Toronto, Sept. 13.—(AP) (Canadian Press)—Victory in a seven-year fight by Olivia Dionne to bring her children together under one roof appeared near today when it was reported that the quintuplets would be restored to the parents by an order-in-council of the Ontario cabinet.

It was understood that the authority of the board of guardians, which now governs the affairs of the quints at their nursery home near Callander, Ont., would be relinquished as regards parental control and general living conditions.

The board, however, probably will continue to direct the financial affairs of the five sisters whose joint fortune now totals more than \$1,000,000.
