CCC MILK UKASE WITHDRAWN UNTIL HEARING IS HELD

Oregon Control Board Advises Snider's of Cancellation Higher Price Order.

John W. Snider, vice president of Snider's Dairy and Produce company, announced today receipt of a letter from the Oregon Milk Control board advising of the withdrawal of a regulation establishing a minimum price for the distribution of milk and cream to CCC camps, until such a time as a hearing on the matter can be held in this marketing area.

The regulation, made by the Milk Control Board on June 12, 1940, required that milk dealers add 3½ cents a quart to the regular nine-cents-a-quart wholesale price, on milk delivered to CCC camps. It was for alleged violation of this regulation that Snider's Dairy and Produce company was cited to appear at a public hearing here last August 8 to show cause why

its license shouldn't be revoked.

Validity Challenged

The hearing brought forth much verbal fireworks between the attorney for the Milk Control Board and Charles W. Reames, representing the dairy, with Attorney Reames claiming the hearing was not valid on the grounds that the dairy had not been provided with a complaint upon which the citation was made, and because no public hearing had been held on the matter, as required by law.

The letter from the Milk Control Board, signed by J. H. Mapes, administrator, stated that "we have just been advised by the attorney general for the state of Oregon that while it is entirely proper for the board to make such a regulation, in order for the regulation to be legal a public hearing must be held on the subject in each market area before its promulgation."

Victory Claimed

The letter went on to state that "the regulation is being withdrawn until such time as the board can hold a hearing in your market on the subject. This means that until the time such hearing can be held you can, if you desire, sell milk and cream at minimum wholesale and retail prices in your licensed sales area without adding freight to outlying districts." The withdrawal of the regulation until a public hearing can be held represents a clear-cut victory for Snider's Dairy and

Produce company in its battle with the Milk Control Board over the price to be charged at CCC camps and outlying districts, Mr. Snider declared.
