LONDOS RANKS AS TOP HEAVYWEIGHT MATMAN IN WORLD

There may be numerous "heavyweight wrestling champions," but Jim Londos, who will tangle with Pete Belcastro in the one-hour main event of next Monday night's great outdoor program at the fairgrounds park, is generally recognized in mat circles as the most legitimate claimant to the championship of the universe.

Returning to his native Greece three years ago because of his father's illness, Londos proceeded to take on and defeat the best matmen in Europe and Africa. Upon his return to America, he faced Bronco Nagurski, then recognized by most people as the heavyweight king, and defeated the ex-Minnesota grid star in a torrid 40-minute match. Since then, Londos has claimed the international title, and nobody has arose to dispute his right to the throne.

The handsome Greek has been in the mat game for about 25 years, and always has wrestled clean so long as his opponent didn't turn dirty. When this latter occurs, Londos is capable of turning on enough heat to scorch the toughest foe, an item that Pete Belcastro might do well to remember. Though he probably won't.

In the two preliminary matches to the main event, Cowboy Dude Chick and Billy McEwen will clash in the semi-windup, and Ernie Piluso will face George Wagner in the opener, both of six 10-minute rounds. McEwen is the Pacific coast light-heavyweight champion and will be making his Medford debut.

Denver, Colo., July 11.—(AP)—A couple of ex-Texas caddies—rivals since Fort Worth school boy days—squared off today in the "main event" of quarter-final matches of the 1941 National Professional Golfers association championship.

Feller Wins 17th by Stopping A's, 3-2; Cards Cling to Heels of Dodgers

Though they can turn out to be duds just as easily as home explosives, there were definite indications today that the Cleveland Indians and St. Louis Cardinals aren't going to give up the pennant races without a struggle.

At the moment, the battles are just as they were before the all-star contest, with the New York Yankees three and a half games up on Cleveland in the American league, the Brooklyn Dodgers three games to the good over the Cards in the National. But there's the hitch—the pacesetters didn't pick up any ground.

The Yanks, opening a swing through the west, got in five innings last night before it rained in St. Louis. That proved just enough for Joe DiMaggio to run his hitting streak to 49 straight and for Lefty Gomez to blank the Browns, 1-0, on five hits. At the same time, though, the Indians were beating the Athletics 3-2, with Bobby Feller setting the A's down on six safeties and then clinching victory No. 17 by scoring the deciding run after belting a triple in the ninth.

In the other circuit the Dodgers also were kept from widening their margin. In one of the program's two afternoon games they tamed the Cincinnati Reds, 8-3, on Kirby Higbe's second straight five-hitter and timely hitting by Cookie Lavagetto, Billy Herman and Ducky Medwick.

But the Cardinals stuck right on their heels. In a wild-eyed, free-swinging contest that involved five homers and eight pitchers, the Red Birds first ran up an 8-0 lead, saw it disappear in one inning, then came back with five more to blast the New York Giants, 13-9, and end their own five-game losing streak.

At Chicago the White Sox supported John Dungan (CQ) Rigney's seven-hit hurling with a 14-hit assault of their own to down the Washington Senators, 5-1.

Winners of but two of their past 14 games, the National league Phillies whipped, 6-3, by a gathering of 4,630.

The Chicago Cubs' Vern Olsen came out the winner, 3-1, over the Boston Braves' Al Javery, in a mound duel.

Craters Entertain Redding And Toledo This Week-End

Soaring along on the wings of a four-game winning streak, the Medford Craters will attempt to add a couple of victories to their string this week-end when they entertain the Redding Tigers of the Northern California league in an exhibition game Saturday night, and clash with the Toledo Mudhens in a regular Oregon State league tussle here Sunday afternoon.

The Saturday eve affair will get under way at 9 o'clock, with the Sunday afternoon contest slated at 2:30. Both games will be played at the fairgrounds park.

Manager Lou Sauer said today that Bob Fox, smooth-working right-hander, would be on the Crater mound against Redding Saturday night, and that either Bill Smith or Jack Brown, two youngsters from Portland, would fling the league fracas against Toledo Sunday. Big Dutch Leiber will be available for relief purposes if needed.

Redding, one of the best clubs in the N.C.L., will come here bent on getting revenge for that 2 to 1 licking the Craters handed them here on May 24. That was one of the most sensational games played here in years, going 10 innings before the Craters punched across a tally in the final frame to cop the verdict, and the fray Saturday night is expected to be the same sort of an exhibition.

Pitching for the Tigers will probably be Fred Kienle, sharp-shooting right-hander who struck out 18 Craters in his last appearance here.

Sunday's game will signify a resumption of Oregon State league action after a week lay-off to make way for the state semi-pro tourney. Eagleson is expected to be the pitching choice for the Mudhens, who boast a fair club that hasn't yet been able to get started.

The Craters will take the field with Frank Roelandt catching, Al Fleishman or Antelope Al Lightner on first, Cliff McLean on second, Del Schorner on short, Bob Churchill on third, Al Wray in left, Sauer in center and Joe Gray in right. Lightner was expected to arrive in Medford some time today, but in case he doesn't get here this week-end Fleishman will hold down the initial cushion.

In other State league games Sunday, Albany will play at Eugene, Hills Creek at Bend and Klamath Falls will face Silverton.
