

WHEAT FORECAST SHOWS INCREASE SINCE MONTH AGO

Combined Yield Now Figured at 923,613,000 Bu.; Pears Under Last Season

Washington, July 11.—(P)—The agriculture department today forecast this year's corn crop at 2,348,709,000 bushels and total wheat production (the winter wheat and spring wheat crops combined) at 923,613,000 bushels.

The combined wheat crop was forecast a month ago at 910,699,000 bushels. Production was 816,698,000 bushels last year, and the 1930-39 average production was 747,507,000 bushels.

The wheat crop forecast is made up of:

Winter wheat 682,321,000 bushels, compared with 697,692,000 bushels forecast a month ago, 589,151,000 bushels produced last year, and 569,417,000 bushels, the 1930-39 average.

Spring wheat 241,292,000 bushels, compared with 213,007,000 bushels forecast a month ago, 227,547,000 bushels produced last year, and 178,090,000 bushels, the 1930-39 average.

Durum wheat (included in spring wheat) 38,754,000 bushels, compared with 34,776,000 bushels last year, and 37,398,000 bushels, the 1930-39 average.

Oats production is forecast at 1,212,783,000 bushels, compared with 1,117,419,000 bushels forecast a month ago, 1,233,628,000 bushels produced last year, and 1,007,141,000 bushels, the 1930-39 average.

Barley 338,397,000 bushels, compared with 318,054,000 bushels a month ago, 309,235,000 produced last year, and 224,970,000 bushels, the 1930-39 average.

Rye 48,579,000 bushels, compared with 44,828,000 bushels a month ago, 40,601,000 bushels produced last year, and 38,472,000 bushels, the 1930-39 average.

Production of other crops as indicated by July 1 condition, was reported as follows: (with comparative figures for last year's production and the 10-year average):

Pears, 31,071,000 bushels com-

pared with 31,622,000 and 27,278,000.

Potatoes, 367,650,000 bushels compared with 397,722,000 bushels last year and 370,045,000 bushels, the 10-year average.

Sugar beets, 9,582,000 tons compared with 12,192,000 and 9,284,000.

Hogs, 41,500,000 pounds compared with 41,722,000 and 34,784,000.

Peaches, 67,049,000 bushels compared with 54,430,000 and 54,356,000.

Grapes, 2,555,000 tons compared with 2,544,000 and 2,264,000.

The acreage planted to the various crops this year, with comparison in percentage of last year's acreage included: wheat (all) 56,783,000 and 106.1; winter wheat 40,316,000 and 111.5; spring wheat 16,467,000 and 94.9; Durum wheat (included in spring wheat) 2,640,000 and 84.6; oats 37,238,000 and 106.9; sugar beets 761,009 and 83.1; hops 35,000 and 107.

Stocks of grain on farms July 1 were reported as follows:

Oats, 218,817,000 bushels, or 17.7 percent, compared with 143,488,000 and 15.3 percent a year ago, and 153,661,000 and 13.0 percent two years ago.

Wheat (old crop) 89,097,000 bushels or 10.9 percent, compared with 83,146,000 and 11.1 percent a year ago, and 59,691,000 and 7.9 percent two years ago.

The indicated acre yield and indicated total production of winter wheat by principal producing states include:

Idaho 29.0 and 18,763,000; Washington 30.5 and 47,854,000; Oregon 26.0 and 17,888,000; California 16.0 and 12,176,000.

Attack on Communist Russia Gains Sympathy for Nazis In Parts of Latin America

The German invasion of Russia has been responsible for considerable confusion among several Latin American countries.

With few exceptions, communism has been regarded, at least in government circles, and certainly among all conservative and quasi-conservative classes, as a greater menace to Latin American institutions than nazism and fascism.

Little Voice
Throughout Latin America, communists have had little voice in government. Except for Chile (where communists have been playing an important role in the popular front government), in Cuba (where the communist party actually took the lead in the campaign to elect Col. Fulgencio Batista as president), and now to a lesser degree in Mexico, communism is still not virtually outlawed.

The apparent Russo-German cooperation, dating from August, 1939, lost the nazis many sympathizers in South America and it was a potent weapon for militant pro-democratic organizations to enlist numerous doubtful persons. The newest turn of events in the European military panorama, however, may cause a sharp about-face on the part of certain segments in the anti-nazi movement who were never more than lukewarm at best, and it gives agitators and propagandists new ammunition for their cause.

Crusader Theme Voiced
They can picture Adolf Hitler as a crusader engaged in destroying the peril of a Bolshevik world hegemony and this idea seems to have taken hold in some quarters already. The conservative Catholic newspaper, El Debate, Quito, Ecuador, has stated that "in the struggle between Germany and Russia . . . we are with Germany and we desire her triumph."

Although such statement of sympathy may not become widespread in Latin America, it would not be surprising if an undercurrent of similar feeling should develop in many quarters. So far as governments are concerned, it is likely that the United States policy toward the Russo-German phase of the war will be closely scrutinized and that no official action or declaration of policy will ensue to provide a clash with the United States course.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR URGED TO CAMPAIGN FOR DROUGHT RETURN

Atlantic City, N. J., July 11.—(P)—A campaign for the return of prohibition was proposed to the International Christian Endeavor society in biennial convention today.

"The present national emergency makes even more imperative prompt and decisive action," Dr. Daniel A. Poling of Philadelphia, president of the society which claims 2,000,000 members in the United States and Canada, told 6,000 delegates last night. "Alcohol has less than nothing to contribute to the national defense."

Asserting the society faced "a greater task" than it did more than two decades ago before the last world war, Dr. Poling said:

"For every saloon of 1911," he said, "there are now at least three similar, or worse, places of liquor sale. There is work for us to do. Here and now we renew our pledge, rededicate ourselves to the solution of the liquor problem, and here we shall make our plans to contribute our maximum service in the interests of a sober America."

ARMED FORCES URGED TO MAKE USE OF GLIDER

Phoenix, Ariz. (U.P.)—One of the major factors neglected thus far in U. S. defense efforts is training of glider pilots and use of the sail-plane as a military weapon, according to Lewis B. Barringer, authority on motorless craft and holder of the world altitude record for gliders.

Glider training, he said, would provide at minimum expense a huge reserve of young men, well grounded in the fundamentals of flying, from which could be drawn fighting pilots, gunners, bombardiers, and observers for

the regular air corps as well as other flying personnel.

He urged establishment of government-operated training centers for glider pilots, similar to ones used to train cadets in fighting planes. In addition, he advocated formation of glider clubs by youths interested in aviation.

The glider, although it looks harmless in comparison with a 400-mile-an-hour fighter plane or a heavily-armored bombing plane, is used successfully as an offensive weapon by the Germans, Barringer said.

JAP VESSELS TAKING HUGE OIL SHIPMENTS

San Pedro, Cal., July 11.—(P)—Japanese vessels are taking more than 400,000 barrels of oil from Los Angeles harbor this week.

The auxiliary naval tanker Kokuyu Maru was due to sail today with 70,000 barrels and the naval tanker Iro was com-

pleting her cargo of 84,000 barrels. The former whaler Tonon Maru III and the Kyokuyo Maru are to sail tomorrow with 140,000 barrels each.
