

FARMER'S DREAM COMING TRUE IN EASTERN OREGON

Bumper Crop of Wheat at Dollar a Bushel—Best Crop in History, Promise

Pendleton, Ore., July 8.—(P)—The wheat farmer's dream—a bumper crop at a dollar a bushel—was beginning to come true this week in the Oregon grain belt.

Harvesting of what gives every promise of being the best crop in history at the best prices since 1921 is under way in such granaries as Umatilla, Gilliam, Wheeler, Wasco, Union and Grant county. Here and there the summer rains damaged the fields and crickets gnawed away at the edges, but by and large the stands were thick and heavy-headed.

Umatilla Crop Vast
Umatilla county took five million bushels from its wheat lands last year. Farmers say the county harvest will reach six this year despite retirement of a good deal of land for soil conservation. A lot of good land went to mustard, canning peas and crested wheat grass instead of wheat, but it is the lighter lands that are bountiful now. Many a farmer who counted 15 bushels a good take from any of his acres is getting 25. Acres that usually yield 35 or 40 bushels are good for 50 and 55.

Surrounding counties report like increases, some more and some less, but all well over average.

Pendleton farmers say the labor situation is encouraging. The late-June completion of the pea harvest released several hundred men to man combines.

Terrific Yield
The harvest in Sherman county got under way this week and early reaping bore out the estimates of a terrific yield per acre. Wheat men expect the county's harvest to run from 2,500,000 to 3,000,000 bushels from 107,000 acres. More sources say the price in Sherman county is the highest since 1927.

At Pendleton triple-A officers estimate that No. 1 bulk wheat will bring 90.6 cents here at established loan rates which is what the farmer expects when wheat is at a dollar on eastern markets.

There is much rejoicing among Oregon's wheat people but they figure it's about time some prosperity reached them. Many a farm wife is mentally getting rid of her 1929 furniture in favor of some streamlined 1941 stuff, and warning her husband that dollar wheat and a new wardrobe go hand-in-hand. The old man wants a new car and intends to get it, the rearmament program permitting. He also has his eye on a lot of new farm machinery.

MANPOWER OF RUSSIA STUMBLING BLOCK FOR NAZIS SAYS 1917 AGE

Spokane, July 9.—(P)—Captain Longin L. Lipsky, veteran of two air forces in the World war, foresees the very weight of manpower of the Russian army as a stumbling block which the German blitzkrieg forces are going to have a hard time to surmount.

Captain Lipsky, a native-born Russian and a naturalized Englishman, came to Spokane today representing a London book and art company. He was with the Russian air force at the beginning of the World war and later flew for the British.

"The German military machine, with its high degree of mechanization, is undoubtedly far superior to the Russian army," he said, "but it is probable that Russian man-power alone will keep Germany busy for some time."

"It is most fortunate for the English that the Russians are fighting now. It gives us a respite, with the Germans occupied on two fronts."

TWO ELECTROCUTED AT PLANT NEAR REDDING

Redding, Calif., July 9.—(P)—Two men were killed today by contact with a power line carrying 60,000 volts.

They were Charles Noble Burrell, 41, and William Edward Moon, 37.

The two were working on a crane at the sand and gravel plant of the Columbia Construction company, east of Redding.

PENDLETON BASE SENDS BUILDING ACTIVITY AHEAD

25,880 Per Cent Increase Registered in June—Medford Shows 108 Per Cent

Portland, Ore., July 9.—(P)—An astronomical 25,880 percent increase in residential construction at Pendleton, Ore., in June over the same month last year placed it far ahead of other cities of Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

A year ago in June its dwelling construction was valued at only \$300 and last month it was \$77,940, the monthly survey of the Equitable Savings and Loan Association revealed. Army air-base construction was the chief reason.

Medford Does Well
Bremerton continued its growth with a 248 percent increase in total construction value and 238 percent on dwellings.

Other cities with substantial total increases were Bellingham, 208 percent; Hoquiam, 178 percent; La Grande, Ore., 162 percent; Medford, Ore., 108 percent; Vancouver, B. C., had a dwelling increase of 164 percent but its total construction was under that of a year ago.

Oregon showed the largest gain in dwelling construction with a 63 percent increase and Washington's 20 percent total construction increase topped the northwest states.

Astoria, Ore., July 9.—(P)—Salt water proved an effective substitute for surgery, an X-ray plate revealed today.

John Rush Harper, 3-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank B. Harper of Spokane, was playing on Cannon beach where he had been taken to gain strength for removal of a common pin from a lung.

The child dug a hole and when the water welled up, took a drink. He started to cough, his mother pounded him on the back, and the pin dropped to the sand.

The X-ray confirmed Mrs. Harper's belief that it was the pin that had been in the lung for several months.

10 NUDISTS KILLED BY PANAMA COPS

Panama, Panama, July 9.—(P)

Officials announced today that three women and seven men were killed last night when Panama police tried to compel a colony of "Swiss German" nudists at the village of Cotto, 20 miles below the Costa-Rica Panama border, to comply with Panama's immigration and other laws.

Six persons were wounded. All the casualties were members of the colony except one Panama policeman, who was wounded.

Secy. Ickes Denies Blocking Aluminum

Washington, July 9.—(P)—Secretary Ickes denied emphatically today that refusal of the interior department to supply more electric power to the Aluminum Company of America had caused a lag in aluminum production.

A house military subcommit-

tee, discussing the company's failure to get more power from Bonneville dam, had observed that "a squabble at this time on the subject of monopoly is a tragic and sorry spectacle, indeed."

MARY ANDREWS LADD, 81, PORTLAND PIONEER, DIES

Portland, July 9.—(P)—Mary Andrews Ladd, 81, resident of Portland since 1874, died here today.

She was the widow of William Mead Ladd, for many years president of the Ladd & Tilton bank, early Oregon financial institution.

A memorial to her is her collection of Japanese prints, said to be one of the finest in the United States, presented to the Portland art museum by her daughter-in-law, Mrs. William S. Ladd.

Unsolicited Fame
Los Angeles (P)—Spy scares somewhat upset the Oriental travel of Faubion Bowers, 24-year-old New Yorker. In Japan he was questioned as an American spy. Reaching the Dutch East Indies, he was held three weeks as a Japanese spy. He finally convinced officials he was just an American who wanted to go home.

GROWTH OF CHEESE INDUSTRY IS TOLD

Geneva, N. Y., U.P.—Back in 1903 one horse and wagon delivered the nation's entire output of pasteurized process cheese, all of which was sold in Chicago.

Now, more than 260,000,000 pounds of cured cheese are used annually in the manufacture of pasteurized process cheeses in the United States, according to Prof. J. C. Marquardt, dairy specialist at the New York state agricultural experiment station.

Marquardt said the industry has developed on the need for a product that is uniform, slightly sanitary, free from off-flavors, and suitable for modern merchandising methods, including keeping quality.
