

DEAD INDIAN ROAD IMPROVEMENT START ON MONDAY

Gravel-Surfacing of 10.5 Miles Planned by Forest Service and County

Work will be started Monday on the gravel-surfacing of 10.5 miles of the Dead Indian road. Rogue River national forest headquarters announced today. The work will be completed in six weeks.

Through a cooperative agreement, all the crushed rock will be provided by the county. The county will do 3 1/2 miles of the surfacing, from Deadwood Junction west, and the forest service will do seven miles from Deadwood Junction, headquarters explained. Two miles of the stretch to be done by the forest service are in Klamath county. When the work is completed on the present project, there will remain 20 miles of unsurfaced road, extending to Rocky Point Junction at Felican bay.

To Near Lake
When the present project is finished, the road will be gravelled from Ashland to a point two miles beyond the Jackson-Klamath county line, 4 1/2 miles from the south end of Lake of Woods.

The forest service part of the work will be done under the direction of Robert Mercer, construction superintendent.

When the improvement work is completed, the road will become part of the county road system and will be maintained by Jackson and Klamath counties, forest headquarters said.

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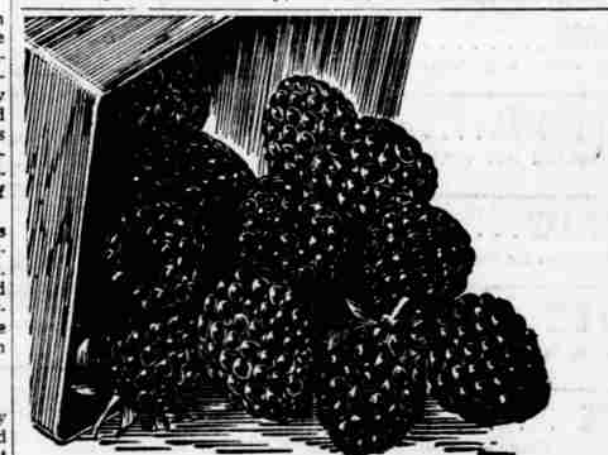
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110 Boys Register for Draft Outside of Medford Limits

In The Day's News

TODAY'S (Thursday's) thumbnail sketch of the German-Russian war:
Berlin: "Operations in the East are progressing relentlessly."
Moscow: "The red army is holding fast and inflicting terrible losses on the invaders."

THERE is a suggestion here of the irresistible force meeting the immovable body. The world is waiting breathlessly to see what will happen.

JAPAN is still talking. Talking, as every experienced executive knows, is an excellent method of stalling off decisions until better information is at hand.

This writer suspects that before making a decision Japan will want to know EXACTLY what is happening in Russia.

TODAY'S (Thursday's) dispatches tell of heavy fighting at Lepel (consult your map here). Lepel lies in the neck of dry land between the Dvina

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river, which flows to the north, and the Dnepr, which flows to the south.

It was along this causeway between great rivers that Napoleon advanced to Moscow. The Germans are attempting to repeat his performance.

There are other reports of heavy fighting to the north, directed at Leningrad (former St. Petersburg). This suggests that the Germans may be held in the center of the Stalin line and are trying to get around its northern flank.

That would indicate that they AREN'T proceeding according to original plan.

SYRIA bobs back into the news today.

The French general there apparently asked for an armistice but wasn't willing to give up enough, and so the British are going on fighting. The French general appears to have been trying to hold out Beirut.

The French, one would say, are getting pretty well gunned up with armistices. They have one with Germany, which has placed a halter around their necks at home, and are jockeying for one with the British in Syria.

IN London, Colonel Moore-Brabazon, British minister of aircraft production, says the increasing flow of American planes will enable Britain to bomb Berlin on a heavy scale soon.

He adds: "The Germans' worst raids on London will be child's play compared to those we're planning for Berlin."

To this writer's inexperienced eyes, heavy bombing of Berlin offers far better prospects than the invasion of western Europe the British press has been clamoring for since the German-Russian fracas developed.

MEANWHILE, this dispatch comes from Chungking, Chinese capital:

"Japan lost 1,994,269 killed or wounded and 24,082 as prisoners in four years of war with China, a Chinese military spokesman said today."

"The Japanese also have lost 2,054 airplanes, 12,322 tanks and armored cars and thousands of field pieces, machine guns and rifles, he said."

THIS, of course, is the Chinese story. The exact figures involved in it indicate a pretty good job of counting. But there

isn't much doubt anywhere that if Japan had known four years ago what she knows now she might have proceeded much more cautiously.

One trouble with war is that when you start you can never be wholly sure where you will finish.

Air Raid Conscious
Sydney, Australia (UP)—A new traffic tunnel being built between Sydney's cosmopolitan King's Cross square to the eastern suburbs is being made bomb proof for shelter purposes. In event of raids it will accommodate 9,000 people.

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
