Order Of Finish Listed For Two Football Loops

Just eight days hence Mr. Football will stage his 1941 debut in this town, and a mere eight days later the big college clubs on the Pacific seaboard will start shooting holes in each other.

So it's getting about that time. That time when every alleged writer of a sports column inhales deeply, hoists himself up the tree of prognostication and creeps out on the sturdiest-looking limb in sight.

Being no exception to this rule, and liking the looks of a certain limb not too far above the hard, cruel ground, we plan today to do a little guessing on the order of finish of a couple of grid loops. Besides, we want to get in our say before Professor I. Pickem, of which is a predictor he modestly claims there is none which, arrives on the scene with his week-by-week list of winners, he hopes.

Taking up the Southern Oregon conference first, it looks like the campaign will develop into two separate and distinct battles—that for the first place between Medford's Black Tornado and the Klamath Falls Pelicans, and that for last place between the Ashland High Grizzlies and the Grants Pass Cavemen. We don't believe the latter two clubs will possess the man-power to seriously threaten either Medford or Klamath Falls, although football is the most unpredictable game in the world and such a thing as the Cavemen or the Grizzlies overturning one or both of the other two elevens is entirely possible. But not probable.

Three of the four loop schools will open the season with new coaches. Frank O'Neill will be at Ashland, Buck Hammer at Klamath and Justin Veakely at Grants Pass. There is also the possibility that Bill Bowerman, a reserve officer, will be called into active service. If this happens, all four of the outfits will have a new head man.

So, with fingers crossed, here is the way we predict the teams will finish their conference schedules:

1. Medford
2. Klamath
3. Ashland
4. Grants Pass.

Elaborating, we pick the Tornado to finish first because their material will certainly be on a par with Klamath's, and because Medford, as proved by history, always manages to reach dizzy emotional heights when facing the Pelicans. Ashland, with a mob of regulars returning, should prove stronger than Grants Pass, which lost a considerable number of lettermen via graduation.

Now for the Pacific Coast conference.

The ballyhoo drums are thundering for Washington's Huskies and for Oregon's Webfoots, and even Prescott Sullivan of the 'Frisco Examiner selects the Jimmy Phelan eleven to capture the marbles. And that's something, coming from a Bay area scribe.

But it looks like Stanford to us, all the way, in every respect and no foolin'. As they lost only three regulars from last year's Rose Bowl champs, we can't see how they can miss being stronger than ever, and Washington, on paper, doesn't have the reserve strength. Oregon? Well, about Oregon, now, for several years we have watched the Ducks start the season with great promise, rated as dangerous "dark horses," and for several years we have watched the Ducks and the season considerably below first place. So, this writer is NOT counting on Oliver's club to bitterly contend for the title. First division? Maybe. But not one-two. Hope we are wrong, but that's the way it looks from this corner.

ST. LOUIE TAKES PAIR FROM PHILS TO REDUCE LEAD

Chicago Upsets Pace-Setters, 5-4 And 5-3—Phillies Fall, 3-2 And 1-0.

The Bums from Brooklyn were bruised and beleaguered by an ambush at Chicago yesterday. Up till then they had hoped to parade into St. Louis and salt away the pennant with an impressive display of fireworks in the enemy own yard. They had a three-game lead and were cocky. They had lined up their pitching staff for the Cardinal series a week in advance. They considered the Cubs as close friends if not personal relations. After all, about half the Dodgers were former Cubs and last Thursday, while Brooklyn was being kept out of trouble by a drizzling rain, Chicago chopped the Cardinals out of the league lead by capturing a double-header.

It was a terrible shock, therefore, to have the Cubs stick a dagger in the backs of the Bums yesterday by winning two games 5-4 and 5-3. Kirby Higbee, the only 20-game winner in the National league, had a 3-0 going into the last half of the eighth in the first game and the Dodgers were entirely unsuspecting.

Rally Does It

When Phil Cavaretta tripped and Bill Nicholson doubled, Whitlow Wyatt rushed onto the scene in full majesty. Dom Dilessandro singled, but Wyatt put out the fire. It broke out again in the ninth, however, with three more runs—two singles, a double by Lou Stringer, and finally a single by Bill Nicholson for the winning run.

The Cardinals met stubborn opposition from the poor but proud Phillies, yet managed to cop their double-header 3-2 and 1-0. The Cards were held to six hits in the first game, but one of them was a two-run homer by Johnny Hopp and Lon Warneke and Bill Crouch let the tail-enders have only seven safeties. Then in the second game Harry Gumbert pitched a masterful three-hit shutout and a triple by Johnny Mize followed by Martin Marion's single in the fourth provided all the margin he needed.

The Boston Braves beat the Cincinnati Reds 4-1 in 15 innings and the Pittsburgh Pirates outgassed the New York Giants to win 10-7 in the other National league games.

In the American league the Boston Red Sox battered the Detroit Tigers 11-2. The Chicago White Sox crushed the Washington Senators 12-4 for Thornton Lee's 19th victory and the Philadelphia Athletics downed the Cleveland Indians 6-4.

Washington, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Joey Archibald, the little Rhode Island jumping jack, places his world featherweight title (New York and Maryland version) on the block here tonight with Chalky Wright, hard-hitting Los Angeles Negro, as the challenger in a 15-round bout.

If Wright can defeat Joey, and most local observers give him better than an even chance, he'll be accorded "remote control" recognition as champion by the New York boxing fathers.

The District of Columbia and the 40-odd states affiliated with the National Boxing association will continue to rank Ritchie Lemos as the titleholder.

It all adds up to one of those vistas of utter confusion which bob up so frequently along Cauliflower lane, Washington, the site of the Archibald-Wright contest, refused to give the bout championship status, but New York and Maryland did.

Ball Game Takes 29 Innings, Two Days To Finish

Youngstown, Ohio, Sept. 11.—(AP)—It took two days and 29 innings, but Dearborn, Mich., finally defeated Birmingham, Ala., in the national amateur baseball federation tournament. The teams started Tuesday night and went 13 innings before stopping with the score deadlocked 2-2. Another 16 innings were necessary last night before Dearborn finally settled the issue, 7-4.

INDUCTION TAKES DUCK GRID STAR

Sacramento, Calif., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Jake Leicht, the University of Oregon's stellar quarterback prospect, was inducted into the army Wednesday and hopes to play football for Uncle Sam this fall.

Leicht, the 21-year-old Stockton player who starred for Pasadena junior college, passed his physical examination at the Sacramento induction station and was scheduled to leave later either for Fort Ord or Fort Roberts, both in California.

He said he hoped to be stationed at Fort Ord "because I'd like to play a little football."

The 165-pound quarterback said he had attempted to get a three months deferment so he could play for Oregon this fall and at the same time try to get into the air corps, but his draft board called him up for immediate training.

Los Angeles, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Yank Terry of San Diego, with 24 wins and eight losses, topped Pacific Coast league pitching records for games played through Tuesday, latest statistic compilations show. His percentage was .730.

SAN DIEGO KEEPS TOP POSITION BY HAIRLINE MARGIN

To the naked eye it might appear today that San Diego and Seattle are tied for the Coast baseball league lead—the regulation three numeral standings bear out the assumption by grading both teams with an identical .580.

This is strictly an illusion. Actually the San Diegans are about as far ahead as any club can seem to get these days in the unrepresed scramble for the 1941 pennant.

They stand at 5802 in the field of higher calculation, and Seattle at 5796, with Sacramento third at 5792. Thus San Diego's hold on first place is stronger than the Rainiers' claim to second.

Although defeated last night by Oakland, 4-3, the leading Padres deserved to retain the top spot, for Seattle was again routed out of a double-header with San Francisco and no team should win the championship in a hotel lobby.

It was just as tight a squeeze at Hollywood, where Sacramento nipped the Stars, 2-1, on Chet Wicczorek's two-run homer in the fourth inning.

Los Angeles and Portland each put on a handsome pitching demonstration, the Angels winning the first game of a double-header, 8-1, on Pete Malory's seven-hit flinging and the Beavers claiming the shorter nightcap, 7-0, with Byron Speece on the mound for a six-hit turn.

New Substitution Rule Is Defended by Grid Coaches

New York, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Signals off, men! There's nothing wrong with the new unlimited substitution rule in college football that precise stop-watch officiating can't fix.

That's the word today from Walter R. Okeson, chairman of the football rules committee, with a supporting chorus from Fritz Crisler, of Michigan, head of the Football Coaches association, and Lou Little of Columbia, No. 1 man in the coaches rules committee.

The misunderstandings, as Okeson terms them, which arose when substitutions dragged out the Chicago and New York all-star games interminably are due to failure to study the rule, and specifically one of its clauses, with due care.

"Substitutions," says Okeson, "may be made at any time but they can be made without penalty only when time is out . . . when, for instance, the watch is stopped by an incomplete pass, ball going out of bounds, etc., substitutions can be made without penalty. But if the attacking team fails to get the ball in play within 25 seconds after the referee has placed it, that team will be penalized. If the defending team tends to cause delay by sending in a substitute as play is about to be started, it is penalized . . .

"In short, if there are no substitutions, 25 seconds may be consumed in putting the ball in play. And if there are substitutions, not a second more is permitted."

An Associated Press survey of more than a dozen leading coaches throughout the country finds the majority willing to go along.

Jimmy Phelan of Washington says "I voted for it, I'm definitely for it, and if it slows up play, I'll be disappointed."

Bernie Bierman of Minnesota (which may not need any substitutions) also feels the change "is going to be a good one."

Portland, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The Oregon senior golf tournament reached the semi-final stage today with Elmer Stoddard, Oscar Furuset, Rudy Wilhelm and E. E. Wilson still in the running.

Stoddard, the medalist, beat Ralph C. Parker, Portland, 3 and 1; Furuset eliminated Roy Nelson, Portland, 4 and 2; Wilhelm turned in an easy 5 and 3 victory over C. D. Christensen, Portland, and Wilson edged out Joe Henkle, Oswego, 3 and 2.

Stoddard will play Furuset and Wilhelm will meet Wilson this afternoon.
