

REV. P. K. HAMMOND FORMER ASHLAND MINISTER PASSES

Funeral Saturday In Oregon
City—Well Known In
Fraternal, Church Circles.

The Rev. P. K. Hammond, former vicar of the Episcopal church in Ashland and prominently known in southern Oregon Masonic and Elks circles, died last night in the Good Samaritan hospital at Portland. He had been ill for about a year. He was 84 years old.

The Rev. Mr. Hammond was vicar of the Episcopal church in Ashland from 1915 to 1930. During part of this time he was also non-resident vicar of the church in Grants Pass. He was active in church, community and lodge affairs and became widely known for these activities. He was a past potentate of Hillah temple, A.A.O.N.M.S., Ashland, and a past exalted ruler of Ashland lodge of Elks.

Born In London

Mr. Hammond was born in London, England, Sept. 13, 1857. He came to the United States when he was 19. He had been serving in the Oregon diocese of the Episcopal church since 1899. His first Oregon parish was in Oregon City where he served from 1899 to 1907. He was rector of the Episcopal church in Eugene from 1907 to 1914. He next served in Ashland.

Funeral services will be held in the Episcopal church at Oregon City, where he had his first parish in this state, at 2 p. m. tomorrow. Interment will be in the Oregon City cemetery.

Survivors are three sons, Ward Hammond, Medford, Phillip, Oswego, and William, Oregon City, and a daughter, Mrs. Guy Yung, Grants Pass.

Ward Hammond and his wife left this morning for Oregon City to attend the funeral.

Jack Grant, employee at Cascade Gorge resort, spent Saturday and Sunday with friends in Medford.

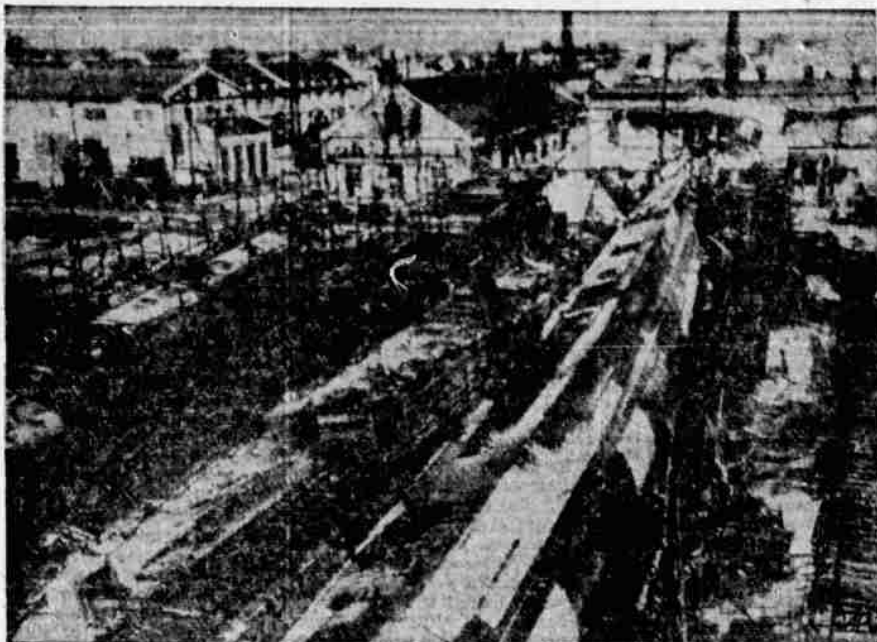

Menus of the Day

Supper for Four
Crab Royal Spiced Apricots
Tomato Succotash
Hot Rolls Strawberry Preserves
Tossed Green Salad
Ripe Olive Dressing
Fresh Fruit
Spice Cake with Boiled Frooting
Coffee
Crab Royal
3 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons flour
2 cups milk
1 cup crabmeat
2/3 cup browned mushrooms.

1/3 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1 hard-cooked egg, sliced
1 teaspoon minced parsley
Melt butter and add flour. Blend and pour in milk. Cook and stir until a creamy sauce forms. Add rest of ingredients. Simmer until hot. Serve plain or poured over mashed potatoes, boiled rice, crackers or buttered toast.

Tomato Succotash

1/2 cup chopped bacon
2 tablespoons chopped onions
2 tablespoons chopped green peppers
1 cup cooked green beans
1 cup corn (cut from cob)
1 1/2 cups tomatoes
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1/4 teaspoon sugar
Cook bacon 2 minutes in frying pan, add onions and peppers and simmer 5 minutes. Pour in remaining ingredients and cook slowly 15 minutes, or until thick.

Boiled Frooting

2 cups granulated sugar
2 teaspoons vinegar
1 cup water
2 egg whites, beaten
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Boil, without stirring, the sugar, vinegar and water. When a fine thread forms when a portion is slowly poured from a spoon, pour slowly into the beaten egg whites. Beat steadily until the frosting is thick and cool. Add the vanilla and quickly spread on the top and sides of the cake.
