

DEFENSE COUNCIL DIVIDES ACTIVITY INTO FOUR PHASES

Formulation of Plans for
Aluminum Gathering Con-
tinued; Date Known Soon

Steps to perfect its organiza-
tion were taken last night by
the Jackson County Council of
Defense at a regular meeting
at the Jackson County Chamber
of Commerce.

Organization into four prin-
cipal divisions was approved as
follows: (1) utilities and com-
munication, John C. Boyle,
chief; (2) planning, Glenn L.
Jackson, Mayor H. S. Deuel and
County Judge J. B. Coleman in
charge; (3) protection, Lloyd
Williamson, Herb Moore and E.
W. Winkle; and (4) necessity, J.
C. Collins, chief. Each division
has many sub-divisions so that
every contingency in case of
emergency can be taken care of
quickly and efficiently.

The council also continued
the formulation of plans to
gather scrap aluminum through-
out the county. Date for the col-
lection will be announced soon.
Committee in charge comprises
Mrs. C. Reese Braley, Miss
Bertha Coy and Robert G.
Fowler. Gathering of the scrap
aluminum will be arranged in
the rural areas by Mr. Fowler,
county agent, through the ex-
tension service.

Capt. S. M. Tuttle, council
chairman, presided.
