METAL TRAINEES LEAVE FOR JOBS IN BOEING PLANT

Due to report for work at the Boeing Aircraft company next Tuesday morning, 14 local trainees of the aviation sheet metal classes being conducted at the senior high school planned to leave for Seattle today and tomorrow, bringing to 43 the number of youths who have obtained employment at Boeing through their schooling in the government classes here. In addition, 21 others have been employed by the Lockheed Aircraft company at Burbank, Cal.

E. H. Hedrick, city school superintendent, said that several boys were passed up in this latest call from Boeing because they had no birth certificates, although they were eligible in every other respect. He emphasized that all trainees must obtain birth certificates in order to secure employment at Boeing and other aircraft plants.

There are new openings in the aviation sheet metal classes, conducted by Scott Brill, veteran sheet-metal worker, and all youths interested are asked to contact Hedrick in the city hall or Lewis Ulrich and the employment office, 45 North Fir street. The classes are free, and offer youths the opportunity to learn a fine trade that virtually assures them of immediate employment following completion of the course.

FIND LOST LADY HUNGRY, CHILLED UP ALDER TREE

Weak from hunger and somewhat hysterical from the ordeal she had been through, Mrs. Jane Knott, 37, Klamath Falls, was found by searchers late last night in an alder tree several miles from her camp at Huckleberry mountain where she had been picking berries and from where she had been missing since 5 p. m. Wednesday.

Mrs. Knott was found 15 feet up in the tree at 11 p. m. by Clyde Onn. Rogue River national forest fire guard at the Huckleberry station, and Theron Gleason, guard at the Union Creek station, who had followed on from footprints and received an answer to their calls which they shouted intermittently. Irrational from her experience, Mrs. Knott asked the guards to shoot the six bears at the base of the tree before helping her down. The men convinced her that they had dispersed the bears, which she had imagined chased her up the tree, and then they helped her down. It was feared that in a short time more she would have fallen out of the tree.

Mrs. Knott's physical condition was described as fairly good excepting that she was tired, stiff and cold and slightly hysterical. Others of the large searching party were called and Mrs. Knott was given orange juice to drink. Mrs. Knott was helped to walk the five miles to the end of the Mill Creek trail where a rescue truck was waiting. The truck being reached at 6 o'clock this morning. She was taken to the Union Creek ranger station, reached at 7 a. m. There her husband and son, Leland, met her. After she had breakfast, Mrs. Knott was taken back to her Huckleberry mountain camp to get her camping supplies and equipment and from there the family planned to continue home.
