'BUMS' INCREASE LEAD TO 2 GAMES OVER IDLE CARDS

Reiser's Homer Ignites 5-Run Brook Explosion In 17th—Allen Pitches.

Surely but slowly, agonizing steps at a time the Brooklyn Dodgers are creeping toward the National league championship.

They capitalized yesterday on a chance to add a half-game to their lead over the idle second-place St. Louis Cardinals. But it took the Dodgers 17 innings—and on that basis you can't say that their foes are giving them something for nothing.

The Dodgers are two games out in front today for two reasons—they battle to the final out; and the Cardinals have been beset by one of the worst sieges of injuries that ever befell a major league club.

For 16 innings yesterday's struggle was a scoreless pitching duel between Paul Derringer ace of the Reds, and Johnny Allen, ex-American leaguer who was supplanted in the 16th by chubby Hugh Casey.

Reds Rebuffed
For nine innings Allen held the Reds to one scratch single. The Dodgers put men on bases in seven of the nine frames without scoring. They kept right on challenging and in the 17th, when darkness was enveloping the contest, they finally managed to turn the affair inside out and win, 5-1.

Pete Reiser started it with his 13th homer. Then came singles by Dolph Camilli and Lew Riggs, a couple of errors, a single by Mickey Owen good for two tallies and a wild pitch, all of which meant five runs and the ball game.

Syndicate Ready To Offer \$500,000 For Futile Phils

Philadelphia, Sept. 16.—(P)—John B. Kelly, national director of physical training, heads a syndicate that is ready to offer \$500,000 for the National league baseball Phillies.

"A syndicate with which I am associated is anxious to give Philadelphia a winning baseball team in the National league," Kelly disclosed. "We expect to make an offer within the next few days and hope we can acquire the controlling block of stock."

Kelly, champion Olympic sculler back in the early 1920's and former Democratic chairman of Philadelphia said big Jim Peterson, who pitched for the Athletics 10 years ago, probably would handle negotiations with Gerry Nugent, president of the tail-end Phils.

However, Peterson, now in the advertising business, and Nugent both professed ignorance.

"I haven't seen Kelly in months," Nugent said. "In spite of this talk no one has made me an offer. If a man really intends to buy something it is not likely he will tell the newspapers first. It seems silly to me."

Nugent and Mrs. Nugent, vice president of the club, own a majority of the club's 5,000 shares. "I will be happy to handle the negotiations if Mr. Kelly asks me to," Peterson declared. "But I know only what I read in the papers."

Martin Is Confident Sacs Can Still Cop Crown Final Week

Manager Pepper Martin hoped today for a let-up in the tough luck he says has haunted his Sacramento ball club, as the Solons went into their final Coast league series two full games behind Seattle.

The Solons play host to the rejuvenated Oakland team that has proven to be the "spoiler" of the circuit.

Seattle, two games in the lead, will play Los Angeles in its final series.

The third team in the hot scrap for the pennant, San Diego, meets rough opposition in Hollywood, fighting to hold its place in the first division against a strong bid by Oakland.

Portland and San Francisco, a couple of second-division teams, battle in the other series of the Coast league's final week.

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"WE GIVE YOU A BRAKE"
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SOOSE GETS DRAW WHEN REF HALTS FIGHT IN EIGHTH

Wild Brawl Ends After Garcia Allegedly Cuts Champs Eye By Butting.

Los Angeles, Sept. 12.—(P)—Middleweight Champion Billy Soose prepared to head east today, his crown slightly on the tarnished side after one of the most vicious fights with the most unsatisfactory endings witnessed in Los Angeles in years.

Handsome Billy's 12-round non-title fight with veteran Ceferino Garcia was stopped mid-way in the eighth round and called a draw because Soose's left eye was badly cut.

From then on it was intense. A near riot almost ensued, Referee Abe Roth was almost mobbed as he left the ring, and today the state athletic commission promised further action after dissenting with the referee's decision.

Crowd Angry
Roth apparently issued statements by the minute from the shelter of a dressing room as the crowd of 5,000 milled angrily around the ball park.

Roth said Garcia butted Soose in the seventh round, slitting the eyelid, and then hammered it wider open in the eighth. Soose, questioned, said he was butted in the sixth, though no blood appeared and the commissioners, sitting at ringside, said they saw no butt in any round.

Soose, under Roth's round count, captured the first five rounds with a brilliant exhibition of boxing skill. Garcia, a veteran of nearly 20 years in the ring, launched a savage attack and swept the next two rounds and was meting out heavy punishment in the eighth at the finish.

ARMY, NAVY PLAN FOR CENSORSHIP BARED IN HOUSE

Would Control Information Which Might Hurt Fleet—Would Not Censor Press

Washington, Sept. 16.—(P)—The house learned from the navy department today that joint army-navy plans had been worked out for censorship of international communications, but that no provisions for compulsory censorship of the press were involved.

Rep. Jacobsen (D-Iowa) submitted a letter from James Forrestal, acting secretary of the navy, explaining the situation.

Forrestal said the proposed censorship would be limited to "the control of communications passing between the United States and foreign countries of overseas possessions and between ships and shore."

He added that the plan would have to be approved by "higher authority" and be supported by necessary legislation.

"The control of information the disclosure of which would be inimical to the operations of the fleet is but one of the many problems which is under constant study by the navy department," Forrestal wrote.

"It may be stated without injury to the public interest that such plans contain no provisions for compulsory censorship of the press but are limited to the control of communications passing between the United States and foreign countries for overseas possessions and between ships and shore."
