Salem, Sept. 9.—(AP)—State fair attendance totaled 116,371, or 1,630 less than the 1940 record, Manager Leo Spitzbart said today. The attendance Sunday, closing day of the seven-day show, was 12,197, 2,032 more than on the closing day last year.

Spitzbart said the fair's net profit will be greater than last year.

Five Merchantmen Sunk By Germans

Berlin, Sept. 9.—(AP)—German torpedo boats sank five armed merchantmen totalling 15,800 tons in an attack on a strongly protected convoy off the British coast, the Nazi high command reported today.

Drier Burns Yamhill Ore., Sept. 9.—(AP)—The George Zimmerman walnut and prune drier one mile north of here burned early today with loss estimated by the owner at "upward of \$25,000."

Hilbert Prices Set Portland, Sept. 9.—(AP)—The Pacific Nut Growers Cooperative, Dundee, announced today that opening prices for filberts would range from 16 1/2 to 21 cents per pound. Jumbo filberts and bixnuts were quoted at 21 cents, with jumbo Dutchbills at 20c.

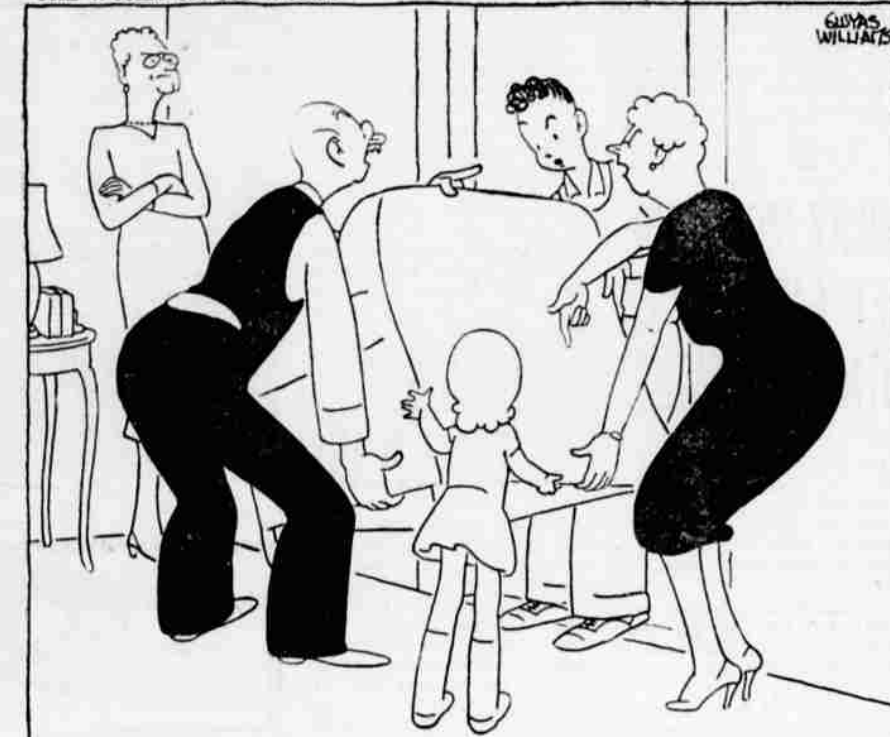

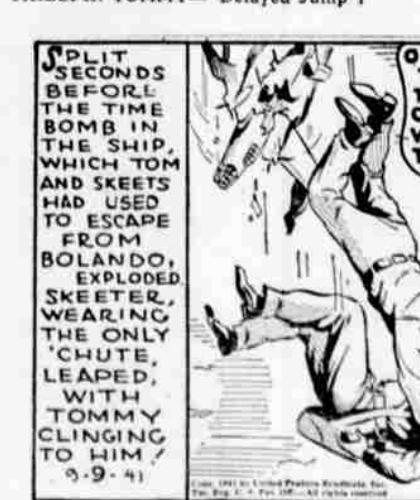
