(Dinner for 4 or 5)

1 cup dried beans

8 quarts water

1 cup cubed carrots

2 cups diced celery

1/2 cup chopped onions

2 cups chopped cabbage

2 teaspoons chopped parsley

2 teaspoons salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper

1 clove garlic

3 tablespoons olive oil

Grated Parmesan cheese

Wash the beans. Cover by three

inches with cold water and soak sev-

eral hours—or over night. Rinse off

and add to the water and carrots.

Cover and let simmer one hour. Add

the rest of the vegetables and season-

ings. Let simmer two more hours.

Add more water if the soup becomes

too thick. Mix in the oil and serve

in hot bowls. Sprinkle cheese over

tops.

Sponge Cake

6 egg yolks

1 1/2 cups granulated sugar

8 tablespoons cold water

1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind

1 teaspoon lemon juice

1/2 teaspoon salt

6 egg whites, beaten

1 cup pastry flour

1 teaspoon cream of tartar

Beat yolks three minutes. Add half

of sugar and beat a minute. Add

water, rind, juice and salt. Beat oth-

er sugar into the beaten whites and

beat until creamy. Pour into the

cool, remove.

RAIL TANK CARS TO RUSH GASOLINE INTO EAST AREA

Washington, Sept. 5.—(AP)—The green signal was flashed today for railroads to speed hundreds of trains rolling out of the west to relieve the oil emergency in the eastern states.

Representatives of the oil industry gave the government a pledge last night to use every available railroad tank car, opening the way for the railways to prove that their kind of transportation could eliminate the oil shortage within two weeks.

Rail representatives and a committee of the oil industry agreed speedily on sharp reductions for rail movement of oil from the producing areas to the Atlantic seaboard.

J. J. Pelley, president of the Association of American Railroads, told a senate committee Wednesday that the oil shortage could be ended within two weeks by utilizing all available tank cars. He said there now were 20,000 idle rail tankers capable of moving 200,000 barrels of oil to the east daily. The daily shortage is estimated by government officials at 174,000 barrels.

No official statement was issued immediately on the rate reduction agreement, but reliable reports said it embraced a flat 25 per cent rate cut on gasoline and all fuel oils, and reductions ranging up to 50 per cent on crude oil, for west-to-east shipments.

A 25 per cent slice in gasoline

rates would mean the motor fuel

would move at 1 to 1.5 cents a

gallon under rates now effective.

The present tariff runs up to

5.5 cents for the long haul from

Texas to the New York area.

The crude rate, it was under-

stood, would be 13 per cent of

the first class rail rate now in

effect in the east, compared with

26 per cent of first class now

charged.

The charge for hauling oil by

coastwise tank ships has run

about one-sixth the rail tariffs.

INDICT CANBY, 20,

ON DEATH CHARGE

Russell Jones, 20, Canby, charged

by a Wasco county grand jury

with killing and robbing John

Karlen, 77, Tygh valley resi-

dent.

Jones was arrested at his

Canby home by state police

July 20 after Karlen's body had

been found in a street at The

Dalles.

The indictment accused Jones

of taking money, a gold watch

and notebooks from Karlen and

then "beating, bruising, kicking

and stamping him," causing fa-

tal injuries.

Jones will plead before Cir-

cuit Judge Fred W. Wilson on

Sept. 9.

Two youths, Peter Schweigert,

17, and Richard Drinnon, 16,

were arrested at Salem as ma-

terial witnesses but were absolved

of participation.

ALASKA MILITARY
PROGRAM BLASTED
BY MAINE SOLON

Washington, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Senator Brewster (R-Me.), just returned from a Pacific defense inspection flight, criticized today the military program in Alaska, including what he said was an army proposal since abandoned, to shelter Alaskan troops in tents.

Brewster said he called the attention of war department officials to a requirement of law that "adequate housing" be provided for troops above the Mason Dixon line, and suggested that "tents in an Alaskan winter would not answer that description."

He has since been assured, he added, that adequate barracks would be constructed.

Brewster, a member of a special senate committee investigating the defense program, made a 14,000 mile tour of Pacific coast and Alaskan defense developments in army and navy planes.

He praised the efforts of Major General Simon Bolivar Buckner, commander of Alaskan defense forces, to coordinate the military program in the territory, but said in an interview that officers in Alaska should be given more independent authority to overcome delays. Brewster said that it took two months for Washington officials to clear recommendations of officers on duty in Alaska.

Brewster said troops from the Oregon, Washington, Minnesota and Alabama National Guard were on duty in Alaska in addition to marines and regular army units. He declined to disclose the number of men now at Alaskan stations but said there was "a very substantial number."

Brewster said he would report to Senator Truman (D-Mo.), chairman of the investigating committee, and also to Senator Walsh (D-Mass.), chairman of the naval affairs committee.

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'RED' JOURNALIST OF PARIS KILLED BY TERROR SHOT

Vichy, Unoccupied France, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Marcel Gittion, a prominent communist journalist who had turned against his party, died in a hospital today from an assassin's bullet wound.

He was shot last night by an

assailant who escaped.

Gittion was taken to a hospital

where doctors extracted a bul-

let from his left lung but de-

layed an operation to remove

another slug from his abdomen

because of his critical condition.

His assailant was said to have

escaped on a bicycle.

Gittion was a collaborator of
the communist daily L'Humanite
and secretary-general of the
Metal Workers union before the
war, when he was elected to the
chamber of deputies from the
Seine department.

He refused to join other com-
munist deputies in signing a let-
ter opposing the war and was
not unseated when the chamber
voted to oust the signers.

The attempted assassination
followed swiftly the wounding
of a German army sergeant in
Paris. German police still are
seeking his assailant.
