

PEDESTRIAN-AUTO DEATH INQUEST TO BE HELD TONIGHT

Seven witnesses, in addition to the driver of the car, will be called to testify at a coroner's inquest at Conger's at 7:30 tonight, to be held for the purpose of learning the facts connected with the automobile-pedestrian accident at Main and Fir streets last Monday night that caused the death of William A. Maxwell, 59. Maxwell died in a local hospital Thursday morning of a fractured skull.

Testifying will be Chester Clifton Jones, 16, driver of the car; Milton Pitts of 915 Queen Ann avenue and Clark L. Carlton of 728 West Fourth street, passengers in the car; and the following who saw the accident happen: Arthur L. Brown of 843 West 13th street, J. L. Morgan of 814 Laurel street, R. R. Hammond of 25 South Orange street, C. B. Hester of 112 South Grape street and Dale Haley of Route 2.

The inquest will be conducted by District Attorney George W. Neilson.

RUSSIAN PLANES ARRIVE SEATTLE

Seattle, Sept. 5.—(P)—Flight plans of the Russian military mission which landed at Sand Point naval air station late yesterday remained almost as much of a mystery today as upon their surprise arrival in Alaska five days ago.

Members of the mission were silent. Navy officials said they had no information, but unofficial indications were that the 47 airmen and technicians would proceed eastward today to Spokane, Wash., by transport plane, enroute to Washington, D. C.

Seattle was approximately the 8,000th mile post on the flight from Moscow.

The war department announced this week the Russians were coming on a purely technical mission to observe the American airplane production process.

IMPOSE FINE FOR STICKER SURPLUS UPON WINDSHIELD

In what was said to be the first case of its kind filed here, Frank J. Brown, 20, Jacksonville, was fined \$1.50 and \$4.50 costs by Judge William R. Coleman in justice of the peace court yesterday afternoon on a state police charge of operating a car with unauthorized stickers on the windshield. Brown pleaded guilty.

It was indicated that police planned to close in on owners of cars whose windshields and windows have become cluttered with stickers of one sort or another. There has been a growing conviction among the public that Secretary of State Earl Snell and local traffic safety councils should lose no further time in opening an educational campaign against the plastering of stickers over car windshields and windows that are intended to be seen out of. It has been pointed out that the stickers nullify the accomplishments of automotive engineers who toil to increase the field of vision of car drivers for additional safety. Some of the stickers, it has also been pointed out, advertise the state's own institutions of higher learning.

Owen E. Davis, 25, U. S. army air post here, was fined \$5 and costs for passing a car with insufficient clearance. Sam W. Steele, 33, 503 Clark street, was fined \$2.50 and costs for overloading a truck. Edward W. Leeming, 26, Talent, was fined \$1.50 and costs for having no license on a four-wheel truck. All pleaded guilty.

PROWLER VISITS OIL STATION AND 5 PARKED AUTOS

The Standard Oil service station at Ninth street and Central avenue was burglarized and five automobiles parked in the Hotel Jackson and service station lots were damaged last night by a prowler whose loot consisted only of a \$7.50 pair of colored glasses, city police reported today.

The burglar, police said, broke into the oil station by smashing a window on the north side of the building. Stolen from the station were two fishing rods and reels valued at \$13.66, but these were both recovered later lying on the ground in the alley back of the Crater hotel, 30 South Central avenue. A number of fish hooks, leaders, spinners, flies and sinkers were taken out of a showcase in the station and piled on a stack of tires, but were not removed from the establishment, police said.

The burglar, police stated, also attempted to break into five automobiles but was successful in entering only one. From the car of M. L. Leishman of Portland, parked on the hotel lot, the glasses were stolen. The prowler broke out the left window to enter the car.

A machine owned by Herman Glazier of Portland, also on the hotel lot, suffered a smashed right front door window, and glass in the windows of cars registered to Victor Vehrung and Carol Pheathers, both of Klamath Falls, was struck by a heavy object but not broken. Neither car was entered.

Another machine, owned by Roy Entler of Roseburg and parked on the service station lot, suffered damage to the right front door but was not entered.

Police said that a man carrying a long bundle, apparently the fishing rods, was seen running through the alley between the hotel and Lewis Super Service station about 1 a. m. this morning, and that the rods were discovered in the alley back of the Crater hotel a short time later.

Police found two full bottles of beer, two jackets and a sweater lying on the service station lot.

DRAFT REJECTION IN STATE SINCE OCTOBER 41 PCT.

Portland, Sept. 5.—(P)—Forty-one per cent of Oregon's men called for physical examination in the selective service program were rejected from October, 1940, to Sept. 2, 1941.

Dr. V. E. Hockett of Salem, state medical director for the selective service board, told the state medical society convention here yesterday that 9569 men had been examined in that period.

Of those who passed the preliminary examination, 14 per cent were rejected at the induction center, he added.

Teeth caused 996 rejections, followed by deformities with 603, vision 538, heart 328, mental 195, ears 187, flat feet 187 and tuberculosis 78.

Dog's Fatal Error
Bend, Sept. 5.—(P)—The \$500 police dog of Mrs. L. B. Wallbridge of San Francisco was fond of jumping fences. Yesterday state police revealed that he mistook the guardrail at the Peter Skene Ogden park for a fence and jumped it, falling to his death in the 300-foot-deep Crooked river canyon.

Takes Navy Post
Washington, Sept. 5.—(P)—Artemus L. Gates, New York financier and former World war naval flier, was sworn in today as assistant secretary of the navy for air, a post which has been vacant since 1932.

MORALE BOOSTING YOUNG OFFICERS, ARMY OBJECTIVE

Washington, Sept. 5.—(P)—The army, intent on developing its fighting punch, put another billion dollars' worth of combat equipment on its buying list today and simultaneously began shifting field leadership to young hand-picked officers as tough physically as the men they command.

Both steps, announced by Robert P. Patterson, undersecretary of war, at his press conference yesterday, were expected to raise soldiers' morale to a higher pitch.

The extra money, Patterson said, is needed for tanks, anti-tank guns, and anti-aircraft weapons. The request will go soon to congress, which recently trimmed about \$550,000,000 off a \$1,300,000,000 request for additional weapons which army men said would be needed for a force of 3,000,000 men.

Patterson made it plain that neither then nor now did the department contemplate immediate creation of a 3,000,000 man force. But the tanks and artillery pieces will require a long time to manufacture, should be ready when needed, and new plans call for a denser assignment of such weapons among the present forces.

The army's plans for revitalizing its growing forces call for replacement of about 5,000 of the older officers now on duty with troops with younger, more active men better able to withstand the rigors of modern warfare. The new age standards will affect about 500 regular army officers, roughly 20 per cent of the National Guard officers now on active duty, and a small number of reserves.

The maximum age for major generals in command of divisions was fixed at 62, brigadier generals at 60, colonels 55, lieutenant colonels 52, majors 47, captains 42, first lieutenants 35 and second lieutenants 30.

WOMAN HELD AS MEMBER SPY RING

New York, Sept. 5.—(P)—Federal agents today announced the arrest of 25-year-old Mrs. Helen Pauline Meyer on espionage charges, the second woman accused of being involved in a spy ring allegedly operated by Kurt Frederick Ludwig, who was arrested recently in the state of Washington.

The other woman, Lucy Boehmler, 18, and two men accomplices, have pleaded guilty.

Mrs. Mayer lived with her parents in suburban Ridgewood, Queens, and worked as a secretary. A native of Brooklyn, she was graduated from a New York City high school and attended business school. She also had attended German script classes conducted by the German-American Bund in Ridgewood.

Mrs. Mayer was held in \$10,000 bail for hearing Tuesday when arraigned in federal court.
