TOP RODEO STARS TO COMPETE HERE SATURDAY, SUNDAY

Pendleton Talent Coming For Medford Show—40 Head Buckers Also Slated

Forty head of top bucking horses, 25 Brahma bulls and 50 head of Mexican steers and roping cattle, along with a glittering array of some of the finest cowboy performers in the country, will be seen in action at the second annual Medford rodeo at the fairgrounds park next Saturday and Sunday afternoons. It was disclosed today by Max Barbour of Klamath Falls, who is staging the show for the Medford Athletic association.

Barbour, who arrived here this morning from the Pendleton roundup, where most of his stock participated, said that some of the best cowboys in the business would be on hand to compete for approximately \$1600 in cash prizes, \$800 to be awarded at each performance.

Rodeo Stars Coming
Among the well-known rodeo artists slated to appear here are Jerry Ambler of Calgary, Canada, who won second prize in the world's bucking bronco riding contests at Pendleton and who is the Canadian champion; Gregory Lougher of Sonoma, Calif., who placed in the northwest bronco riding events at Pendleton; and Carl Dossey of Phoenix, Ariz., 1940 world's champion bareback rider.

Other cowboys planning to compete in the local rodeo, according to Barbour, are Pat McNulty and Jack Sherman, both of Calgary; Pat Fisk of Pendleton; Cleve Kelly of Amarillo, Tex.; Bill McFarlane of Bakersfield, Calif.; George House of Huron, S. D.; Lem Perkins of Yuma, Ariz., and Nick Knight of Blackwood, Idaho.

Lockeed, Vega Co. Plane Builders Get \$25,000,000 Boost

Burbank, Calif., Sept. 16.—(AP)—Under a new union contract, the 44,000 employees of Lockheed Aircraft corporation and its affiliate, Vega Airplane company, are to receive a 10-cent-an-hour blanket increase, retroactive to July 1.

Company officials said the contract would give the workers \$25,000,000 in increased wages during the coming year. A \$5,000,000 portion of that sum will be distributed as soon as machinery can be set up to disburse it, the officials added.

The AFL International Association of Machinists ratified the contract calling for a 60-cent-an-hour minimum for beginners, increasing at the rate of 5 cents an hour to a 75-cent minimum, and bonuses for night work in addition to the 10-cent increase for everyone on the payroll July 1.
