STATE FAIR HAS CROWD OF 28,142

Salem, Sept. 2.—(AP)—An opening day crowd of 28,142, or 7,898 less than last year's first day, attended the state fair yesterday, despite the heaviest opening day rain in many years. Hundreds of automobiles were mired in the mud of the parking lots, fair officials using show horses to pull them out.

Today was the special day for Townsend club members and realtors.

SOLDIERS, NURSES ARRIVE IN BRITAIN

London, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Twenty-two Red Cross nurses were among a large group of United States citizens who arrived in Britain today by boat.

The nurses rounded out a staff of 63 for the new Harvard Red Cross hospital at Salisbury. Aboard the same convoy were some 200 United States-born soldiers, including cavalrymen, serving with the Canadian army.

JAPANESE STOCK MARKET FIRMER DUE TO U.S. MOVE

Tokyo, Sept. 2.—(AP)—The British-Russian success in Iran and reports here that the United States will send most of its aid to Russia by way of the Middle East instead of Vladivostok gave the Japanese stock market a stronger tone today.

Shipping stocks were particularly strong on the report that the United States might avoid offending Japanese feelings by sending Russian aid through nearby waters to Vladivostok.

On the conciliatory side, too, was "an open letter to Foreign Minister Toyoda" by Retsu Kiyosawa, commentator in the widely read commercial paper Chugai Shogyo.

He urged that Japan return to the diplomacy of the past when Japan was more open to bargaining. In recent years Japan's uncompromising diplomacy, which has been marked by insistence upon an "immutable policy" in East Asia, has tended to convert friends abroad into enemies, Kiyosawa said. He urged Toyoda to try to regain friends abroad.

The militaristic daily, Kokumin, however, declared that "the European war which extended to Iran, is now threatening to involve the prosperity sphere" of Japan. Kokumin contended that Japan must bolster her total war structure and continue to pursue the immutable policy based on the tri-power pact and Japan's ambitions for a Japanese new order in East Asia.

Kiyosawa cautioned his countrymen against expecting an end soon to the European conflict although he said Germany had conquered a territory more than three times as large as Japan. The newspapers Kokumin and Hochi, meanwhile, purported to see political motives in the British nationals. They said Britain thus again was bringing up rumors of dangers in East Asia.

'WAR OF NERVES' UNION STRATEGY IN HOTEL STRIKE

San Francisco, Sept. 2.—(AP)—AFL union "strategy" in San Francisco's hotel strike appeared to be taking, on some of the aspects of a "war of nerves" today.

Although notice of a walkout was served four days ago on 28 hotels, pickets were in front of the doors of only four of them and the AFL joint executive board of culinary, bartender and service unions declined to reveal its next move. They said this was part of their "strategy."

Word reached the Hotel Employers' association, however, that nothing more would be done until Tuesday.

The unions struck the four hotels Friday afternoon. The issues were the closed shop and hiring hall. The unions said some wage adjustments, too, had not been made—such as their demand for a raise of from \$3.50 to \$4 a day for chambermaids.

BROKER OF PARIS LURED FROM HOME SLAIN IN SUBWAY

Paris, German-occupied France Sept. 2.—(AP)—Adolphe Rosenthal, a well-known Paris stock broker, was found slain today in an underground traffic lane at Porte Maillot, fashionable Paris suburb. His death was attributed to a new outburst of anti-Jewish terror.

Rosenthal was killed by a revolver shot in the temple, fired at close range. Police said he had been spirited away from home by three pretended policemen who said they were going to take him to a concentration camp.

He was a brother of Leonard Rosenthal, world known diamond merchant who now is in the United States. Leonard Rosenthal's transactions in diamonds, pearls and emeralds once reached astronomical figures.

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
