If he passes the final examination, he will go immediately to San Diego, Cal., for eight weeks of preliminary training before being assigned to duty. Those who enlist in the naval reserve are to serve for duration of the present emergency, it was explained by Jack M. Carpenter, in charge of the recruiting station in the Medford federal building.

Drying Wind—A strong east wind yesterday and today had a drying effect and thus increased fire hazards in the Applegate district of the Rogue River national forest, headquarters said. All lookouts and fire guards for the entire forest, excepting the lookout at Devil's Peak, were back at their posts today after having a few days off during favorable weather. It was not considered necessary to man the Devil's Peak station again this season as it is in high and safe territory, headquarters explained. The fire guard station in Ashland was closed today and the guard transferred to the Wagner Gap station to fill a vacancy caused by a resignation.

COUNTY BUDGET DRAFTERS EYED

Appointment of the county budget committee, for the first six months of 1942 is now under consideration. Under an Oregon law, passed by the last session of the legislature, county budgets in the state will be made for the period from January to July, and in July compiled for the full year period ending June 30, 1943.

County Judge J. B. Coleman said today an effort is being made to secure the last year's budget committee composed of Henry Enders, Ashland, Henry Young, Eagle Point, and H. A. Thierolf, to serve again. All are experienced budgeters, acquainted with county affairs, and the county court feels it would be advisable to have members with previous knowledge and experience.

County Judge Coleman said making the budget for the six months period would be rather involved.
