IDENTIFY MAN IN AUTO MISHAP AS WILLIAM MAXWELL

The condition of William A. Maxwell, 59, who was struck by an automobile at the Main and Fir street intersection early Monday night and who was not identified until Tuesday afternoon, was said by Community hospital attendants today to be "very poor." He has a fractured skull and is unconscious, and little hope is held for his life.

Because he had no cards or letters of identification on his person when he was struck by the car operated by Chester Clifford Jones, 16, of 31 Myers street, his name and address was not learned until James Nelson, janitor at the Crater hotel, formerly the Palace, 30 South Central avenue, informed police that the injured man was employed at the hotel as a painter. The hotel is being renovated.

City police said they learned Maxwell had been in Medford for some time, and formerly resided in Central Point. Police said they believed he had a small mine near Willw Springs, Cal. His brother, James Maxwell of River Rouge, Mich., has been notified by telegram of the critical condition of the injured man.

Maxwell was struck by the car as he crossed Main street from south to north according to police. The driver of the machine was not held.

NEW LOCAL MARK IN PLANE TRAVEL

Another new local travel record was established by United Air Lines at Medford municipal airport in August, figures released today by Max C. Henne, manager, showed.

Last month 366 passengers got off United Mainliners here and 349 got on, a total local traffic of 715 passengers. Previous record was established the month before, the July figure being 351 on and 302 off passengers, a total of 653. In August last year there were 312 on and 298 off passengers, a total of 610.

A one-day record was set last Saturday with 34 off and on passengers. During August 265 out of a possible 279 Mainliners stopped at the municipal airport, only 14 flag-stop planes passing over. This also was a new record.

When he was here Monday, Seely V. Hall, vice president in charge of western operations, made preliminary arrangements for a new company building of its own at the airport, Mr. Henne said today. Mr. Hall will return in a week or 10 days with the company's architect further to plan the new station, he stated. The company now occupies quarters in the airport administration building, owned by the city.
