BUYERS STAGE RUSH TO REGISTER ORDERS IN WHOLESALE MARTS

New York, July 12.—(P)—Wholesale markets had their greatest influx in history this week as buyers discarded the usual "looking around" period and rushed to get orders on books. Dun & Bradstreet said today in the weekly review of business. Prices again trended higher rapidly.

Retail trade bore up well under changeable weather conditions with consumer buying broad and sharply ahead of last year, the review said.

"While the majority of wholesale buying budgets were approximately in line with sales increases, on some occasions demand was said to have the earmarks of a buying panic," the review continued.

"Upward adjustments of prices were continuing on a broad front." Retail sales were spotty in some instances due to weather conditions, the review said, but sales for the country as a whole averaged 17 to 24 percent above a year ago. Percentage changes included Pacific coast 16 to 20.

FROM London today (Friday)
come reports of a mighty new German offensive in Russia, aimed at Moscow, Leningrad and Kiev and backed with the full might of Hitler's mechanized divisions.

Back of it is something more. Hitler knows he HAS to produce a victory in Russia—OR ELSE!

AFTER Pultusk and Eylau in his Polish campaign a century and a quarter ago, Napoleon had to produce a victory over the Russians. He produced it at Friedland—although the effort weakened him.

Hitler faces now the same compelling necessity Napoleon faced then.
Once started on their careers, these conquerors have to go on conquering. They thrive on victory. They WILT under the blight of defeat.

SO look for Hitler to put EVERYTHING HE HAS into this second hammer blow at Russia. If the Red army survives it, world history will be made.

HERE'S a typical war report from Rome:
The British bomb Naples for three hours, causing much damage to CIVILIAN dwellings.

The Italians bomb Haifa, in Palestine, where the oil pipeline from Iraq reaches the Mediterranean, firing several large refineries. They also bomb Tobruk and British airports in the island of Cyprus.

WHEN the other fellow bombs you, he hits nothing but the humble cottages of civilians—and perhaps a few hospitals.
When you bomb him, you confine your efforts ethically and nobly to military objectives.

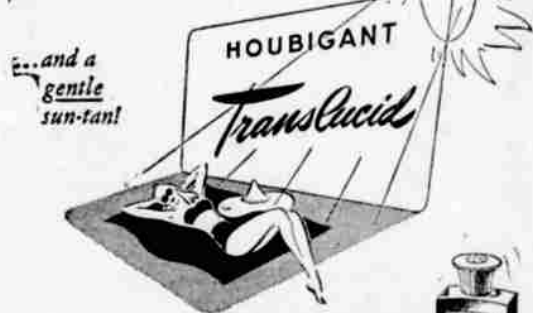
