C.I.O. IN DEMAND
ALUMINUM PLANT
SIGNS CONTRACT

Portland, Ore., Sept. 5.—(P)—The CIO requested today that the Aluminum Company of America's Vancouver, Wash., plant, agree to a conference to negotiate a contract.

The move indicated a possible jurisdictional dispute there, since a union shop versus open shop issue between AFL workers and the management was referred to the national defense mediation board only a few days ago.

The CIO request, signed by Richard Francis, Washington CIO director; William Dillmeyer, Oregon CIO director, and John Whitson, Aluminum Workers of America representative, stated:

"... We feel that we have a sufficient number of members working within your plant to demand a contract.

"Therefore, speaking as the direct representatives of those employees who are members of the Aluminum Workers of America and those who through intimidation have failed to sign up but who desire this organization to represent them, we ask for an early conference..."

The plant, employing about 700 persons, is engaged in national defense work.

LUDWIG, SUSPECT
AS SPY, SAYS HE
SENT ARMY DATA

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 5.—(P)—Kurt Frederick Ludwig, charged in New York with violation of the espionage laws and with conspiracy to violate the law, has admitted mailing to Europe vital information concerning the United States army, airplane production and ship movements, U. S. Attorney Lyle D. Keith said today.

Ludwig, 38-year-old German-American who has been characterized as the head of an international spy ring, was ordered by Federal Judge Lewis Schwelb to stand trial.

His bond was continued at \$50,000.

Keith told of Ludwig's "partial confession" after Richard D. Auerbach, special FBI agent had made reference to it in his testimony. Ludwig, however, has not admitted the espionage indictment against him.

"He has admitted sending vital military information through the mails, but he hasn't admitted the charges in the indictment," Keith explained. "In effect, he has admitted certain facts which are alleged in the indictment, but he has not confessed to the formal charge."
