Billy Hulén Says:

Tornado Returns
And Coach Claims
Line Too Green

Cutting short their Lake o' Woods conditioning camp by one day, Medford high's Black Tornado football squad returned to town yesterday and the first thing Coach Bill Bowerman offered in the way of information was that "we didn't get much done . . . the line is too green and it will be at least two more weeks before the team is organized into anything resembling a good outfit."

With the opening game against Weed, Cal., coming up next Friday night under the local candles, Bowerman plans to send the squad through plenty of practice sessions every afternoon beginning Monday. He hopes the locals will give a good account of themselves in their initial clash.

After nine days of conditioning exercises, interspersed by a small amount of actual battling, the mentor was able to give a tentative starting lineup, representing those players who showed to the best advantage at the camp. It looks like this:

Dan Winter, center; Roger Barker, right guard; Bob Mitchell, left guard; Ray Campbell, right tackle; Bill Wall, left tackle; Bob Young, right end; Curt Hopkins, left end; Bob Stead, quarterback; Ike Orr, right half; Cato Wray, left half; Jimmy Glenn, full-back.

Bowerman qualified the above lineup by explaining that Glenn actually looked like the best right guard, but that he hadn't worked there a great deal. He added that Russell Hawk, a transfer from Ashland, might be shifted from center to a tackle position, and that Bud Mayfield, a transfer from Woodland, Cal., performed nicely at tackle.

Following closely behind this first-look "varsity" were Hawk, Bayliss and Pope, centers; Davis, right guard; Anderson, left guard; Stan Smith and Hawk, right tackle; Reynolds, right end; Hicks, left end; Bob Mitchell and Barker, quarterbacks; Dippel and Young, right halfbacks; Adams and Pete Orr, younger brother of the Orr, left halfbacks, and Cliff Jones and Steve Isaac, full-backs.

Stan Smith, 195-pound tackle who played for junior high here two years ago and for McCleod, Cal., last season, was said by Bowerman to possess all the physical equipment necessary to become a very fine ball player, but that he lacked "the hustle and desire to pull himself out of a rut he probably got in at McCleod, where he was undoubtedly spoiled into believing he didn't have to put out to make any ball team."

Bowerman said, "Smith shows fine possibilities, but if he doesn't change his ways and get in there and hustle and fight he will be more of a detriment to the squad than an asset. For his own sake I hope he starts playing like he can."

Only one bad injury occurred during the nine days at the camp. Art Johnson, a right guard, slipped the semi-lunar cartilage in his left knee and will be forced to take things easy for two more weeks.

Thanks to the grub shoved at the squad by Cook Jack Cumming, most of the lads added from five to 12 pounds to their heft. The squad picked up an average of about six pounds per man, Bowerman estimated.

The local baseball season may not yet be entirely completed; there is some talk of an exhibition game between the Portland Beavers and a local pickup team after the Portlanders finish their Pacific Coast league schedule September 20 . . . all but four of the Crater regulars would be available for the contest, those having returned to their homes in Portland being Bob Churchill, Del Schroer, Frank Roelandt and Dick Kohler.

CAMILLI BLASTS THREE-RUN HOMER TO AID DODGERS

Cards Fall Two Games Behind As White Bested By Fitzsimmons, Mound Duel

St. Louis, Sept. 12.—(P)—A scintillating 20-year-old south-law only a month removed from the Texas league shoulders the burden of St. Louis' dented pennant bid today in the second clash of a vital three-game series with the leading Brooklyn Dodgers.

Howard Pollet, whose coolness belies his youthfulness and brief experience in organized baseball, was Manager Billy Southworth's choice to oppose the veteran flat-bush flogger in the game which may make or break the Red Birds' title aspirations.

Against him gesturing Leo Durocher, boss of the Brooklyn Dodgers, planned to use Curt Davis. Like Durocher, he formerly was with the Cardinals.

The stupendous struggle of the St. Louis Cardinals and Brooklyn Dodgers for the National league pennant keeps piling climax on top of climax.

Yesterday the Dodgers battled to a 6-4 triumph over the Cardinals in 11 innings of baseball as tense and thrilling as any world series session could be and yet their series has two more contests to go and as much remains to be decided as though the season were in its infancy.

33rd For Dolph

The difference between the two teams yesterday was just two men—Dolph Camilli and Dixie Walker of the Dodgers. Camilli clouted his 33rd homer with two on to climax a four-run rally in the fourth inning. Walker singled with the bases loaded in the 11th for the winning runs.

Ernie White, young Cardinal lefthander, allowed only seven hits over the long route. Yet his hurling actually was not as effective as that of fat, 40-year-old Fred Fitzsimmons, who gave up 10 hits before being removed for a pinchhitter in the 11th.

In the other National league action, the New York Giants crushed the Cincinnati Reds, 6-0, with four-hit pitching by Bob Carpenter and a five-run fifth inning. The Pittsburgh Pirates and Boston Braves divided a doubleheader. The Pirates took the opener, 7-5, scoring four runs in the second to make Ken Heintzelman's task easy. In the nightcap Tom Earley pitched a 10-0 shutout for the Braves, with the Pirates making six errors.

Yanks Lose

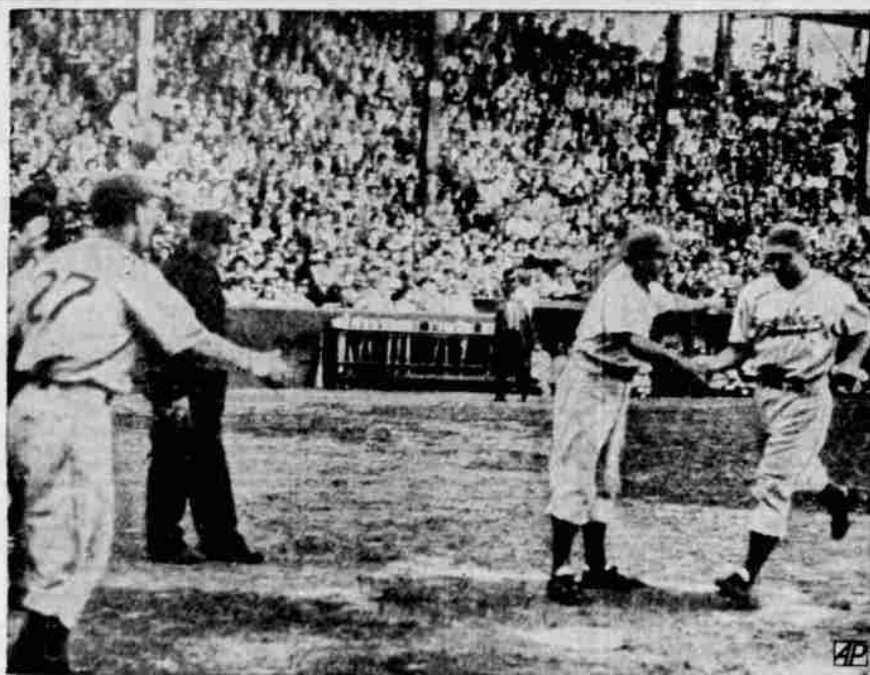
The Detroit Tigers even their season's series with the New York Yankees at 10-all by wringing out a 5-4 decision in 12 innings.

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SEATTLE BACK ON TOP AS SACS AND PADRES DEFEATED

Seattle takes to the tightrope today in the latest version of the coast baseball league's precarious balancing act.

The Rainiers tectored two percentage points above San Diego and three above Sacramento, but there was no assurance they could maintain equilibrium any longer or any better than their two predecessors on the high wire.

Dividing a double bill with San Francisco last night backed the northern club into its present position, for while this performance was in progress, San Diego lost to Oakland for the second time in four games this week and Hollywood similarly evened its series with Sacramento.

San Francisco went 11 innings to a 7-6 decision in the first game, and the Rainiers scored on a last-chance pinch single for their 3-2 victory in the nightcap.

Oakland called on Stan Corbett's four-hit pitching to subdue San Diego, 2-1. Although never behind, Hollywood barely outlasted Sacramento, 3-2.

Portland and Los Angeles were visited by rain. They will play doubleheaders tonight, tomorrow and Sunday, as will Seattle and San Francisco, in an attempt to compensate for previous postponements.

PLENTY CHINOOK AT ROGUE MOUTH

Fishing has been "very, very good," with many limits of Chinook taken at the mouth of Rogue river, according to a report received here today from D. F. DeVoe of DeVoe's auto court at Gold Beach. He said practically all were caught at the jaws and that few were being taken by trolling.

DeVoe reported that a few scattered silversides were in, and that there would be lots of them in two weeks. The river has cleared and fly-fishing upstream for steelhead has been greatly improved the past week.
