W. A. GATES POSES BAFFLING QUERY AT ASHLAND MEET

Ashland, Sept. 5.—(Spl.)—W. A. "Bill" Gates, Medford grocer, posed a baffling question before

the Ashland Rotary club Thursday, when he was featured speaker on the subject, "What Do You Think?"

Mr. Gates, a firm believer in freedom of speech, himself, went on to ask Rotarians their opinion of the possibility of eliminating the abuse of that great human right by eradicating the causes for the abuse.

Particularly, he rapped the Darwinian theory of evolution as a chief basis for most of the discontent with accepted theo-

ries of religion and human conduct and rights. He contended that the ideas of Hitler and Mussolini for enslavement of all except peoples selected by them stem directly from the atheistic concepts of Darwin and kindred believers.

His talk brought considerable discussion, and evolved into a five man forum, in which Dr. Walter Redford, Theo J. Norby, Homer Billings, Will Dodge and he tried the question from various angles.

Mr. Gates told of a man of his acquaintance who, although he possessed a splendid self-gained education and a remarkable ability to suit his thoughts to words, was rebuffed continually when he attempted to place certain of his writings in publication in various magazines and journals.

The writer, who ranged sheep in the Antelope district of southern Oregon, was inclined to an atheistic belief, and, in his writings, pushed his ideas which

were argumentative and contrary to common beliefs. Upon being persuaded of his mistake, he found that his consequent writings were acceptable and sought-after, and further, that his own conception of life had altered to that of other people.

The speaker did not attempt to lay out a course of action for correcting the evil, beyond emphasizing a sincere belief in the Christian religion as only one sound both in theory and fact.

He left the matter with his listeners—"Can we not have freedom of speech without the assertion of destructive thoughts?"
