DEATH RAY MAN DIES IN WALES

London, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Harry Gridell-Matthews, 61, electrical research scientist known as "Death Ray Matthews," died of a heart attack today in his lonely, carefully-guarded laboratory bungalow on the top of a mountain near Swansea, Wales. He had been ill several months.

Gridell-Matthews, who married Ganna Walska, the singer, in 1936, invented a ray which he said would bring down airplanes at a distance. It has been reported also that he devised a ray to kill disease germs and designed a rocket airplane to travel six miles a second.

But, so far as the public knows, none of his lethal machines ever has been employed in the present war.
