WARD STRIKE END IS BELIEVED NEAR

Portland, Ore., July 18.—(AP)—Although all parties to the negotiation maintained a pledge of secrecy, it was hinted broadly here today that the Pacific coast Montgomery Ward & Co. strikes were near settlement. Ward officials and AFL warehousemen and retail clerk unionists ended a week-long huddle last night and the Ward representatives, headed by John A. Barr, company attorney empowered to settle the disputes which have closed stores here and at Oakland, left by airplane for Oakland.

It was intimated that the local agreement formed a basis for a pact settling the Oakland strike.

1,296 CITED IN JUNE ON TRAFFIC CHARGES

Salem, July 18.—(AP)—State police during June arrested 1,296 persons and warned 5,368 others for violating motor vehicle laws, with fines and sentences for these offenses totaling \$9,974 and 3,841 days in jail.

There were 47 arrests for drunken driving, 46 for reckless driving, 157 for having improper lights, 191 for having no driver's license, and 38 for lack of license plates.

ARM BURNED BY SUDDEN FLAREUP

Leo Newman, 1018 West 11th street, suffered a burned left arm to the elbow when gas in a water heater he was investigating last night at the home of William J. Burbridge and Mrs. H. V. Olson, 136 Wilmette avenue, suddenly ignited. The burn was not considered serious.

Some paper near the heater caught fire but though suffering from the burn, Mr. Newman put the blaze out before the arrival of firemen who answered a ward alarm.

Harold W. Wilson, service superintendent of the California-Pacific Utilities company, said his investigation indicated that the pilot light of the heater was too low so that when the gas came on automatically it was not ignited. Some gas collected and when Mr. Newman opened the heater door the pilot light flared up and ignited the collected gas, Mr. Wilson reasoned. The pilot light had been turned down, the investigation showed, but when or by whom he could not tell, Mr. Wilson said.

Mr. Newman, son-in-law of Mr. Burbridge, who owns the property, was called by Mrs. Olson when she smelled gas, firemen said.
