Mrs. James Abel, an elderly lady, was knocked down and suffered a fractured or broken arm, when a horse and rider charged into a crowd of people gathered around the concessions and near the exhibit pavilion. This accident happened shortly after the barbecue. Later in the evening, dancing at the tennis courts was temporarily interrupted when the fire siren drew most of the crowd to the fire which was on the same street as that on which the dance was being given. The newly painted home of Mrs. Nina Dusenberry was gutted by the fire, and a total ruin side, but not burned to the ground as first reported. Mrs. Dusenberry was not at home at the time the fire started and friends and relatives saved most of the furniture before the smoke and water caused more damage. The loss was covered by insurance.

TUGWELL OKAYED DESPITE ATTACK BY OHIO SENATOR

Washington, Aug. 25.—(P)—The senate confirmed today the nomination of Rexford Guy Tugwell to be governor Puerto Rico despite an assertion by Senator Taft (R., Ohio) that Tugwell had "no sympathy with American ideals or the American system" and was "the apostle of collectivism."

Confirmation was on a standing vote.

Tugwell, a close adviser of President Roosevelt in the early days of the new deal, recently was nominated to the post by the president.

Taft told the senate that Tugwell was opposed to the American constitutional system and "looks with greatest sympathy on the program of Communism in Russia."

"He is in favor of the redistribution of wealth and the totalitarian state," Taft said. "He has attempted to divide classes and stir up class hatred, which I believe to be the most dangerous attack on American democracy."

LONG TIME STATE RESIDENT PASSES

Elia Bradford, a resident of Medford for the past 11 years, and this state for over 50 years, passed away at a local convalescent home on Sunday afternoon at 2:40 after a short illness.

Mrs. Bradford was born in Putnam county, Missouri on Sept. 18, 1857, and was aged 83 years, 10 months and 6 days. She spent her early life in Missouri, and met and was united in marriage to William H. Bradford in Cedar county, Missouri in 1881. They lived in the east 10 years before coming to Oregon.

BERLIN IRKED BY ANTI-NAZI RADIO

London, Aug. 25.—(P)—Germany's powerful radio station Deutschland tried desperately last night to duck a new, mysterious, wave-length crasher, but the mocking voice had the last say.

The nazis slammed one record on top another, sometimes beginning one before the other finished, in order not to give the anti-nazi voice a chance to interrupt.

When the news announcer, after a rapid-fire delivery blurted "and that ends the news" the voice was clearly heard in Britain shouting:

"But the lying will continue tomorrow."

When naz war reporters' stories were given, the announcer paused for a badly-needed breath. The voice chimed in: "You will conquer yourself to death."

Trying to explain the voice, Deutschland said:

"The Bolsheviks tried to tune themselves in on one of our sta-

tions. Such methods are not a novelty. We used them in the Polish campaign. Countermeasures are being applied against the Russians."

PRESIDENT KILLS CROP FREEZE ACT

Washington, Aug. 25.—(P)—President Roosevelt vetoed today legislation to freeze government stocks of wheat and cotton, declaring it to be contrary "to sound governmental policy" and to the long-time best interests of both farmers and consumers.

In a message to the house, the chief executive said it was his conviction that approval of the measure "would seriously and adversely affect the agricultural adjustment program and the attendant policies which have been so beneficial to our farmers during the past few years."

Advocates of the bill at the capitol had contended that sale of the government stocks might depress prices.

M'NARY'S SLAYER TAKEN TO PRISON

Redwood City, Calif., Aug. 25.—(P)—Capt. John H. Holmes was taken out to San Quentin prison today to begin a one-to-ten-year sentence for manslaughter.

The army reserve officer, self-blinded by the gun with which he killed Wilson Davis McNary, Jr., of Portland, Ore., in a quarrel over the affections of a peninsula socialite, has been held in the Redwood City jail since his conviction last week.

At San Quentin, Warden Clinton Duffy indicated that Holmes would be accorded sympathetic attention.

"The man is blind," Duffy said. "We can't treat him like other prisoners. He'll be rather like a patient here. Attendants will help him about. He can learn to read Braille."

The warden said Holmes would be confined to the prison hospital, rather than to a cell-block.

ESTATE TAX ENDS SOLON'S DEFICIT

Salem, Aug. 25.—(P)—The \$450,000 deficit left by the 1941 legislature has been turned into a surplus, largely because of the \$874,000 inheritance tax payment by the estate of the late E. S. Collins of Portland, the state treasury said today.
