FLYING ATTEMPT OF SERGEANT IS COSTLY DISASTER

Manila, Aug. 28.—(P)—An army staff sergeant who had never flown a plane tried to make an unauthorized flight in an army bomber at Nichols field today and, in the subsequent crash, two Filipinos were killed and the plane was wrecked.

Three other Filipinos and the sergeant, William B. Rowland, were injured when the big Martin bomber stalled just after taking the air. It crashed amid four native huts in which Filipino laborers at the field near Manila were living.

Army officers said Sergeant Rowland, whose home town is Natchez, Miss., had been in charge of a ground crew detailed to service planes. They said he knew all about the mechanism of planes but couldn't fly them.

Just before dawn he came to the field and induced men on duty there to open a hangar and roll out the bomber. On the runway, he warmed up the motors, army authorities said, and suddenly took off. The accident apparently was caused by his trying to climb too steeply.

Col. Lawrence Churchill, Nichols field commandant, ordered an investigation of all incidents leading to the attempted unauthorized flight and crash.

Rowland emerged from the accident with a fractured jaw and cut face but his injuries were not regarded as dangerous. A former cavalryman, Rowland, who is 32, transferred to the air corps in 1935 and has been in the Philippines since July, 1940.

ROSSI SEEKS END OF HOTEL STRIKE

San Francisco, Aug. 28.—(P)—Mayor Angelo Rossi sought to bring negotiators together today in a last minute attempt to avert a strike against the city 33 biggest hotels, called for 9:25 p. m. tonight.

The AFL Culinary Workers and Bartenders union, after six ineffectual meetings held at the mayor's request, gave formal notice of strike last night.

The two sides were unagreed on several points, chief of which was the union's demand for 100 per cent closed shop and hiring hall. No agreement had been reached on wages, the work week and the "split shift" question.

William McCabe, president of the union's joint executive board, announced negotiations had been broken off. "The hotel operators were even unwilling to continue conditions we now have in the hotels," he said.

A spokesman for the Hotel Employers' association said the hotel men were insistent that "some small measure of control" in the matter of hiring must be maintained.

AXIS WILL SEEK USE BLACK SEA'S WATER TURK TOLD

Istanbul, Turkey, Aug. 28.—(Delayed)—(P)—Well informed axis quarters today said Adolf Hitler has warned Turkey that he may soon need to use Turkish territorial waters in the Black sea but has assured the Turks that he has no other demands.

This source said one Turkish ambassador to Germany, Husrev Gerede, was asked to transmit this information to his government during an interview with Hitler and German Foreign Minister Von Ribbentrop at the fuhrer's eastern front headquarters.

This report said Germany has no intention of asking Turkey for concessions concerning the Dardanelles or other Turkish territory, nor will she ask for permission for German troops and war supplies to cross the country.

The use of Black sea waters may be demanded, however, if and when German forces reach the eastern extremity of the Black sea in their Russian drive. The extent that the Germans might then seek to use Turkish waters was not stated.

TAX REFERENDUM EXPENSE RULING

Salem, Aug. 28.—(P)—The secretary of state has no power to question expense statements filed by sponsors of the referendum against the two-cent per package cigarette tax bill, the attorney general ruled today in an opinion for Secretary of State Earl Snell.

The referendum against the measure was successful, placing the bill on the ballot at the general election next year.

Sponsors of the bill had questioned the expense statements which were filed by the referendum sponsors, but the attorney general said that Snell "has no duty or power to investigate the facts behind a sponsor's statement."

The referendum sponsors were the Grocers and Merchants association and the State Retail Grocers association.

M. Spoon said today. The three women in the jury list of 96 have taken advantage of the law allowing women exemption from jury duty. Miller now is held at the Chelan county jail, Wenatchee.
