

Golfers Stream to First Tee to Qualify for Four-Day Tournament

HOBART M. PRICE SHOOT NICE 73 FOR EARLY LEAD

Cy Donaldson, California Ace, Fires 35 On Practice Round—Hanan Arrives.

Fourteen more out-of-town shotmakers, including Jim Johnson, a one-handicap player from the Eugene Country club, checked in at the Rogue Valley clubhouse late this morning and prepared to shoot their qualifying rounds this afternoon. Registering were S. F. Baum, Fred Sneed and M. M. Burton, all of Redding, Cal.; George Rasmussen of Los Angeles, Robert E. Kelly of Roseburg, G. F. Heath of Longview, Wash., A. D. Johnson and Howard Scroggins, both of Klamath Falls, J. C. Hanan of Marshfield, father of Defending Champion Dick Hanan; Dr. Harry A. Woods, I. C. Irwin and Dom Provost, Sr., all of Ashland, and Edward C. Kelly of Portland. A late local entry was Ike Staples.

A steady stream of golfers from near and far were trudging to the first tee at the Rogue Valley Golf club today for their 18-hole qualifying rounds in the 13th annual Southern Oregon-Northern California amateur tournament, and club officials estimated that over 120 entrants would be ready for the start of match play Saturday morning. Finals in all flights will be held Monday.

Snatching the early lead in the battle for medalist honors was husky Hobart M. Price of Medford, who toured the 18-hole layout this week in 73, three under par. Twenty other swingers shot their qualifying rounds yesterday, but the only one carding a score expected to be good enough for the championship flight was Medford's Jack Creager, whose 77 virtually assured him of a berth in the 32-man title flight. Other scores ranged upward to 98.

Great Field
The aces, the low-handicap players from San Francisco, Seattle, Portland, Corvallis, Medford and other points, all were to fire their qualifying rounds today as the out-of-town entrants started to pour into town to make up the toughest field in the 13-year history of the classic. Dick Hanan of Marshfield, defending champ, arrived this morning.

Projecting himself definitely into the championship picture was sweet-swinging young Cy Donaldson of San Francisco's Lakeside Country club. Arriving in Medford yesterday afternoon, Donaldson set the railbirds on their ears by taking the first nine holes apart with a brilliant 35, one under par, and this on his first visit to the local course. It was only a practice round, but those who saw the Californian uncover a terrific iron game and a magic putter predicted he would be in there battling for the title. A one-handicap player, Donaldson will officially qualify today.

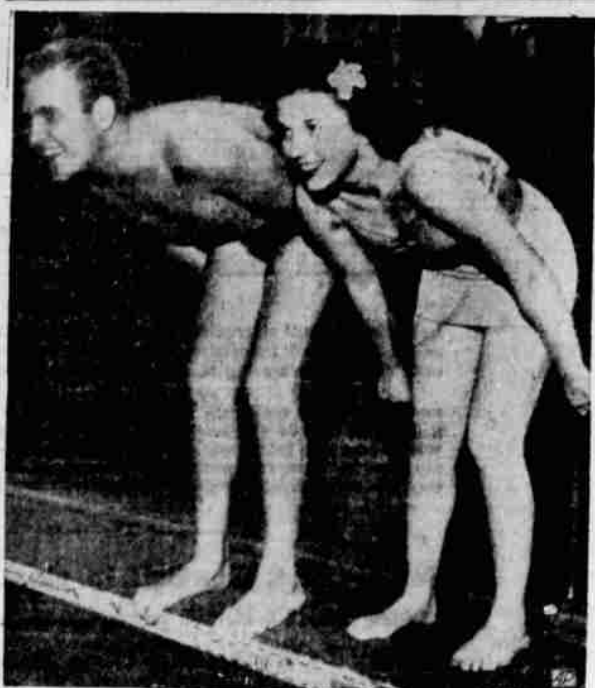
Clement To Compete
Lucian Clement of Portland, formerly of Medford and last year's medalist with a 69, sent word that he had decided at the last minute to enter the tournament, and added that he would arrive here Saturday morning. He will be seeded into the championship flight without having to qualify. Clement also reported that Hubert B. Bentley of Ashland, twice winner of the tourney but now in the army at Ft. Lewis, planned to enter the tournament if he could arrange to do so. Bentley, because he is a former champion, will not have to qualify.

Two other top-ranking golfers who may arrive here this afternoon to enter the meet are Ray Weston of Portland's Peninsula club and Allan McAllister of Portland's Lake Oswego club. Both are among the northwest's finest amateurs.

Lieber and Monzo to Oppose Silverton in Title Series

Bolstered by the importation from Oakland, Cal., of Carl Monzo, the righthanded pitcher who has been listed on the Crater's roster ever since he lost that heart-breaking 4 to 2 tilt to Albany in the season's opener here May 10, the Medford ball club will play host to the powerful Silverton Red Sox in a two-game series Sunday and Monday afternoons, the first game of which will determine the Oregon State League's second half championship. Both clashes will start at 2:30 sharp.

There is a possibility that Monday's game will decide the loop's 1941 pennant, for if Silverton trims Albany tonight in their battle for the first-half crown, and Medford in turn hurdles Silverton in their Sunday fracas, then the Monday contest will be for the season's championship. Silverton and Albany tied for the first-half flag, Silverton and Medford for the second-half crown. However, if Albany nips Silverton tonight, the winner of the Medford-Silverton second-half play-off game Sunday will face the Oaks the next week-end for the league gonfalon.

Monzo, whose only appearance here this season resulted in his turning in a five-hit, seven-strikeout performance only to lose in 11 innings to Albany in the season's inaugural, will fling the Monday game against Silverton. Manager Lou Sauer announced. On the rubber in the second-half title game Sunday will be Big Dutch Lieber, whose record of seven wins and two defeats in league action was largely responsible for the Craters' deadlocking Silverton for the second-half flag.

Going against the Craters will be two of the following three pitchers—Southpaws Jack Richards and Cal McIlvinn, and Righthander Earl Toolson. McIlvinn, the sensational high school youngster, blanked the locals 11 to 0 on three hits last Saturday night at Silverton in a first-half makeup game that enabled the Red Sox to tie Albany for the first-half pennant.

Both clubs will be at full strength for the series. The Craters will have Frank Roelandt catching, Al Fleishman on first, Cliff McLean on second, Del Schroer on short, Bob Churchill on third, Al Wray in left, Manager Sauer in center and Dick Kohler in right. Jack Brown and Bill Smith will be available for relief pitching jobs.

The Red Sox, state semi-pro champions, will take the field with Jimmy Robertson catching, Ken Manning on first, Johnny Granato on second, Al Kretchmar on short, Lee Shinn on third, Bill Carney in left, Dick Whitman in center and Orren or Jack Richards in right.

The last time the Red Sox appeared here, July 26 and 27, the Craters copped the league tilt, 7 to 0, on Lieber's six-hitter, while the visitors won the exhibition fray, 7 to 6, behind Jack Richards.

The week-end series will probably mark the last baseball to be played here this year, as the Craters are due to disband shortly so that players can return to their respective schools.

Omaha, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The boys in the field club's locker rooms will tell you that Marvin (Bud) Ward, the curly-haired husky from the far west, is heading toward another national amateur golf championship.

Betting Bud, a hard-hitting shooter with the finesse of a professional was rated tops in the semi-final field which battled down the Field club's narrow, trouble dotted fairways in 36-hole matches today.

Bud's semi-final foe was the almost fragile appearing Bobby Riegel, a young man from Houston (Tex.) and those same guys downstairs named Ward to advance to the championship final against the winner of the match between good-looking Pat Abbott, the former movie extra, and tall Ted Bishop, the Bostonian.

Ward came into the semi-final round with a convincing 5 and 4 decision over little Steve Kovach, the popular Pennsylvania kid who couldn't match Bud's skill on the second nine of their quarter-final round. Ward's third round foe, Glenn Outman of Kansas City, went down, 3 and 1.

BEARS TROUNCE STARS, 37 TO 13; LUCKMAN STARS

Chicago, Aug. 29.—(AP)—From the latest available evidence, it's going to take a lot of blasting to jar Chicago's professional football champion Bears loose from their National league honors.

The evidence was presented last night at historic Soldier field before a series record throng of 98,200 who saw the Bears, led by brilliant Sid Luckman, crush a battling squad of the headline Stars of 1940 College football, 37 to 13, in the Chicago Tribune's eight annual all-star spectacle.

Luckman, whose passing and leadership were at concert pitch, fired a touchdown pass to Ken Kavanaugh in the first quarter, another to George McAfee in the fourth, one to Kavanaugh which set up another score, along with completing numerous others.

Clark scored twice from close range and Bob Nowaskey accounted for the other Bear touchdown on a pass from young Bussey. Lee Artie, the Bears' star sophomore tackle, provided the other three points with a spectacular 46-yard place kick.

The all-Stars' big moments of glory came in the first period when Harmon whipped a pass to Franck for a score tying touchdown, and in the final quarter when Charlie O'Rourke, the little fellow from Boston college, shot a handsome 40-yard pass to Jackie Robinson, negro star from U. C. L. A., who ran six yards for the other touchdown.
