

PWA PROJECT LIST DRAFTED IN CASE CAMP IS ORDERED

37 Jobs Seen Necessary to
Expand Facilities in Med-
ford Area for Soldiers

In possession of a list of projects for which various political sub-divisions in Jackson county will seek government financial aid, C. E. Stewart, senior regional engineer of the public works administration, left by United Mainliner this noon for his Seattle, Wash., office after spending a day and a half at meetings and in consultations here.

A list of 37 projects in the order of their priority was made out by the civilian cantonment coordination board at a meeting that lasted until late last night. Earlier the board was voted unanimous authority to act as a central clearing house in making out the list of projects and their priority for all the various political sub-divisions that met yesterday in a day-long session. Mr. Stewart presided at the day-time meeting and other federal and state men attended.

Money Available
The projects would be required if the proposed Medford army cantonment is finally authorized, it was explained by the coordinating board. The public works administration is the agency through which would be disbursed the \$150,000,000 recently appropriated by congress to help political sub-divisions in designated defense areas to expand community facilities to meet the demands of increased populations.

The 37 projects listed by the board include enlargement of such essential municipal services as water, sewer lines and sewage disposal, hospitals, county schools, especially those in the immediate cantonment area, comfort stations, recreation, access roads, fire protection, parking space and trailer houses, the board stated. The order of priority was not revealed.

While the board has authority to make out the blanket projects, each agency concerned must file its own formal application for financial assistance, it was explained.

Board Increased
Thus if increased water facilities should be needed in Medford, the city water commission would detail the project and make application for funds; if increased school facilities should be needed in Eagle Point, the appropriate school board would act. The PWA may make outright grants of funds, it may make a loan and partial grant or it may make a loan without

any grant, the board explained. The coordinating board was increased to four members recently to give the Ashland area a direct representation. It is now composed of Glenn L. Jackson, president of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, J. B. Coleman, county judge, H. S. Deuel, mayor of Medford, and T. S. Wiley, mayor of Ashland.

2 PLANING MILLS BURN IN MARCOLA

Marcola, Ore., July 5.—(P)—Flames destroyed two lumber planing mills, raced through 11 nearby houses and caused the death of one man here last night.

Firemen sped from Eugene, 15 miles away, to save additional houses and the main building of the Fischer lumber plant.

Ernest R. Spicer, 65, began carrying household goods to safety when flames reached his home. In the excitement he suffered a fatal heart attack.

Besides the planing units, valued by mill officers at \$200,000, the fire burned the Fischer machine shop and sheds.

CONGRESS GIVEN F. D. R. PLEA FOR LONGER TRAINING

Acting War Secretary Says
President Also Favors Re-
moval of 900,000 Limit

Washington, July 15.—(P)—President Roosevelt asserted today that disintegration of the army was at stake and that congress would not be breaking faith if it let the army keep selectees and guardsmen in service more than a year.

The chief executive told a press conference that in the original selective service act there was a proviso that if it were necessary draftees could be retained in service either through a declaration of a national emergency by congress or through an amendment to the law.

Washington, July 15.—(P)—Robert P. Patterson, acting secretary of war, formally advised congress today that President Roosevelt favored retention of national guardsmen, reserve officers and draftees in the army beyond the 12-month period originally prescribed by congress.

Also, Patterson said, the president desires removal of the 900,000 limitation on the number of draftees which can be in service at any one time.

A letter to Speaker Rayburn from Patterson said legislation to accomplish those ends "has the approval of the president."

Cannot Speculate
"The sequence of German conquests which has continued uninterrupted from Austria to Russia has been based on the anticipated failure of the countries concerned properly to prepare against invasion," Patterson wrote. "They have in each case launched an overwhelming force against an unprepared army. We can not speculate with the security of this nation."

In view of the "known events of the last year" and particularly of the last few months, Patterson wrote, demobilization of the army at this time "would be to court disaster."

Gen. George C. Marshall, chief of staff, was disclosed today to have told congress that specially trained army units, instead of marines, should have occupied Iceland, but were prevented from doing so because of difficulties presented by the one-year draft service rule.

Lindbergh's Communism

To the Editor:
We have Mr. Lindbergh's own word for it: he would rather be fighting with Hitler's men, waging an unprovoked and inexcusable war against the Russian people, stealing their land and their homes, reducing them to virtual slavery, than be fighting with the Russians to help defend them from all this want, brutal aggression.
No doubt there are some who still regard this man as a patriotic American. But is it pos-

sible for a man to be a patriotic American who does not believe in the principles on which our great country was founded? And evidently Lindbergh does not. However execrable the Bolshevik species of Communism may be it must be acknowledged that pure undiluted Communism is based on a principle identical with one every true American is supposed to cherish—that all men are created equal. And this is diametrically opposed to the devilish doctrine Hitler and his gang preach and practice. A doctrine that is an infinitely greater menace to human freedom than any form of Communism, however undesirable and impracticable the latter may be.

It is unfortunate for Mr. Lindbergh that having started his public career as the world's most famous aviator he should be bent on ending it as the world's most notorious fifth columnist.
