Something New in Fritters
Enough for Four
(Luncheon, Dinner or Supper Menu)
Corn Cheese Fritters
Mushroom (or Ham) Sauce
Savory Hot Onions
Stuffed Tomato Salad
Bread Currant Jam
Fruit Peaks Coffee

Corn Cheese Fritters
1 cup flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
1 egg (or 2 yolks), beaten
2 tablespoons fat, melted
1 cup fresh corn
1/3 cup grated cheese
1/3 cup milk
Mix ingredients and beat thoroughly. Drop portions from tablespoon into deep hot fat and fry 3 minutes or until well browned. Drain and serve hot with mushroom sauce.

Stuffed Tomato Salad
4 large firm tomatoes
1 cup cooked green beans
1/2 cup diced cucumber
3 tablespoons chopped onions
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons French dressing
4 tablespoons mayonnaise
Wash, peel and remove centers from tomatoes. Mix beans, cucumber, onions and French dressing. Chill and stuff tomatoes, place in crisp lettuce cups and top with mayonnaise.

Fruit Peaks
4 round angel food cakes
4 halves peaches
1 pint vanilla ice cream
1/4 cup blueberries
3 tablespoons sugar
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
Place cake on serving dishes and cover with peaches. Top with ice cream and sprinkle with rest of ingredients, combined.

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30 PRIZES TO BE GIVEN GOLFERS IN COMING TOURNEY

The champion won't be the only golfer receiving a tangible reward for a high finish in the 13th annual southern Oregon-northern California amateur tournament at the Rogue Valley club starting Friday with 18-hole qualifying rounds and continuing through Monday, Labor day.

A total of 30 handsome prizes will be awarded the winners and runners-up in all flights, including the consolation, and officials of the club say the array of awards is the finest ever. Beautiful trophies will be given the runner-up in the championship flight and to all other flight winners, while prizes of various sorts will be distributed to the runners-up in all flights and to the winners of the consolation flights.

The tournament champion will have his name engraved on the title trophy and will obtain possession of it for one year, and in addition will receive a medal. There will also be a trophy for the medalist in qualifying rounds, and prizes for the driving contest.

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IRISH MONKS BUILT NEW ENGLAND STONE VILLAGE, IS BELIEF

North Salem, N. H. (AP)—There are indications that Irish monks lived here as early as 800 A.D.

Several archaeologists believe that a "stone village," recently excavated, was built more than 1,000 years ago by Cudee monks who came from Ireland to escape the persecution of Norsemen.

Archaeologist William B. Goodwin of Hartford, Conn., is convinced of the Irish origin of the ruins. They consist of a cluster of stone houses, altars and walls built around a central plaza.

Bands of Cudees first appeared in Iceland in 795. They built their stone houses on Papey Island, where ruins similar to those of this community still stand.

According to historians, the migration from Ireland to New England shores via Iceland and Greenland is logical since both Irish and Welsh have legends of the discovery of a continent far to the westward.

So far no human skeletons, tools or weapons have been found. There is no clew as to what became of the builders if they were Cudee monks. They may have been wiped out by Indians or sailed back to their native land. Meanwhile, the stone village attracts school classes and archeology students.
