KING'S COUSIN IN
CHARGE BLASTED
BRITISH CARRIER

Aboard H. M. S. Illustrious, Aug. 28.—(P)—Captain Lord Louis Mountbatten, cousin of King George VI of England and one of Great Britain's most distinguished naval officers, formally took command of the aircraft carrier Illustrious, undergoing repairs, this morning.

Captain Mountbatten, who has had two ships of his command sunk, succeeds Captain G. Seymour Tuck, D.S.O.

His first official duty was an inspection of the marine guard of honor, after which he was presented to the ship's officer and then to Lieut. Comdr. Robert Vining, public relations officer for the fifth naval district, and his staff of officers.

Captain Mountbatten made an informal talk to the ship's officers and men. The press was asked not to quote his remarks. Today was the first time that newspaper and newsreel men were permitted aboard the Illustrious since it was damaged last January in a seven-hour attack by Nazi planes in the Mediterranean.

Captain Mountbatten, accompanied by Lady Mountbatten, arrived recently in America by clipper. The British press service announced a number of days ago the famous aircraft carrier Illustrious was in an American shipyard undergoing repairs, and that Captain Mountbatten would command the ship and supervise the work on repairing.

The announcement that the 23,000-ton vessel was in an American shipyard did not disclose the ship's exact whereabouts. Last June the British admiral-
