CLYDE A. MALONE OF ASHLAND SUCCEUMBS; PLAN FUNERAL HERE

Clyde A. "Cap" Malone, former city manager of Ashland and war-time commanding officer of the old First Company, Ashland national guard unit, died early Sunday at the Veterans' hospital in Portland. He had been in poor health for a long time.

He entered the World war as a captain and was later elevated to major. He was born May 6, 1883, at Wiota, Iowa, where he spent his early life. He resided in Medford before and after the war, and was employed as electrical engineer by the California Oregon Power Co. In Ashland he supervised installation of the present city lighting system.

He was a member of the Episcopal church, also Ashland B. P. O. E., the American Legion, and all Masonic orders in Ashland, being a past master of Siskiyou chapter Blue Lodge, a Royal Arch Mason, Knights Templar and Order of the Mystic Shrine.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Grace Malone, who is a member of the well-known Purkeypile family of Central Point, two sons by a former marriage, Lieutenant Duane Malone, of Honolulu, T. H., and Clyde Malone, Jr., of Dunsmuir, Calif.

Masonic funeral rites in charge of the Ashland Masons will be conducted from the Perl funeral home here Thursday at 2 p.m. and the American Legion will have charge of final grave-site services.

REDS TELL JAPS SEAS ARE MINED

Tokyo, July 15.—(P)—Japan's ambassador to Moscow, Yoshitsugu Tatematsu, has informed the Japanese foreign office that the Soviet Russian navy has declared the main water zones facing the Sea of Japan and Kamchatka dangerous for navigation and designated free routes for ships bound for Vladivostok.

Ichiro Kishi, acting as spokesman for the cabinet board of information, said "the reason seems to be to prepare against the presence of German war-craft in the Sea of Japan."

In response to a question whether Japan "still intends to abide by her neutrality pact with the Soviet union," he said: "It still stands."
