Publix Tourney Is Dedicated to H. Chandler Egan

Tributes being paid or contemplated to the late H. Chandler Egan of Medford, national amateur champion of 1903 and 1904 and one of the most beloved golfing figures of all time, seem to be coming thick and fast of late.

The other day it was revealed Egan would probably be elected to golf's Hall of Fame to take his place alongside Bobby Jones, Walter Hagen, Gene Sarazen, Francis Ouimet and other immortals of the ancient and honorable pastime.

Today, coming to our desk from Spokane, Wash., was a beautiful booklet describing and publicizing the annual national public links championship to be held at the Indian Canyon Golf course in that city July 14 to 19. Egan, who designed our own beautiful Rogue Valley course, also laid out the Indian Canyon course, and it was to him that the coming tournament was dedicated.

On the first page of the booklet is a very fine picture of Egan, and underneath it are these words: "In memory of Chandler Egan—the Mighty Oregonian—He ranks with Ouimet and Jones in the sport he followed and he will always be there, affectionately, in the finest memories of the American golfer. National champion in '03 and '04—several times northwest amateur champion—golf architect. To Spokane he left the Indian Canyon course, to test the drivers of new generations of American golf."

A fine tribute to a fine man and a fine golfer.

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Colored Palmer House Stars Stopped by Craters, 7 to 1

LEIBER PITCHES 7-HIT BALL FOR FOURTH VICTORY

Al Wray Hits Triple and Two Singles to Lead Attack—Roelandt Bats in Three

With Big Dutch Leiber flinging a fine seven-hitter to notch his fourth triumph in five starts for the locals, the Medford Craters submerged the colored Palmer House Stars of Chicago, 7 to 1, at the fairgrounds park last night before one of the year's largest crowds. It was the ninth exhibition-game victory in 11 tries for the Craters.

"Big Dutch" received able support from his teammates, who bunched 10 hits off Bill Mitchell, Palmer House right-hander, in almost perfect fashion. The Craters wasted only one of their 10 blows, McLean's single in the eighth; all the others either setting up a run or belting one home.

Leiber, who whiffed six and walked none, missed a shutout in the eighth inning when A. Radcliff doubled to center after Longest reached first on a bad throw by Shortstop Del Schroer, his third error of the game. At all other times the barnstormers were helpless in the face of Dutch's whooping curve ball and blistering hard one. It was probably the best game the big right-hander had pitched thus far.

Long Triple

Al (Wray) Lightner and Frankie Roelandt, two of the supposedly weaker Crater clubbers, led the Medford attack. Wray, plagued by a terrible slump all season, switched to the left side of the plate and whaled out two singles and a 385-foot triple in three trips for a perfect evening, besides scoring three runs. Roelandt, whammed out two singles and laid down a perfect squeeze bunt to drive in three runs.

The Craters had three two-run innings, the third, sixth and seventh, and tallied once in the fourth to send the Negroes away from here in an unhappy frame of mind.

Del Schroer's walk, Bob Churchill's sacrifice, Manager Lou Sauer's triple to right-center and McLean's infield single gave the locals a pair of markers in the third and they came right back with another in the fourth on singles by Wray and Leiber

and Roelandt's perfect bunt that squeezed Wray across the plate. Wray opened the sixth with a single to right, went to second on Leiber's sacrifice and scored on Roelandt's single to right. Schroer walked and Churchill singled to right scoring Roelandt. That made it 5 to 0, and the locals wound up their scoring in the seventh with two more.

Great Fielding

McLean, first up, reached first on an error and tallied when Wray lashed his triple to the right-centerfield fence. Roelandt singled to center and Wray scored with the seventh and final run.

The Craters gave Leiber spotty but sensational fielding support. Manager Sauer made a great throw from deep centerfield in the eighth to catch A. Radcliff at the plate as he tried to score from second on Williams' single. Churchill came up with a beautiful stop on a hard smash to his left, and McLean, playing his first game in two months, pulled two fine fielding plays.

The Craters will play Redding (Cal.) of the Northern California league in an exhibition game here Saturday night, and will entertain the Toledo Mudhens in a regular Oregon State league tilt Sunday afternoon.

EGAN MEMORIAL TOURNEY STARTS COMING SUNDAY

Low 36-Hole Medal Card to Win Trophy Given by Mrs. Egan—Ends July 20

The annual H. Chandler Egan memorial 36-hole medal tournament, staged in honor of the man who designed the beautiful Rogue Valley course and won two national amateur championships, will start next Sunday and be completed the following Sabbath.

Entrants will fire their first 18 holes on the opening day and will shoot their final round anytime next week. Just so their 36 holes are completed by July 20. The club pro has requested that cards be turned in to the clubhouse immediately following the two rounds, and that full names be signed.

The low net score for the 36 holes will win the tourney and gain possession for a year of the beautiful trophy donated by Mr. H. Chandler Egan in memory of the late and beloved amateur titleholder. The cup was won last year by Justin Smith, who will be on hand to defend his title. Full handicap will be allowed in determining the net score.

Starting on July 20 with qualifying rounds will be the Pepsi-Cola 18-hole handicap match play tournament, to be run off in four flights. A silver trophy will be awarded for first prize, a dozen golf balls for the winner of the first flight, six balls for the second-flight champ and a case of Pepsi-Cola for the third winner.

GULDAHL-NELSON DUEL TO FEATURE PGA PLAY TODAY

Denver, July 10.—(AP)—Texas Ralph Guldahl, of the sloping shoulders and intense concentration, is the man that hunch players in the galleries are talking about at the 24th P.G.A. tournament.

Guldahl opened today's 36-hole third round against defending champion Byron Nelson, another Texan, and the 1940 winner from Toledo, Ohio, is up against a veteran whose golf has been sizzling.

It was a day of 48 man-to-man skirmishes vivid with drama, heartaches, electric finishes and the high tension tangle of four extra-hole battles, one for 23 holes involving Medalist Sam Snead of Hot Springs, Va. Snead was two holes behind Earl Martin, Inglewood, Calif., unknown, when he collared him on the 17th and 18th despite shaky golf. Snead finally pinched Martin off on the fifth over-time green.

Another redhot performer is Mark Fry, dark-haired California open champion from Oakland, who ruined open champion Craig Wood's dreams of a grand slam in the second round and was four under par for his two frays.

Other prominent victims in yesterday's carnage were Jimmy Demaret, Dick Metz, Jimmy Thomson, Ed Dudley and E. J. (Dutch) Harrison, runner-up to Snead for the medal.

Only two ex-winners are left on the mountain-bordered premises, Denny Shute and Gene Sarazen, playing his 21st P.G.A. tournament.
