CYCLIST INJURED BY CAR ON NORTH RIVERSIDE AVENUE

Jumping off a motorcycle directly into the path of an oncoming automobile, Ben D. Marsden, 21, of Gold Hill suffered a broken right leg and bruises about 5:30 p. m. Monday in front of the 99 Motel on North Riverside avenue. He was taken to Sacred Heart hospital in the Peri ambulance, but was released this morning to return to his home.

Police said the youth was riding on a motorcycle operated by Nolan C. Swindler, 21, also of Gold Hill, and that when the motorcycle, traveling north on North Riverside avenue, turned into the driveway of the Motel and swung around and back onto the highway, Marsden apparently became frightened and leaped off the vehicle.

A machine operated by Werner Wagner of Central Point, traveling north on North Riverside avenue, passed the Motel just as Marsden jumped off the motorcycle and struck the young man with his right front fender and headlight, police reported. JACKSON COUNTY ADDS TO 7-DEATH TRAFFIC RECORD

Salem—(Spl.)—At 12:30 p. m. on August 9 a passenger in a motor vehicle was killed in an accident in Marion county. At 2:06 p. m., another Oregonian died in a motor vehicle accident in Lake county. Then at 4:30 o'clock a traffic accident took one life in Polk county and at 5:15 there was another accident victim in the city of Grants Pass. At 9:15 o'clock, the fifth traffic victim was recorded in Marion county and at 11:30 p. m., the Grim Reaper claimed two more traffic victims in Jackson county to complete his day.

Score: For the one day of August 9 seven persons killed in six traffic crashes.

That day saw the most traffic fatalities for any one day in Oregon since February 4, 1940 when seven persons were killed, according to the state traffic safety division. On January 11 of this year, six persons died in traffic accidents and there are several days when five persons were killed.

The August 9 toll constituted 18 per cent of all the traffic deaths recorded in Oregon for the entire month of August, he safety division's figures disclosed.

Of the seven deaths, only one occurred in urban areas, all the rest resulting from accidents on highways in rural districts. The urban accident involved a small child on a bicycle who rode across the path of an approaching car. Non-collision accidents took three lives and the others were killed in collisions involving two vehicles.

PATTON TO HELP SOLDIERS LOCATE JOBS ON RETURN

Senior Employment Officer At State Employment Office Receives Appointment

Salem, Sept. 9.—(P)—The Oregon re-employment plan, under which all Oregon men released from the army will be given jobs, is ready to go into full operation, state selective service headquarters and the Oregon employment service announced today.

The first selectees and national guardsmen to be discharged will begin to return to their Oregon homes late this month. Re-employment committees, men who will act as liaison agents between the returning soldiers, local selective service board and employers, were appointed today. They include: John J. Patton, Medford, for Jackson county.

(Mr. Patton is senior employment officer at the state employment service office, Medford, 45 North Fir street). Before each soldier is released, all data concerning him will be sent to selective service headquarters. This information will be relayed to the re-employment committees, and steps will be taken to find jobs for the soldiers.

The soldier's former employer will be approached first, and if this employer has no job available, then other jobs will be sought. Soldiers who had no training in any jobs before they went into service will be sent to training schools.

ROCKY MOUNTAINS GET EARLY TASTE WINTER WEATHER TOASTMASTERS TO MAKE PLANS

Denver, Sept. 9.—(P)—Rocky Mountain westerners poked more fuel into their furnaces today and went to work in overcoats after winter made a surprise feint from Canada to Colorado.

Additional coal trucks were called for and heating companies sent men scurrying to thousands of homes to turn on oil and gas burners.

Wayfarers in two states encountered harrowing experiences when a widespread snowstorm overtook them and temperatures dropped near or below freezing.

Several mountain passes were closed by the snow, which ranged to a foot in depth in Wyoming, but were reopened today in most cases. The lowest city temperatures, 29 degrees, was reported from two-mile-high Leadville, Colo. At the summit of Pikes peak it was nine above zero.

Four tourists from the warm-er eastern United States were among six persons who were rescued from the grip of the storm yesterday.
