send sample designs to army test laboratories for examination.

One engineer said that if the required number of forgings

can be reduced along with the machine work, landing gears can be removed from the list of defense "bottlenecks."

TOWN GIVES UP RENTED STREET

Delphos, O. — (U.P.) — The village of Delphos has been renting one of its main thoroughfares from the state of Ohio since 1907 and now refuses to continue the rental payments. As a result the state may have a city street on its hands.

Canal street is improved and business houses face it, but the one-block street has never been owned by the city. The state has been collecting \$30 a year in rent from Delphos taxpayers and now asks renewal of a contract on a 15-year basis at the same rental.

ITALY, GERMANY FIX YUGOSLAVIAN LINES

Rome, July 9. — (U.P.) — The signature of accords fixing a new German-Italian frontier through the territory conquered in Yugoslavia was announced today.

A communique said the new frontier would follow the old former Yugoslav-Italian border to a point north of Fiume then east to the Croatian border. This would give Germany the former Slovenian area in the northwestern corner and leave Italy the Dalmatian coast.

PENNSYLVANIA SEEKS GREATER OIL OUTPUT

Harrisburg, Pa. (U.P.) — A series of studies aimed at increasing the yield of Pennsylvania crude oil has been begun by the state bureau of topographic and geologic survey.

The studies were ordered after oil production slumped from a total of 19,000,000 barrels in 1937. All-time production high was in 1891 when 31,000,000 barrels were produced. That figure had slumped to 7,000,000 by 1934, when repressuring of wells with water was resorted to as a means of raising production.

Heeds Spanish Only

Dallas, Tex. (U.P.) — Spanish-speaking policemen were in demand here recently when a woman reported her dog had been stolen. The pup, she said, did not understand a word of English and had to be called in Spanish.

NAZIS SAY U. S. TROOPS MIGHT AS WELL BE IN ONE OF BRITISH FORTS

Berlin, July 9. — (U.P.) — The United States, by occupation of Iceland, has taken an active military step and is now represented by troops in the war zone, a German spokesman observed today.

"From a military point of view, these troops might as well be in a British port," he said.

German sources also said the occupation of Iceland recalls and gives new significance to President Roosevelt's comments concerning the Azores, Dakar and Cape Verde islands.

No responsible German said so but it was obvious that Berlin was counting on the possibility that the United States would occupy other places.

Albino Frog

Philadelphia — (U.P.) — The Philadelphia zoo has come in possession of one of the rarest of all

animals, an albino frog. The pure white jumper was found in the Pocono mountains and if biologists' estimates are correct he is one in 10,000,000.

Bloom 60 Years
Croydon, N. H. (U.P.) — Two house plants, a calla lily and a cactus, originally owned by her mother, have been blooming regularly in Mrs. Wilbur Wright's home for nearly 60 years.



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
