

FOREST OFFERS PLEASANT TIME OVER WEEK-END

Cool Shade of Camps, Pools for Swimming, Drives in Timber Land Attractions

The following recreational bulletin was issued today by Rogue River national forest headquarters:

"With the warm weather prevailing in the valley, the cool shade of forest camps, drives along roads in heavy timber, and swimming in mountain pools offer enjoyment for the week-end.

"Swimmers will find ideal conditions at McKee and Beaver-Sulphur camps in the Applegate district, at Lake o' Woods and at a pool which is provided by the resort at Dead Indian Soda Springs. Motorists are especially directed this week to the Herschberger mountain area where the many acres of bright alpine flowers are now at their best, offering a scene of unusual beauty from the summit of the Umpqua divide. This area is reputed to have the largest variety of wild rock garden plants on the Pacific coast.

Road Conditions
"Although road conditions in the forest are generally good, the following are still impassable: On the Ashland loop, travelers from Ashland will be stopped by snow at the head of Grouse creek and from the Applegate side at Wangle gap; the road from Lodgepole to Parker meadows and the unimproved section of the Butte Falls-Prospect county road are so wet as to make the use of chains advisable; the road from McAllister Soda Springs to Fish Lake is under water in the low meadows and travel on it should not be attempted; no difficulty, however, will be experienced in reaching McAllister Soda Springs from Lake Creek.

"Fishing in the Applegate district is fair. Fishermen are reminded that part of the streams head in California and that caution is necessary to avoid unwittingly fishing in that state without a proper license. In the Butte Falls district, both the south and middle forks of Rogue river are yield-

ing good catches to flies. Horse-shoe and Cary lakes in Blue canyon and all of the Seven Lakes group are consistently yielding limit catches. The trails in the Seven Lakes area have been maintained and all the snow is gone. Last week-end there were 17 head of pack and saddle horses in the meadow at one time. In the Lake o' Woods district, trolling in Fish Lake with large flashers has been especially good the past two days, yielding good catches of eastern brook trout.

Limits Taken
At Four Mile lake limits of rainbow are being taken with Andy Reeker flies. At the bridge on the North Fork of Little Butte, near Big Elk, eastern brook are rising to various flies. In the north end of Lake o' Woods several catches of three or four bass weighing one and one-half to three pounds each were made this week. In the Union Creek district all streams are good for trout with salmon eggs and royal coachman flies.

"A fire was started by a careless camper and another by a careless smoker in the forest during the past week. Both fires were luckily controlled by forest guards before much damage was done but, with conditions becoming more critical, it is more and more important that forest visitors use the utmost caution with fire in the woods."

APRICOT HARVEST GETS UNDER WAY

Picking of the apricot crop of the valley is under way. County Horticulturist Clifford B. Cordy reported today, and expected to reach its peak some time next week. The fruit is in demand by housewives. Some will be shipped to northern California and Klamath County.

Packers predict the price for cannery Bartlett will be higher than last year, but no offers have been reported and only one cannery representative is said to have appeared on the scene. Seedmen estimate the sugar beet seed crop here will be around 160 tons, same as last year, when the price was eight cents a pound. There is about 300 acres. The harvesting will not start till next month.

SPIDER MITES IN SOME ORCHARDS

Spider mite are appearing in some pear orchards, but injury so far has been very slight. The trees should be watched for the appearance of injury and as soon as a noticeable amount of leaf injury appears, a spray should be applied. If the spray is applied too early a further immigration of mites may make another application necessary, according to C. B. Cordy, assistant county agent, and L. G. Gentner, entomologist, Southern Oregon Experiment Station.

The officials advise use of 1 1/4 gallons of medium or light medium summer oil emulsion plus 1/4 pound of spreader per 100 gallons. If a 98% emulsible oil is used in the place of the emulsion, use 1 1/4 gallons of light medium or light.

These dosages are the smallest that can be used for successful control with thorough spraying. The use of less material may result in poor control.
