

Idle Dodgers Regain League Lead as Cubs Blast Cardinals Twice

CHICAGO SCORES 3-0, 4-3 WINS; ERRORS LOSE 2ND

Passeau Pitches Five-Hit Shutout In Opener—Yanks Clinch American Flag.

Today's best advice for baseball fans is to get your nickels ready for a subway series—the New York Yankees have clinched the American league pennant and the Brooklyn Dodgers have been handed the National league lead on a big, brimming platter.

The Yankees bombed their way to their fifth championship in six years yesterday by smothering the Boston Red Sox, 6-3, with a 10-hit assault on two of Boston's best pitchers, Dick Newsome and Mickey Harris, while Allyn Donald was holding the Red Soxers in check on five safeties.

Yesterday Brooklyn was rained into idleness and the Cardinals played Chicago a doubleheader with a huge reward at stake. But they not only muffed the opportunity, their double defeat dropped them one full game back of Brooklyn.

Warnke Falls

The Cardinals started two of their finest pitchers, Lon Warnke, fresh from his no-hitter at Cincinnati, and the skillful Mort Cooper, but each had to be removed in the fourth inning.

Claude Passeau, a great clutch hurler for the sixth-place Cubs, shut out St. Louis, 3-0, on five hits in the opener.

The nightcap was a bitter battle that went 11 innings and was decided by the Cardinals' most glaring weakness—uncertain fielding. The Redbirds made five errors, and on the last outfielder Don Padgett dropped a fly ball to let in the winning run after Stan Hack had walked and gone to third on a single by Lou Stringer. The score was 4-3.

The Pittsburgh Pirates closed the gap between them and the third-place Reds to a half-game by beating Cincinnati again, 4-0, before rain halted play in the last of the fifth. Rip Sewell held the world champions to one hit over this abbreviated distance while the Pirates pelted Bucky Walters for five.

Bob Feller finally got his 22nd triumph, but it took a three-run rally in the tenth inning by his Cleveland Indians to nose out Detroit, 7-6. The Tigers scored twice in their half of the tenth.

JUDGE PROTESTS TO GOV. SPRAGUE

Salem, Sept. 5.—(P)—Earl Harrell, presiding judge at the Gresham fair races, protested to Governor Charles A. Sprague today that the State Racing commission refused to uphold his suspension of three horses, Cerro, Corcho and Speed On.

Cerro, highly-favored on the 10th race yesterday of the state fair meet, finished far back in the race, Harrell charging that Cerro should have won easily.

The racing commission upheld Harrell's recommendation that Trainer C. Becker should be suspended for 15 days, but it would not suspend the horses.

Harrell said he would refuse to take charge of the Prineville meet next week because "I simply will not work in a state where the racing commission refuses to uphold my rulings."

MAYO RESTORED TO GOOD GRACES

Los Angeles, Sept. 5.—(P)—Eddie Mayo, restored to grace in the Pacific Coast Baseball league, is homeward bound to rejoin the Los Angeles club from which he was suspended two months ago on a charge of spitting in an umpire's face.

George Trautman, chairman of the executive committee of the National Association of Baseball clubs, announced at Cincinnati early today that the committee had determined that Mayo was innocent and should be reinstated as of today.

Umpire Ray Snyder ejected Mayo from a Hollywood-Los Angeles game July 13 after a heated argument over a decision. The next day W. C. Tuttle, president of the Coast league, suspended Mayo indefinitely on the spitting charge.

Skating Teacher

ICE ANTICS

(This is the first of a series of Friday articles by Sparky Bourque, manager and professional instructor of the Medford Ice Arena now being constructed, dealing with all phases of plain and fancy ice skating.)

The skater should have skates that fit the foot snugly, especially in the heel and arch. It is advisable for the skater to limit his skating to 15-minute intervals with rest periods in between. This will enable the skater's ankles to become accustomed to the added strain of balancing, without getting tired.

There is no such thing as a person with ankles too weak to skate on. Some people require a little more practice than others before they are sure on their blades, but this is true in any sport. Each blade has two edges, the inside edge and the outside edge. You will probably hear more about these two edges than any other skating term. They are most important.

When stepping on the ice momentum is gained by tilting the foot slightly inward and pushing against the inside edge, then shifting the weight to the other foot and the outside edge for a long smooth glide. This operation is continued in graceful and rhythmic glides, shifting the weight from one foot to the other. To negotiate a turn the skater crosses the right foot over the left foot and pushes on the inside edge. This continues until the skater is again on the straightaway.

Those wearing figure skates must keep well back on the blades and skate with a slightly bent knee. This is necessary because the radius of the figure blade is well rounded and slightly hollow. This gives the skater a greater opportunity for quick turns and stops. The figure blade is used by Sonya Henie and is recommended for use in the arena.

Those skating on hockey skates must keep their weight well forward as the hockey blade is narrow and flat. This type of blade is used primarily for hockey.

PADRES, SEATTLE NIP AT HEELS OF LEADING SOLONS

No last-reel chase, led by Buck Pureheart and his white charger, could hold a candle to the thrills being provided by Seattle and San Diego in their pursuit of Sacramento.

Nor was any Eliza ever fewer ice cakes ahead of the bloodhounds than the harried Senators are games in front of these two Coast league rivals.

The gap between the leaders and the No. 2 San Diegos today stood at a mere five percentage points, with Seattle eight more behind. All three clubs have been beaten 65 times this baseball season, and the only thing keeping the Senators still on top is that they have won 92 games to 90 for San Diego and 87 for Seattle.

With an assist from the frantic Solons, both challengers last night reduced the respective margins by which they trail.

While Sacramento was losing to Oakland, 2-1, for the second time in a row, San Diego won its third straight from Hollywood, 4-2, and Seattle split with Los Angeles, taking the first game of a doubleheader, 5-3, and dropping the nightcap, 3-1.

Portland took the steam out of San Francisco's drive for fourth place, whipping the Seals 7-2 and 3-0.

Earl Reid set San Francisco up to a two-run lead in the first four innings of the opener but settled down thereafter and was reached for only six hits altogether. The Beavers cracked Bob Boyce 13 times.

CONDITIONS GOOD IN FORESTS NOW FOR PHOTOGRAPHY

The following recreation bulletin was issued today by headquarters of the Rogue River national forest, U. S. department of agriculture:

"If the present clear weather continues, camping, picnicking, fishing and motoring may be enjoyed in the forest this weekend. Particularly are conditions ideal now for photography, because the air is clear and visibility good in the high country. Deer are being frequently seen near the camps and roads, offering enticing opportunities for unusual wildlife pictures.

"Forest camps are again dry and in good condition for use, and roads have been packed by the rains so that they are better than usual. The only exception is at Woodruff Meadows where logging has made the road almost impassable.

Fishing within the forest is now found only in lakes. At Rocky Point, Andy Reeker, Midgornio and Troutorio flies are bringing good catches of big rainbows. Boats are available at Fourmile where rainbow and bluebacks are being taken with worms and eggs. At Hyatt, frogs are being successfully used as bait for bass.

"Many of the berries at Huckleberry mountain have become rain-softened, but some good ones may still be found. Blackberries are available in fair quantities on both the Big and Little Applegate rivers, although some bushes have been affected by a blight.

"The law requiring campfire permits and prohibiting smoking while traveling is still in effect.
