FARM MACHINERY SURVEY CALLED

Corvallis, Sept. 5.—(P)—County agricultural defense boards in Oregon will start an immediate survey of the farm machinery situation in all 36 counties.

Robert Taylor, chairman of the U. S. department of agricultural defense board for Oregon, said today. The board, composed of representatives of 10 federal agricultural agencies, held its first full hearing at Oregon State college.

Facts developed in the farm machinery survey will be used in establishing priorities for 1942, it was said. The board is also preparing to help gear Oregon's agriculture still further to the defense needs of the country, said Taylor.

An unidentified man was said to have opened fire on the German, an army sergeant, with a revolver in the busy East station section.

The victim was rushed to La Riboisiere hospital where his wound was considered not serious.
