

Black Tornado Grid Squad Leaves for 10-Day Training Camp

LAKE O' WOODS GROUP INCLUDES 37 MEN, COACHES

Five Others Expected To Reach Camp By Next Sunday—2 Transfers Going.

Thirty-seven potential members of the 1941 Medford high school varsity football squad, with Head Coach Bill Bowerman, Assistant Coaches Russ Acheson and Ed Kirtley, and Riney Cook, junior high school grid tutor, left here today for their annual 10-day conditioning camp at Lake O' Woods. The squad will return September 12 and spend a week on the local practice field preparing for the invasion of the West. (Cal.) Cougars the night of September 19 in the season's inaugural.

Listed on the training camp roster, but not leaving with the group today, were Russ Johnson, big 1940 junior high school end; Lowell Flesher, junior high fullback last season; Steve Isaacs, a reserve halfback for last year's Black Tornado, and a pair of husky linemen planning to transfer to Medford high from other schools—Russell Hawk, 190-pound center for the Ashland high Grizzlies in 1940, and Bud Mayfield, a 200-pound tackle from Woodland, Cal. Both players' eligibility has been established, the mentor stated.

Coach Bowerman said he expected these five players to re-join the team by next Sunday, bringing the total number of grid hopefuls to 42. The mentor added that players unable to get to the camp by next Sunday would probably have little chance of making the varsity this year, as the others would be so far advanced in fundamentals as to place the non-attendees at a severe disadvantage when the season gets under way.

Also attending the camp will be Frankie Roelandt, catcher for the baseball Craters and a Portland high school football star who wants to get in shape for the metropolitan interscholastic season. Roelandt has one more year of eligibility.

Most of the time at the camp will be devoted to drills in fundamentals and to conditioning the players, Bowerman said.

Jack Cumming will do the cooking for the squad, and will be assisted by two helpers. There will also be three student managers on hand to take care of equipment and camp details.

Ben Hogan Heads Fine Field In \$11,000 Open Tournament

Chicago, Sept. 3.—(P)—The best field of the year—including, of course, Ben Hogan, leading money winner of 1941—will tee off tomorrow in the richest event of the golfing world, the \$11,000 Tam O'Shanter Country club open tournament, which will end Sunday.

The array of approximately 200 professionals and amateurs included the names of Craig Wood of Mamaroneck, N. Y., national open champion; Vic Ghezzi of Deal, N. J., national professional title-holder; Stewart "Skip" Alexander of Burlington, N. C., medalist in last week's national amateur; Byron Nelson of Toledo, O., and Jimmy Demaret of Noroton, Conn.

More than 100 of those present could be considered satellites, because they were put to no extra effort to compete for the \$2,000 first prize, \$1,400 second money and \$1,000 third. These automatically were qualified on the basis of outstanding performances in the present season or in previous years.

The others, however, put in a busy morning and afternoon yesterday going through the paces of an 18-hole trial round to qualify the 77 best men, plus ties, or 86 in all. Herman Scharlau of Bloomington, Ill., turned in the finest record with a 34-35-69, three under par, with the remaining 85 qualifiers all shooting under 80.

YOUTH VS. AGE IN GRID CLASH

There's the youth vs. age dispute, which seldom turns up on the gridiron, and the long unsettled question as to whether the players whose feats are given the greatest publicity actually are the best.

The All-Stars, of course, feature youth. They're all fellows who ended their college careers last season and most of them are just starting out again as freshmen in the professional game. The Giants, too, have a number of rookies, but they also have veterans such as Mel Hein, a great center who is starting his eleventh pro season, Ed Widseth, Ken Strong, Ed Donowski and Ward Cuff. They'll be matching their skill and experience against the youngsters' speed and strength in an effort to hold their jobs.

HIGBE WINS 19TH AS DODGERS TRIM BOSTON, 9 TO 2

Double By Lew Riggs Features Early Uprising—Charley Root Beats Reds.

There have been a lot of cracks about the Brooklyn Dodgers but so far there have been no cracks in them.

From time to time the Dodgers have looked doddering and their fans have become fearful. The latest occasion of this kind was the past week-end when Brooklyn dropped a doubleheader to the New York Giants and came out of a 21 inning double tussle against the seventh-place Boston Braves with one narrow victory and one tie.

But Brooklyn has a way of making up for these lapses and yesterday the Dodgers overwhelmed the Braves, 9-2, in playing off the tie, just as they slaughtered the Giants, 13-6, on Sunday to cover up the embarrassment caused on Saturday.

Kirby Higbe had one of his powerful days yesterday and achieved his 19th victory.

He did not allow a hit for the first five innings and yielded only a half-dozen in the entire game.

3 in First
Brooklyn bagged three runs in the first inning after loading the bases with one out. A force play accounted for two tallies, with Pete Reiser running a record anchor lap to score from second base while the putout was being made there. Then Lew Riggs doubled the other across.

The Dodgers added four more in the third, knocking Al Javery out of the box with five hits, and finished with two in the seventh off Lamanna.

There was only one other contest in the major leagues, the Chicago Cubs clipping the Cincinnati Reds, 3-1, in a pitching duel between old Charley Root and young Gene (Junior) Thompson.

Thompson allowed just four hits, but two of them, a double by Lou Stringer and a single by Stan Hack, were linked with a walk and a long fly for two runs in the third.

Root held the Reds to five safeties, and the losers got their only run on a walk, a sacrifice and Lloyd Waner's double in the third.

MAJOR CIO UNIT ASKS WAR UNITY
Camden, N. J., Sept. 3.—(P)—With only minor opposition, a major unit of the Congress of Industrial Organization today repudiated the isolationist stand of CIO founder John L. Lewis and called upon President Roosevelt to give speedy aid to nations fighting Hitler.

Formal adoption of a resolution by a 382 to 5 vote followed a statement by officers of the union that "there is no basis for disunity now on the question of supporting every step necessary to crush Hitlerism."

This report the United Electrical, radio and machine workers of America by President James B. Carey, Secretary-treasurer Julius Emspak and Director James J. Battles is not in line with CIO founder John L. Lewis' frequently expressed opposition to President Roosevelt's foreign policy.

The U.E.R.M.W. is the first major CIO branch to meet since Lewis signed the now-famous statement with 14 leading Republican isolationists.

Young Williams Fan Is Rewarded for Long Hike

Boston, Sept. 3.—(P)—Billy Kane's hero is Red Sox slugger Ted Williams—more so today than ever.

Billy, 14-years-old, wanted to see Ted hit a home run, so he set out from his home in South Brewer, Me., on Monday on a 250-mile hitch-hike trip to Fenway park in Boston, eating fruit and berries along the way.

He arrived yesterday and was broken hearted to discover there was no game. He walked into the park behind some workmen and fell asleep in the bleachers.

Two policemen found him there early last night and heard his story. They took him to the police station and telephoned Williams.

The baseball player, just going to bed, dressed again, hurried to the station, put his arm around the boy and told him everything was going to be all right.

Bill spent the night in a rooming house arranged for by police after they provided him with a dinner—and he will be Ted's guest in a box seat at today's game with the New York Yankees.

WORLD SERIES TO OPEN OCTOBER 1 IN YANK STADIUM
New York, Sept. 3.—(P)—Baseball Commissioner Keneaw M. Landis decided today that the 1941 world series would start Wednesday, October 1 in Yankee stadium, and, in mapping out the series schedule, made only one change from past years.

This was that, regardless of which club wins the National league pennant, there will be a one-day lay-off between the sixth and seventh games, if the series goes seven games, to permit a satisfactory sale of tickets.

Judge Landis pointed out that in the past, when a series went seven games and the final game was played the day after the sixth contest, there was not sufficient time to sell enough tickets.

With Presidents Hill Harridge of the American league and Ford Frick of the National league and representatives of the New York Yankees, Brooklyn Dodgers, St. Louis Cardinals and Cincinnati Reds sitting in on the meeting, Judge Landis laid out the following schedule for the series:

Games 1 and 2—Yankee stadium, October 1 and 2.
Games 3, 4 and 5 (if Brooklyn or Cincinnati win the National league pennant), October 3, 4 and 5 in National league ball park.

Games 6 and 7 (if Brooklyn or Cincinnati)—Yankee stadium, October 6 and 8.
If St. Louis win the National league flag, one day will be allowed for traveling between the second and third games and another between the fifth and sixth, putting the third, fourth and fifth contests back to October 4, 5 and 6 the second game back to October 8 and the seventh game to October 10.

PHOENIX SCHOOLS TO OPEN SEPT. 15, ANTIOCH MONDAY

The Phoenix high school and grade schools will open for the 1941-42 year Monday September 15 in accordance with the date set by the board of education last spring when it was anticipated that many of the high school students would be working on the pear harvest. The foresight of the board was indicated today when a survey showed that 90 per cent of the high school students are now engaged in the harvest. Floyd V. Barrett, school superintendent said.

The Antioch school will re-open next Monday, September 8, it was announced today by Charlotte Sweet, clerk of the district.

The Phoenix schools will re-open with but three changes in the faculty. The faculty, under Superintendent Barrett, will be composed of: High school, Dwight Catherwood, coach and teacher of science and mathematics, Miss Isabel Miller and Harry Myers, who are the returning high school teachers, and Mrs. Evelyn Skyrman, who replaces Mrs. Mildred Gillmouthe.

In the grade school Ed Starr will substitute for Eldred Colver, now attending Linfield. Miss Alta Norcross will teach the seventh grade, Mrs. Gladys Sloan, sixth, Mrs. Eunice Colver, fifth, Mrs. Marjorie Sneed, fourth in place of Miss Laverne Robinson, Mrs. Edith Thompson, third, Miss Marjorie Prescott, second, and Miss Mona Ferns primary.

Mr. Barrett asked students to check their registrations with the principal next week, adding that students wishing to apply for NYA work should do so at once.

The Phoenix school building has been repaired and renovated, new equipment and supplies have arrived and everything in readiness for the opening day, Mr. Barrett stated.

ICKES WANTS TO NORTHWEST TO BE A 'POWER EMPIRE'

Port Angeles, Sept. 3.—(P)—Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes last night told an audience which jammed the high school auditorium here that it is his ambition to see in the northwest the building of "the greatest public empire in the world."

In further remarks Ickes said he was glad of the part he has played in the development of the huge Olympic national park, which he described as the only one in the nation which combines ocean frontage with mountains, forests and glaciers.

The interior secretary said he did not want to lock up all the resources of lumber or any other resources but "it is my theory that there are enough trees in the northwest country to go around if we give the forests proper protection and re-

quire honest-to-God selective logging."

Controversies over Indian fishing treaties which permit the Indians to fish in defiance of state laws will be impartially investigated when he returns to Washington, he promised, and if a study shows the Indians are destroying the Salmon resource some adjustments will doubtless be made.

Treaty rights should be protected, Ickes held, but at the same time no man of any race should have the right to destroy a natural resource.

"One of the toughest jobs an executive can undertake in Washington, D. C., is giving a community a national park," he said in an oblique reference to the long controversy over the expansion of the Olympic park.

Mrs. Ickes and park service members also listened to the 45-minute talk.
