Billy Hulen Says:

Webfoots Rated
Grid Toga Threat

Take the word of Doug Montell, the Associated Oil company's nice-voiced sportscaster, Tex Oliver's University of Oregon Webfoots will be right up there battling for the Pacific Coast conference football championship this autumn.

Montell, who has been making a survey of the grid prospects of Oregon and Washington schools the past two weeks, not only believes the Ducks will be in the first division, but claims they actually have a fair chance to capture the crown.

"If they can get over that Stanford opener September 27 at Palo Alto," Montell predicted, "they will go into the Washington game at Seattle November 22 for what I believe will be the title contest."

The ace sports announcer, who spoke at the Lions club meeting Wednesday night and at the 20-30 club Tuesday eve, didn't predict the Webfoots would knock over the T-formations, defending champs, but he did say such an occurrence was entirely within the realm of possibility.

"Sure, Stanford will be terrible again this season, probably even more so than last year, for they lose only Stand-lee and Gallarneau from the backfield and one lineman, but that Oregon eleven looks awfully good to me and I give them more than a fighting chance to pull the big upset," Montell stated.

"Stanford might just possibly be over-confident," he hazarded, "and if Oliver sends his club out there to take chances and gamble all the way they can win, in my opinion."

Talking to Oliver, Montell learned that the Ducks would probably open against the Indians with 10 lettermen and only one soph in the starting lineup. "Tex wasn't a bit cagey when I asked him for a tentative starting club," Montell explained. "He said 'sure,' and gave it to me like this:

"Hyman Harris and Bill Regner, ends; Ed Moshofsky and Dick Ashcom, tackles; Ray Seagle and Val Culwell, guards; Elliott Wilson, center; Chris Iverson, quarterback; Frank Boyd, left half; Curt Mecham, right half and Bill Dunlap, the soph, at fullback. Jimmy Newquist, the 1940 frosh sensation, is also due to see plenty of service at fullback. Tex told me."

Montell rated Oregon and Washington the best of the northern teams. The Huskies, he said, looked great on paper, and he predicted that if Stanford was beaten this season it would be either the Webfoots or the Huskies who would turn the trick. Oregon State and Washington State didn't greatly impress the sportscaster.

Of the southern eleven, Stanford, of course, was placed first in Montell's future book, with probably Southern California next, followed by California and U. C. L. A. He looks for Santa Clara to come up with its usual fine club and St. Mary's to be fair, though not nearly so powerful as the Broncos.

Returning to the subject of the Olivemen, Montell was impressed by the fact that it will be an older team than usual, with most of the players over 21 and therefore not eligible for the draft. On the other hand, he said, the Trojans had many players under 21 who might be inducted into the army with the resultant weakening of the squad.

Estimated 120 Golfers to Fire Qualifying Rounds Friday

MATCH PLAY IN ANNUAL TOURNEY OPENS SATURDAY

Many Out-of-Town Entrants To Compete—Predict 82's Will Qualify.

Bristling with low-handicap players, including several capable of administering a sound thrashing to Old Man Par, a field expected to reach approximately 120 will toil over the Rogue Valley Golf club's sweeping fairways and velvet greens all day Friday in 18-hole qualifying rounds for the 13th annual Southern Oregon-Northern California amateur classic. Match play in all flights will start Saturday and continue through Monday, Labor day.

Although several local entrants in the blue-ribbon tournament plan to fire their qualifying rounds today, the bulk of what looks like the strongest field in the history of the event will tee off tomorrow. Club officials say everything is in readiness for the year's climax tourney, with the course in excellent condition and clubhouse facilities arranged to provide everything necessary to the many out-of-town and local shot-makers entered.

Observers predicted that it would take an 82 to qualify for the championship flight, to consist of the 32 low scorers. The qualifying line broke off at 83 last year, with all 82's and under getting into the title flight and several 83's qualifying after playoffs. Following the first round of match play, the beaten 16 in the championship flight will make up the first flight. All other flights will consist of 16 players.

Hanen To Qualify
Although defending champion Dick Hanen of Marshfield and other former champions are automatically placed in the championship flight and do not have to qualify, they plan to shoot qualifying rounds in quest of medalist honors. Last year Eddie Simmons of Medford, four-time tourney winner, and Lucian Clement tied for the medal prize with 89's, one under par, but the latter was awarded the prize on the flip of a coin. Clement is no longer a resident of Medford and will not compete in the tournament.

In the 1940 tourney 58 out-of-town golfers from as far north as Seattle and as far south as San Francisco competed against local entrants, and club officials expect at least that many will again be on hand for the event.

Leading the visiting contingent, of course, will be Dick Hanen, who defeated Simmons in the championship match last year. Forrest Watson, former northwest amateur champion and a one-handicap player, is expected to come here from Seattle for the tournament, and another fine out-of-town swinger planning to compete is Cy Donaldson of San Francisco, another one-handicap man. Several other high-ranking stars from northern California, Washington and other parts of Oregon will start arriving today.

Locals Threats
Carrying the championship hopes of Medford are Simmons, Leland (Pete) Clark, finalist in 1939 and always a dangerous threat, though he has never managed to win the meet, and Bob Hammond, champion in 1929 and 1931. Simmons and

Clark have been playing excellent golf all summer, but Hammond has been playing only occasionally of late and might not be in his best form. In a practice round Wednesday Clark shot a 73.

Eighteen-hole match play will start early Saturday morning in all flights, with the finals in all flights to be played Monday. The championship finals will be of 36 holes, the others of 18.

Officially entering the tournament yesterday were J. F. Brady of San Francisco, Alva Merritt and Gene Green, both of Roseburg; and F. E. Nichols, Herb Burnham, Harold Frye, Jr., Bill Caty and Simmons, all of Medford. Ray Babb of Corvallis, a possible contender for the crown, arrived here yesterday and has fired several practice rounds.

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UPSETS FEATURE SECOND ROUND OF AMATEUR TOURNEY

Bud Ward Lone Ex-Champion Remaining in Field—Jennings Wins Couple.

Omaha, Neb., Aug. 28. (P)—The "old guard" of amateur golf—its ranks thinned by the charge of an amazing longshot legion—dug in for a last ditch fight in the national amateur championship today.

As the 45th classic swung into third round and quarter-final engagements, gone from the Field club's divot-scarred battleground were such greats as Dick Chapman, Johnny Goodman, Johnny Fischer, ex-champions all, and genial Charley Yates who took the last British amateur title.

Valiantly carrying on for the favorites' cause against mounting odds were such standouts as former titleholder and current favorite Marvin (Bud) Ward, Harry Todd, Pat Abbott and Ray Billows. But lined up against them was a youthful brigade of brash and comparatively little known challengers—Bob Riege, Neil White, Skee Riegel and Lou Jennings, to mention only a few.

Ward, stout-hearted Spokane star who won this championship in 1939, blazed his way to two triumphs yesterday to become the only ex-titleholder still in the running. With a performance bulwarking his position as favorite, Ward downed Alex Welsh of Rockford, Ill., 7 and 6, then whipped Otto Greiner of Baltimore, 2 and 1.

Billows Victor
Billows, twice a finalist in this event in the past four years, defeated Art Atkinson of New York, 4 and 3. Then the Poughkeepsie star won, 4 and 3, from Lloyd Ramsey of Lexington, Ky. Todd took a 4 and 3 win over Jim Lewis of Toledo then won eight of 10 holes to trim Matt Zadales of Rialto, Neb., 9 and 8. His opponent this morning was Abbott, who had to travel the full 18 holes to oust Johnny Vavra, Cedar Rapids, Ia., then defeated Wilford Wehrle of Chicago, semi-finalist, last year, 3 and 2.

BEARS TO BATTLE STARS THIS EVE

Chicago, Aug. 28. (P)—This is the night the Chicago Bears find out what kind of business they can do with Tom Harmon and company.

It's the eighth annual battle of college all-stars and professional football champions in Soldier field. All 93,200 tickets have been sold and 5,000 service men will be admitted free to the game and the colorful ceremonies beforehand.

The Bears are seeking to make it three victories in a row for the pros over the stars, the New York Giants having taken the 1939 game, 9 to 0, and the Green Bay Packers the 1940 contest, 45 to 28.

Against the all-stars will be arrayed virtually the same squad of Bears that mowed down the Washington Redskins, 73 to 0, last year in the championship pro game, and presenting the same "T" formation on which Owner-Coach George Halas has developed a variety of man-in-motion plays.

The Bears will go on the field the favorites at odds of possibly 3½ to 1.

The desperate hopes of the Cincinnati Reds for a miracle that would return them to a third straight world series have been engulfed in the slow tide that seems to be carrying the Brooklyn Dodgers on its crest.

They had their best and perhaps last chance to break into the thick of the National league pennant scramble last night and failed, as Kirby Higbee whipped Johnny Vander Meer 4-2 before 30,000 fans at Ebbets field.

The St. Louis Cardinals beat the New York Giants in another night game, 8-5.

In the other National league games Pittsburgh walloped the Phillies 12-2 with a 21-hit bombardment, and the Chicago Cubs divided a doubleheader with the Boston Braves. Manny Salvo shut out the Cubs 6-0 on five hits in the opener and then Charley Root pitched 8 2-3 innings in relief to win the second session 6-4 and gain the 200th victory of his 16-year career.

The New York Yankees added another game to their immense American league lead by overwhelming the St. Louis Browns 11-1 in a night game.

The last place Washington Senators crushed the second place Chicago White Sox, 11-3. Lefty Grove pulled a muscle in his side, possibly meaning his loss for the season as the Boston Red Sox dropped a 6-3 verdict to the Detroit Tigers.

Jeff Heath drove in seven runs with two homers and a triple as the Cleveland Indians assaulted the Athletics, 11-4.

Silverton Here Sunday for Second-Half Playoff Game

The Medford Craters and the Silverton Red Sox will battle it out for the Oregon State league's second-half championship at the fairgrounds park at 2:30 p. m. Sunday, and there is a possibility that the same two clubs will clash Monday afternoon, Labor day, for the 1941 league pennant.

Ray Brooks, loop secretary, notified Crater Manager Lou Sauer last night that Silverton and Albany, who tied for the first-half flag, will stage their playoff Friday night at Albany. In case Silverton beats Albany for the first-half title, and Medford trims Silverton Sunday for the second-half crown, then Silverton and Medford will tangle here Monday afternoon for the season's championship.
