

CO-ED WHO SLEW HER TWO BABIES GIVEN PROBATION

Court Ward For Ten Years —Enters Guilty Plea— Denies Lecture Influence.

San Diego, Cal., Sept. 5.—(AP)—Miss Ann Marie Hansen, 23, admitted slayer of her two newly-born infants, was granted probation today by Superior Judge Edward Kelly.

The judge said the girl would remain a ward of the court during the 10-year probation period. The ruling was made after Miss Hansen related her story of the deaths of her two sons and collapsed on the witness stand.

Termination of the probation hearing also ended the inquiry of Judge Kelly into Miss Hansen's contention that a sex lecture she heard at San Diego State college had tended to place her "off guard." Dr. Walter Hepner, college resident, said he would investigate the girl's account of the lecture when the faculty reported for the fall semester September 15.

The girl had pleaded guilty to manslaughter charge for the slayings. The district attorney's office said the girl had admitted smothering the first baby, born in April, 1940, and strangling her second son, born last June.

Taking the witness stand today, Miss Hansen told the court that "any state college lecture I might have heard had nothing to do with my present predicament."

The girl collapsed after answering the last question of District Attorney Thomas Whelan. She revived after a matron administered aid.

In her testimony, Miss Hansen mentioned "an affair" with a Missoula, Mont., man in 1939, after which she said she came to San Diego and entered college.

"Didn't you know of birth control and didn't you take courses at college where they taught physiology?" the prosecutor asked.

She said she had taken such courses and had discussed sex matters a little with girl friends, but had only a "vague idea" of birth control. She said she was here three months before she discovered she was pregnant.

Menu For Dinner
Broiled Fish Fillets Tartar Sauce
Corn on the Cob
Creamed Green Beans
Bread Currant Jam
Crisp Radishes Sliced Cucumbers
Watermelon Coffee
1 pound fish fillets
1/2 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon celery salt
2 tablespoons butter, melted
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Wash fillets and wipe dry. Dip in milk and seasonings placed in shallow dish. Arrange on greased shallow pan, brush with butter and broil 8 minutes or until browned. Turn, brush with rest of butter, and brown. Add juice, cook a minute and transfer to heated platter, surround with parsley and lemon quarters. Buy fillets 1/2 inch thick.
Tartar Sauce
1/4 cup stiff mayonnaise
1/4 teaspoon finely chopped parsley
1/4 teaspoon finely chopped chives or onion
1/4 teaspoon finely chopped sweet pickles
1/4 teaspoon lemon juice
Mix and chill the ingredients and place in a small glass dish.
Boiled Corn on the Cob
8 ears corn
1 quart boiling water
1/2 teaspoon salt
As soon as corn is received in the kitchen, remove the husks and silk. Wrap in a damp cloth or wax paper and store in the refrigerator until cooking time—corn should be cooked the day it is received. Add the corn to the boiling water. Cover tightly and boil gently seven minutes, add salt and after a minute, immediately remove the corn with a long handled spoon. Serve on a folded napkin. Over cooking toughens corn.

COLUMBIA POWER AUTHORITY ROW COMING TO HEAD

Tacoma, Sept. 5.—(AP)—The fight over a "home rule" Columbia valley authority loomed today as the hottest issue before the convention of the Oregon-Washington Public Ownership league, which Secretary Harold L. Ickes will address tonight.

Delegates, arriving for a morning session after an inspection tour of Grand Coulee dam and a trip here, were told of an announcement by Joseph G. Batinovich, chairman of the Grays Harbor delegation, that his group would back such a resolution.

"If the resolution is sidetracked in committee," he said, "we'll fight it out on the floor of the convention."

Their support has been given, he explained, to the Bone-Smith CVA bill, which would place control of the Columbia power projects in a three-man board, appointed by the president from among northwest public power advocates.

Secretary Ickes, who has been vacationing near Port Angeles, would be given such authority by himself under another bill before congress. He is to return to Washington by September 15.

Other listed speakers today included Dr. Paul J. Raver, Bonneville administrator, Senators McNary of Oregon and Wallgren of Washington and Louis Bartlett, representing Gov. Cuthbert L. Olson of California. President Harry Pierson was to preside at the morning session and A. C. Heyman, president of the League in Oregon, the afternoon meeting.

SCANDIA MOVIES WILL BE SHOWN

SENATE BALKS AT OKAYING TAX ACT

Washington, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Hopes of senate leaders to pass the \$3,633,900,000 revenue bill by this week-end slumped today as members from eight community property states pledged a last-ditch fight against a provision prohibiting husbands and wives from splitting their income in making tax returns.

Such division, which usually operates to lower tax liabilities on joint incomes above \$3,500, now is permitted in Louisiana, Texas, Arizona, Nevada, New Mexico, California, Idaho and Washington. The projected prohibition would add about \$80,000,000 in revenue, some senators estimated.

The restriction was recommended by the finance committee, but Senator Connally (D., Tex.), a committee member, termed it "a proposal which no senator from a community property state can accept without making known his opposition."
