Prior to coming here he had twenty years experience in mill work and building supply business. He has changed the name of the pioneer business to the Medford Millwork Co. Mrs. Namitz will have charge of the office.

The plant is equipped to manufacture all kinds of mill work, sash and doors. Mr. Namitz will continue to carry a large stock of glass.

Mr. Trowbridge says he is not retiring although he has made no future business plans. He says he has plenty of work which needs attention but first he is going to catch up on some of the fishing and resting he missed during the years he operated the cabinet works.

THREE KLAMATHS JAILED HERE TO WAIT LAW ACTION

Three Klamath Indians were brought from Klamath Falls to the county jail here last night by Paul Hanlin, U. S. deputy marshal, to await further action in their cases.

Two, Roland Lalo, 34, and Leland Hood, 23, both of Chilquin, were arrested for parole violation. Charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, each came before Judge Claude McCulloch in U. S. district court here last fall. Lalo was sentenced to eight years, Hood to five.

The third man brought to the jail here was Clifford Wilson, 18, Klamath Indian of Chilquin, who is being held in \$5,000 bail for an asserted rape upon a five-year-old white girl.

Also in jail here is Miss Laura Babcock, 32, an Oneida Indian of New York employed as a nurse at the Klamath Agency hospital who is charged with infanticide. Miss Babcock was confined to the Klamath Falls hospital for 22 days after the asserted birth of her baby, a boy, in her quarters on June 21.
