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Iran Promises All Season Route



Black arrows show German penetration of the Soviet Ukraine; shaded areas indicate direction of Russian and British drives into Iran. The Russians said their Cossacks had reached half-way from the border to Tabriz, Iran's second-largest city. Russian forces also were heading for Ardebil on the west shore of the Caspian sea. The Russians also had a force on the east shore. The rail terminus of Bandar Shah would be one of their objectives. The British disclosed that they had occupied oil installations just inside Iran, about 80 miles northeast of Baghdad and that the air force and the navy had seized the Persian gulf port of Bandar Shapur and nearby Abadan, seizing axis ships. Conquest of Iran would provide an all-season supply route to Russia from Egypt and the gulf.

BRITISH CURB ON SOMALILAND FIRM REPORT OF VICHY

Vichy, Unoccupied France, Aug. 28.—(P)—The Jibuti radio announced today that four British warships and a flotilla of armed launches and planes have established control over French Somaliland territorial waters.

The speaker said the situation had reached a dramatic point with all French blockade-running launches stopped and their cargoes dumped overboard or seized.

British ships have not left territorial waters of the French east African colony for 10 days, the broadcast said.

It reported that Jibuti, the chief port of French Somaliland and the Gulf of Aden terminus of the railroad to Addis Ababa, has been cut off from Turbia, in the tiny French possession of Sheikh-Said across the gulf on the Arabian shore, and the nearby British-controlled Perim island on which it is dependent for its water supply.

The French Somaliland governor was said to have made another formal protest against the British blockade Monday.

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EAST GAS SUPPLY CUT NEXT MONTH DUE TO SHORTAGE

Washington, Aug. 28.—(P)—Ralph K. Davies, acting petroleum coordinator, announced today that gasoline supplies for filling stations in the east would be reduced 15 per cent in September compared with July.

Davies' testimony opened a senate investigation of threatened oil shortages. He presented a mass of figures which he said showed that the eastern coast faced actual shortage of both gasoline and oil for heating and industry this winter.

The east coast faced a deficit of 27,800,000 barrels of petroleum products during the last four months of this year, Davies testified. He said the reduction in gasoline supplies to filling stations would help meet this shortage.

If present methods fail to eliminate danger of shutdowns for industry and home heating plants, Davies said officials were ready to operate a rigid rationing plan. But he added they hoped to avoid such drastic action.

Davies flatly disputed rumors he said had been circulated that the shortage "is being played up to foster war psychology; that a shortage has been created artificially to assure passage of a pipeline bill" or that a shortage of gasoline "was deliberately precipitated."

PLUNGE OFF BANK INJURES YOUTHS

Ted Smith, 19, and Junior Driscoll, 18, were confined in Sacred Heart hospital today with injuries they suffered when the car in which they were riding plunged over a 25-foot embankment a quarter of a mile

east of Butte Falls on the Butte Falls-Prospect road about 10 p. m. Wednesday. Smith suffered a fractured right leg and Driscoll minor lacerations and bruises. Neither was seriously hurt, the hospital reported.

According to the Rogue River National Forest service, the car was driven by Douglas Jones, also a young Butte Falls boy, who escaped injury. Another youth in the car also was not hurt in the wreck.

The boys, it was reported, were returning to Butte Falls from CCC camp South Fork, where they had showed movies to the enrollees. The car, a Ford roadster with a bed in back, went over the grade and struck the Medford Corporation rail road tracks below. The two injured youths were reported to have been riding in the back end of the car, which was damaged considerably.
