PRICE CEILINGS WORRY CANNERS

New York, Aug. 26.—(P)—Talk of federal price ceilings on some foodstuffs, particularly canned goods, occupied wholesale food markets today.

Unconfirmed reports that a price order had been written that would put a ceiling of \$2.50 a case on Cohoes salmon touched off the discussion.

The trade also heard what it thought might be a sample of the way the government planned to fill its needs for canned goods.

Alaska salmon packers were told, according to dealers, that the government would require 1,000,000 cases of specified sizes of cans. Packers were warned, the report said, not to evade the order partially by packing an abnormal number of cans of other sizes and claiming to be unable to furnish the required amount.
