

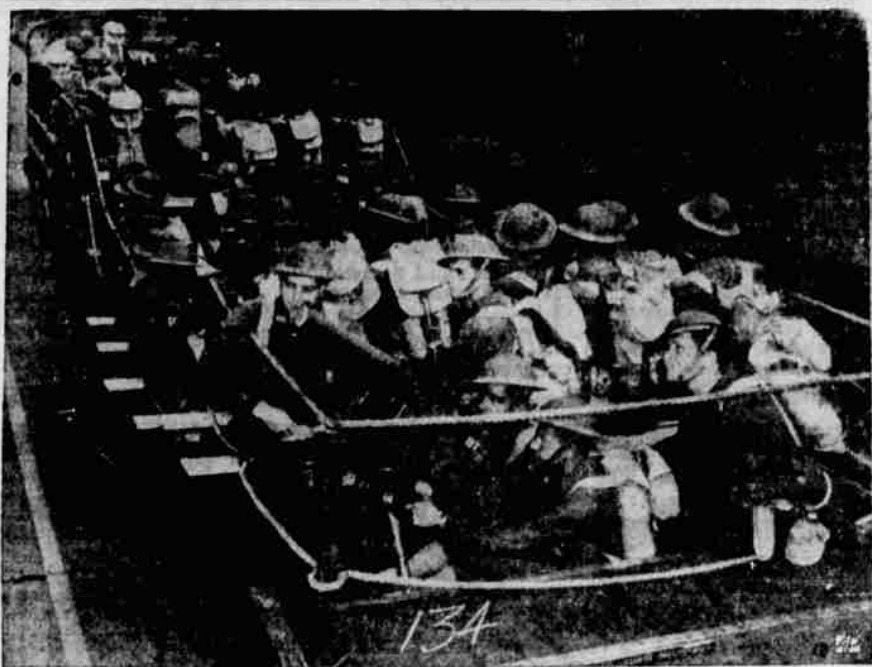
BUILDING OF DAM AT DEBENGER GAP HIGHLY INDEFINITE

County Watermaster Says
Survey Mainly For Pos-
sible Reconstruction Work

Although reclamation bureau engineers are surveying a dam site at Debenger Gap, and drawing necessary plans, "its actual construction is so far in the future, it is highly indefinite," according to Clinton Smith, county watermaster, whose office does the hydrographic work, and is visited daily by the engineers for factual data.

The reclamation bureau crew has drilled 15 test holes about 100 feet deep. Yesterday engineers completed work on a survey of a dam site on the Apple-

gate, and are working on one in the Ashland area.

"Debenger Gap is a fine location for a dam," the watermaster said. "It has straight, steep sides, with firm rock. By pumping the water up a large slice of Table Rock district land could be irrigated."

Construction Plan
"From what I can hear and learn, the reclamation bureau is making the surveys solely for the future. It is the consensus that the plans are being drawn so that during any reconstruction period after the war, they would be ready," Mr. Smith said.

The reclamation engineers have been working for nearly a year in southern Oregon on possible dam sites for flood control. The Debenger Gap survey has

been a source of many lively rumors. The liveliest and most persistent report held the navy was going to build a huge lake for seaplanes to land upon. The latest reports contend work will be rushed on the proposed dam because of the need of power for national defense.

PAIR FOUND WITH CAR STOLEN HERE

A 1938 Ford tudor sedan, stolen early last night from the used car lot of the Witham Magneto and Parts company, 215 East Eighth street, was discovered wrecked in a ditch near Glendale by state police early this morning, and the two occupants were arrested and taken to the county jail in Grants Pass.

The car was damaged considerably and will have to be towed to a garage, police said.

H. C. Witham, owner of the car, was unaware that it had been stolen until state police informed local city police that it had been recovered, and city police in turn contacted Witham.

FIRST AID GROUPS ARE ORGANIZED BY LOCAL RED CROSS

C. C. Haggard, chairman of first aid for the Jackson County American Red Cross chapter, announced organization today of two first aid detachments, to be composed of 15 to 50 men each.
