Tangy Meat Cakes

1 pound beef round, chopped

1/2 cup dried bread crumbs

1 egg, beaten

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon paprika

2 tablespoons horseradish

2 tablespoons catsup

4 tablespoons flour

3 tablespoons fat

Mix beef with crumbs, egg and seasonings. Shape into half-inch cakes and sprinkle with flour. Brown quickly in frying fat. Cover frying pan and cook 10 minutes. Turn to allow even cooking.

Fruity Salad Dressing

(For Lettuce or Cabbage Salads)

1/2 cup thick salad dressing

2 tablespoons seeded red cherries

1/4 cup diced pears

1/3 cup broken nuts

1 teaspoon lemon juice

1/4 teaspoon salt

Mix and chill ingredients. Pour on salad and serve immediately.

Chocolate Peanut Butter Rounds

1/2 cup peanut butter

1 cup fat

1 square chocolate, melted

1 teaspoon vanilla

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup sour cream (or buttermilk)

2 eggs, beaten

1 1/2 cups sugar

3-1/3 cups flour

1 teaspoon soda

1 teaspoon baking powder

Cream peanut butter and fat until soft. Add chocolate, vanilla, salt, cream and sugar. Beat a minute. Mix in ingredients and drop portions onto greased baking sheets. Flatten each cookie and bake 8 minutes in moderate oven. Extra dough can be stored in refrigerator.

COW HANDS SET ROUND-UP MARKS

Pendleton, Ore., Sept. 11.—(Sp.)—Thousands of persons jammed this city today as the 32d annual Pendleton Round-up went into its second day with the nation's top cow hands vying for championships.

Former champions got a good start yesterday and two of them cracked records. Clay Carr, Visalia, Calif., all-

around champion in 1940, roped and tied his calf in 14.9 seconds for one of the new marks and Bill McMacken, Trail City, S. D., twice round-up champion, bulldozed a steer in 9.8 seconds, lowering the mark of 10.4 he set in 1939.

OREGON STUDENTS ARE AIDED AGAIN BY GRANT OF NYA

Eugene (Sp.)—In announcing the new national youth administration grant for the 1941-42 college year, Dr. Donald M. Erb, president of the University of Oregon, made public the report of Karl W. Onthank, dean of personnel administration, revealing that the university was able to aid 518 students through a similar grant last year.

Thirteen Jackson county students were included among those benefited by the N.Y.A. grant during the past college year.

The amount of the grant for the present college year will be \$32,670. The funds will be paid out at the rate of \$3,630 a month to students whose grades are above the average and who need additional money above what they get from home and jobs, to enter and stay in the university.

University of Oregon students also received a total of \$220,264.78, exclusive of the national youth administration grant, from various "student aid funds." These funds, as reported by Dean Onthank, provided for 150 scholarships totaling \$16,902.50, fellowships for 63 students amounting to \$30,831.24, wages paid to students in the sum of \$73,655.71 for work done at the university, and for 3586 student loans totaling \$98,774.33.

Under the N.Y.A. grant, students are given jobs which are not provided for under the regular university budget, Dean Onthank explained. This includes such work as research, typing and stenographic work and taking care of the athletic fields. The amount a student can earn each month is limited so that the funds may be spread as far as possible.

AFRICAN DEFENSE PLANS ARE DRAWN

France, Germany and Spain have worked out elaborate joint plans to defend West Africa, according to information reaching the Associated Press in New York today.

Belief that the United States and Great Britain some day will try to seize bases in the strategic French,

Spanish and Portuguese possessions across the south Atlantic has brought the three powers into virtual alliance, it is stated.

Steadily, German-produced arms are flowing down to Casablanca in French Morocco, Villa Cisneros in Spain's Rio de Oro and Dakar, vital port in French Senegal.

Ships slipping out of French Mediterranean ports to acid across the Mediterranean to Oran go loaded with coastal and anti-aircraft guns, searchlight batteries, mines, knocked-down 80-and 120-ton submarines and fast torpedo boats.
