

LAST RITES FOR J. H. COOLEY HELD IN GRANTS PASS

Last rites for Jeremiah Henry Cooley were held in Grants Pass today.

Jeremiah Henry Cooley was born August 14, 1856 in Balasore, India. His parents, Rev. Ruel Cooley and Harriett Baldwin Cooley, both graduates of Oberlin college, were Baptist missionaries in India for 12 years.

When five years of age, he came to America with his parents, who were grieved to find their home land engaged in civil strife. His father enlisted in the 142 Illinois volunteer regiment, and served as chaplain until the close of the war.

He was educated in the schools at Johnston, Wis., where his father was pastor, and Hillsdale college, Hillsdale, Mich. For several years he taught school in that section of the country.

In 1878 he went to the new state of Nebraska and purchased a half section of land near Keneas from the Union Pacific railroad. During that winter he taught the village school. The following year he brought his bride, Alice Dutton Cooley, to whom he was married August 12, 1879, in Lawrence, Ill., and for two years they lived on the farm, enduring all the hardships of pioneer life in a new country while he continued teaching.

Then he purchased an interest in the lumber company and continued actively in that business until 1893 when he moved to Louisiana to engage in the manufacture of lumber. Four children were born: Harriett Alice, Allen Henry, Grace Irene and Charles Ray.

Upon the death of his wife in 1897, the family returned to Nebraska, and he later located at Hebron, where he remained for 10 years. In 1909 he moved to Medford, Ore., and engaged in the lumber business and resided there until a few years ago when he retired from active affairs and moved to Grants Pass, where he passed away August 24, 1941.

He was keenly interested in civic enterprises and was a factor in the upbuilding of the church and the community. He was a member of the First Presbyterian church of Medford, and of the several branches of the Masonic lodge.

His daughter, Harriett A. Moore, preceded him in death in April, 1939. Surviving are two sons and one daughter, Allen H. Cooley and Charles R. Cooley, both of Grants Pass, and Grace C. Collins of Medford, Ore., and two grand sons, Cornelius B. Collins and John C. Collins, both of Medford.

Rogue River, Aug. 26.—(Sp.) Returning to Rogue River after 10 weeks attendance at University of Oregon summer session, Walter V. Dennis, superintendent of local schools, announced that the fall term will open September 8. The elementary and high school buildings, it is reported, look exceptionally attractive after thorough cleaning and refresher coats of paint and varnish. W. A. ARMY DEFERMENT ONLY BY ORDERS OF LOCAL BOARD

No agency excepting the local board with which selective service registrants are registered has any authority to promise or to grant deferment, headquarters of Jackson county local boards 1 and 2 stated today in a formal announcement.

The statement was prompted by asserted promises of deferment held out by certain commercial schools offering training in defense work.

"It has come to the attention of the local selective service boards that the representatives of certain schools training selectees for defense service are using as an extra inducement to the prospective student the promise that they will secure deferment for him if he enrolls for the course with their school," the statement said.

"Selective service headquarters want to make this definite statement:

"1. The selective service act does not permit of group deferments.

"2. No agency excepting the local board with which the selectee is registered has any authority to promise or grant deferment.

"3. Selective service local boards request all registrants to contact their headquarters at 204 West Main street or the city school superintendent's office in Medford city hall before enrolling with any organization which is promising to train selectees for defense industry and to secure deferment for them so that they may complete their training course."

Statement from board headquarters followed closely the issuance of similar counsel from E. H. Hedrick, city school superintendent, who advised all youths to investigate the many defense courses being offered by the government without charge before signing up for any course offered by private schools at certain fees.

FIREMAN HOISTED UPON OWN BLAZE

The Dalles, Ore., Aug. 26.—(P)—A fire alarm interrupted Assistant Fire Chief Charles Roth, Jr., as he was burning grass off a vacant lot. He hustled down to the fire hall in time to follow trucks starting out for the reported blaze. They went to a vacant lot, and started extinguishing the flames Roth had just set.

WAR ENTRY BY U. S. HER OWN AFFAIR

London, Aug. 26.—(P)—Lord Beaverbrook, British minister of supply who recently returned from conferences in Washington, declared today that the United States was in the full

swing of production and that there had been no slowdown since Germany invaded Russia. Asked at a press conference if the United States was near to entry into the war, Beaverbrook replied that such a decision was the business of the people of the United States.

"What do you think?" reporters persisted.

"I'd like to see them in," he said, lifting his voice.

Then, repeating this statement, he said:

"It's nobody's business other than citizens of the United States, but if I am not to be hypocritical I'd like to see them in now."

DESTROYER GIVEN BRITAIN IS SUNK

London, Aug. 26.—(P)—The former United States destroyer Hopewell, renamed the Bath and manned by a Norwegian crew in the service of Britain, has been sunk, the royal Norwegian navy announced today.

The only other detail disclosed was that an unspecified number of the crew was lost. It was the first of the former U. S. destroyers to be announced as lost.

The Bath was one of the 50 U. S. destroyers taken over by the British in 1940 in exchange for base rights on British territory in the western hemisphere.

The destroyers were renamed for American and British cities bearing the same names.

The Bath was one of 11 ships of its class turned over to Britain. All were built in 1918, of 1,060 tons displacement and rated at 35 knots speed.

JERRY OWEN IS GIVEN FULL SAY

Salem, Aug. 26.—(P)—Federal officials advised Jerrold Owen, state civilian defense coordinator, today that all policy matters involving civilian defense activities would be cleared through Owen's office, the officials asserting that the conflict between state and government civilian defense officials has been ironed out.

Owen had complained that national civilian defense headquarters has been dealing directly with county and local defense bodies, leaving Owen in the dark as to what has been going on.

CONG. PIERCE TO ASK RE-ELECTION

Portland, Aug. 26.—(P)—Walter M. Pierce, La Grande, eastern Oregon representative in congress, will seek re-election next year.

The former governor of the state, stopping over here en route to Cascade Locks to view a proposed aluminum factory site, announced intention of seeking his sixth term.

PRISON TERM OF DRAFTEE SLASHED FROM 10 TO 3 YR.

Washington, Aug. 26.—(P)—The war department announced today that Robert P. Patterson, acting secretary of war, had reduced the prison term of John Habinak, Pennsylvania draftee, convicted by a military court martial of insubordination, from 10 to 3 years in prison.

The acting secretary also suspended execution of Habinak's dishonorable discharge until his release from confinement at the Fort Leavenworth, Kas., disciplinary barracks where he was ordered confined.

The war department announced that if Habinak's prison conduct is good, he will be released in 30 months which is the maximum period of service to which trainees are liable under the revised draft law.

Suspension of the dishonorable discharge will make it possible the department said, to restore Habinak to duty at any time with remission of the unexpired term of confinement should his subsequent conduct justify additional clemency. He would be required, however, if the emergency continues to complete his service with the army.

Habinak's 10 year sentence stirred criticism in congress because of its severity, and the department acted with unusual speed in reviewing the court's action.

GIRL EDITOR ON POLITICAL SPOT

Valsetz, Aug. 26.—(P)—Dorothy Anne Hobson, youthful editor of the Valsetz Star, is in a dilemma.

The 13-year-old girl told her 800 subscribers in the August issue of the publication, out today.

"If Secretary of State Earl Snell runs for governor of Oregon against Governor Sprague, we won't know what to do."

"They are both Republicans and both very friendly to us. We have received several letters from Governor Sprague and once at Senator McNary's nomination luncheon at Fir Cone we had our picture taken with him, but every Christmas for four years we have received a

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letter from Secretary of State Earl Snell saying how much he enjoyed the Star, and then in April this year he came to Valsetz and shook hands with everybody and smiled at mother."

VICHY IRKED BY ANTI-NAZI ACTS

Vichy, Unoccupied France, Aug. 26.—(P)—All ranking German and French police authorities of German-occupied Paris were reported today to have discussed measures for the repression of anti-Nazi disorders at a meeting in the former capital yesterday.

Interior Minister Pierre Pucheu was busy arranging with occupying officials the means to apply the latest decree against anarchists and communists, who are to be tried by court-martial in the occupied zone and by a special appeal court in unoccupied territory.
