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DELAY ARISES IN EARL FEHL SUIT TO CLEAR TITLE

Proceedings in the forcible entry and retained suit of Earl H. Fehl, former county judge, and paroled Oregon state hospital inmate, set for routine preliminaries in circuit court tomorrow have been deferred, according to District Attorney George W. Neilson. The action is too clear the title on the Pacific-Record-Herald building on Sixth street, occupied by the City Cleaners. The building passed into the hands of J. B. Thomas and wife of Ashland and the Ted Heiprotz estate, on a tax foreclosure sale.

Circuit Judge H. K. Hanna will be in Grants Pass tomorrow to hear a condemnation case before a jury and next week is Grants Pass week for the circuit court, so it will be two weeks before any action is taken in the Fehl suit.

The district attorney said he was endeavoring to induce Fehl and his attorney to stipulate Circuit Judge Hanna to hear the proceedings to expedite them. Judge Carl Hendricks of Fossil, was assigned to hear a Fehl suit more than a year ago. The current suit is now complicated, the official said, by an affidavit of prejudice filed against Judge Hendricks last February.

Increase Noted In Dodge Truck Sales Says Lester Taylor

Dodge Job-Rated truck sales are soaring in Medford, Jackson county, the state of Oregon and straight across the country, according to Les Taylor, owner of Pierce Allen Motor company, Medford Dodge truck, Dodge and Plymouth dealer, who reports a 107 percent increase in Dodge truck sales for the first half of 1941 compared with the first six months of 1940.

While the increase in percentage of units sold is phenomenal it is still far below the gain in dollar volume, Taylor announces. This is due, he states, to increasing demand for larger units, one and a half and two-ton and up, particularly in the increasingly popular Dodge Delsel units, several of which are operating in the Medford area.

"The reason why we are way out in front in third place in sales, ahead of all but the lower priced trucks, is due to four things," Taylor stated yesterday. "First, Dodge trucks are quality merchandise—second, they last longer; third, Dodge trucks are priced with the lowest; fourth, Pierce-Allen day and night truck service, rated to keep trucks moving—keep the mon the job." Taylor believes that now is the time to place orders for trucks. "Our experience in the last world war reminds us that present prices cannot last but are likely to advance beyond present low levels. We believe every prospective truck user should buy quality merchandise that will last for years and years and should buy now," he concludes.

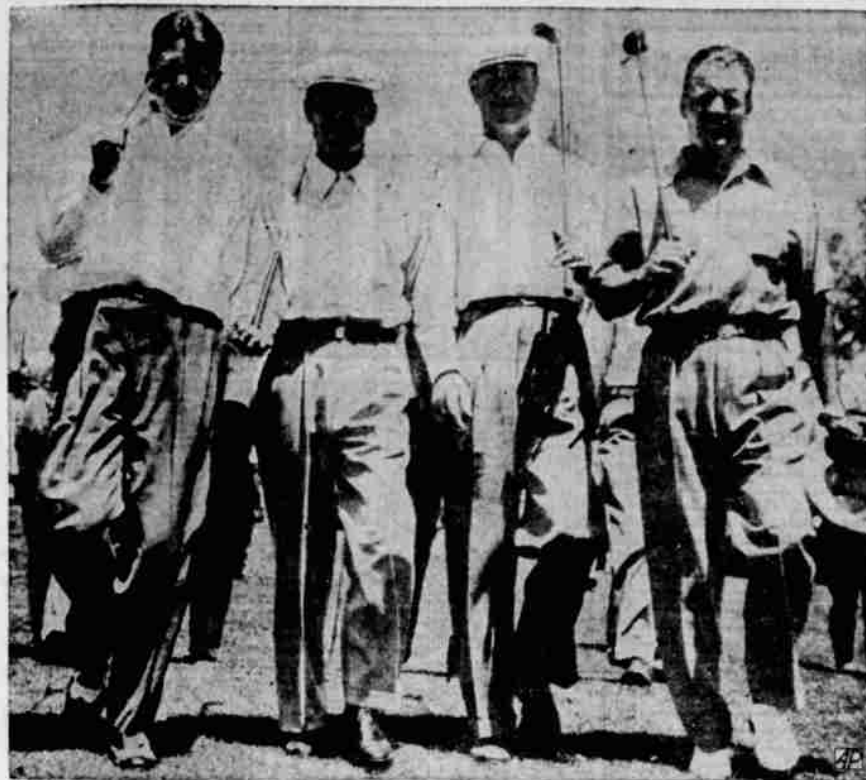
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Foursome Attracts P. G. A. Gallery

Colorado Loses Tradition About Pullman Car Idea

Denver (U.P.)—Colorado, which likes to call itself "Colorful Colorado," has lost one of its traditions that added to its color—the legend that George M. Pullman got the idea for his sleeping cars while prospecting in the state.

The oft-repeated story that the idea was inspired by bunks chained to the walls of miners' cabins has been making the rounds for years, even appearing in state history books.

But here are the facts, and the first revelation is surprising—Pullman didn't even invent the Pullman. America's first sleeping cars had been operated in Pennsylvania as early as 1836 and Pullman took his first ride in one in 1853 when he was 22.

He rode 60 miles from Buffalo to Westfield, N. Y., but the discomforts were numerous and the young man, so the authenticated story goes, wondered whether a car could not be built that would serve for both day and night travel and furnish some comforts.

Five years elapsed before he began to work on the sleeping car and, while he never claimed the invention of the sleeping car, "he did produce more comfortable cars than any then in service."

His enterprise was abandoned temporarily when the Civil war broke out and the government needed all railroad cars for transporting troops.

It was not until then that Pullman came to Colorado along with many others attracted by the stories of fabulous fortunes to be made in gold and silver.

Although Pullman made money by selling supplies to the miners in addition to working claims and buying ore, he did not make a fortune, as the Colorado legend goes. He returned east after a few years in Colorado with more than \$20,000, which included some of his original capital.

On returning to Chicago, he took up his sleeping car venture and put virtually all his savings into the first all-Pullman-built car, the Pioneer.

EASTERN TOWN READY FOR ANY EMERGENCY, EVEN AERIAL ATTACK

Greenwich, Conn.—(U.P.)—At least one Connecticut town is prepared for any contingency

up to and including an aerial blitzkrieg.

The Greenwich town board of estimate and taxation has approved a \$3,885 appropriation for the purchase of 50 additional pistols; two transportable steel boats; 100 folding cots with mattresses, sheets, pillows, and other equipment.

Its emergency defense plan was worked out in cooperation with the Connecticut state police. The pistols would be handed out to members of fire-police patrols, or to "any other group of special officers" in periods of serious emergency.

The two 14-foot steel boats are complete with trailers that can be attached to automobiles so the boats could be speeded to any lake or pond in town where they might be required.

The 100 folding cots are to be stored away until needed. After a survey of available space it was decided to set up these beds in the Y. M. C. A., and in schools in case of a shortage of beds in the hospital.

Town selectmen are not anticipating any immediate wartime use for this equipment but feel that it would be invaluable in event of any disaster, such as flood, hurricane, or fire.
