RIGHT HAND MAN OF DARLAN 'FIRED'

Vichy, Unoccupied France, Sept. 1.—(P)—Vice Premier Jean Darlan, in his capacity as navy minister, shook up the French naval high command today, removing his longtime collaborator, Admiral Leluc, as commander-in-chief.

In his place he named Rear Admiral Auphan, the youngest admiral in the navy, and appointed him also as director of the naval ministry secretariat. There was no explanation of the change in political circles where Leluc had been known in the past as Darlan's right-hand man.

Leluc, who flew to a meeting place behind the German lines to receive Adolf Hitler's peace terms in June, 1941, recently was named a councillor of state. Auphan is widely regarded as one of the brightest young officers in the French navy. Before he was given his new, combined job he was charged by Darlan with reorganizing the war-depleted French merchant marine.

VIOLENT DEATHS IN OREGON OVER WEEK-END, FOUR

Portland, Ore., Sept. 1.—(P)—Violent deaths in Oregon's Labor day week-end increased to four yesterday (Sunday) with a drowning in Portland and an automobile collision on the Wolf creek highway.

The body of Eugene Barnett Serville, about 50, Portland, was recovered from the Willamette river. A coroner's deputy said the man had been in the water two hours.

The Wolf creek crash, three miles east of the Clatsop county line, killed Thomas Bailey Windham, 19, Astoria, and seriously injured Mary Hasbrouck, 19, Westport, and Richard Foster, 19, Astoria. The car careened down a 200-foot embankment after colliding with a machine driven by Carl Donald Hovlin, Portland.

Mrs. Frank Sheehan, Lakeview, was fatally injured in an automobile accident in the Crooked creek district of Lake county Saturday night. Her car skidded off the road in loose gravel, injuring her sister, Mrs. Wayne Alger, but sparing Mrs. Alger's eight-month-old child. Surviving Mrs. Sheehan are the widow; a son, Lieut. Chas. Bogner, Fort Sill, Okla., and a daughter, Mrs. May Hammick, Medford.

A Portland woman was killed by a car Friday night, the beginning of the long week-end. About 200,000 tons of rubber is produced from scrap each year.
