

DEFENSE STAMPS WILL BE ON SALE AT PLANTS HERE

Medford Industrial Concerns Back Effort To Interest Public In Savings Plan.

Medford's industrial plants were lined up solidly today in the campaign to encourage the sale of United States defense savings bonds and stamps.

At a meeting of industrial representatives at the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce yesterday afternoon, plans were formulated to place the defense savings stamps on sale at the plants and some of the companies volunteered to pay employee bonuses this year at least partially in bonds and stamps.

Stores Have Them
Frank Hull, city chairman who presided at yesterday's meeting, said today that his subcommittee was continuing to contact stores to arrange for the sale of defense stamps in order to have as many convenient outlets as possible. He asserted that soon the defense stamps will be available at all the principal stores of the city.

Meantime, Mr. Hull pointed out, the campaign could be accelerated if merchants who have not yet been approached would telephone the chamber of commerce and thus arrange to put the defense stamps on sale at their places of business immediately.

BUILDINGS, FENCE BURN ON RANCH

Fire yesterday afternoon destroyed a chicken house, smokehouse, yard fence and 400 feet of rail fence on the ranch of George Hoffman on Thompson creek in the Applegate district, Rogue River national forest headquarters reported today.

Three forest fire guards put the blaze out and kept it from spreading to the residence and other buildings. Mr. Hoffman was quoted as saying he had smoked his pipe while he worked in the chicken house and he thought he must have dropped some tobacco sparks. The damage was estimated at about \$100.

PEACE NOW REIGNS AT BUTTE FALLS

Comparative quiet now reigns at Butte Falls, where a few weeks back nights were made hectic by promiscuous firearm shooting and auto horn tooting, plus wild driving by youths of the community. Deputy Sheriff William Grenbemer said today he paid a visit to the community last Saturday night, and "it was almost as peaceful as a cemetery."

The deputy sheriff said this was due to many of the boys involved in the past hubbub going away.

Deputy Grenbemer investigated the situation a month ago, when residents complained they were heckled by the youths, and their springs polluted. A number of mail-boxes were shot-up, contrary to federal law.

A number of those involved conferred with the sheriff and district attorney on the error of their ways, and turned over a new leaf, these officials report.

CLARENCE BLEIL DIES IN MODESTO

Word was received here today of the death of Clarence Jay Bleil, 61, of Modesto, Cal., in the Veterans hospital, Livermore, Cal., last Wednesday. Funeral services were held last Saturday with the Rev. W. R. Baird, pastor of the First Christian church, officiating. Interment was in the Golden Gate national cemetery, San Bruno, Cal.

Mr. Bleil's widow, Lillian Bleil, is a daughter of Mrs. James Owens of Medford Route 3, Box 90, and the late James Owens. Mr. Bleil was known by many in the Rogue river valley.

Mr. Bleil was a research engineer of the Tennessee valley power project until his health failed. A graduate of the Colorado School of Mines and of Columbia university, he devoted his life to research and held a number of patents on his discoveries and inventions. He was a veteran of the Spanish-American war.

She spent her early life in Ada, Ohio, and was united in marriage to the late William W. Eifert at Kenton, Ohio, in 1880. They lived in Ada until 1904, when they came directly to Medford.

She was a long time member of the Presbyterian church and of Reames chapter No. 66 O.E.S., and was a devoted mother and a fine Christian woman.

She is survived by five daughters, Mrs. Cleone Buchter, Mrs. W. J. Burbridge, and Mrs. E. N. Eldridge, all of Medford. Mrs. M. E. Schoonover of Portland, Ore., Mrs. Marie Swinson of Napa, Cal., one son, J. O. Eifert of Roseburg, Ore., one sister, Mrs. Inis Winkler of Janera, Ohio; also five grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Perl funeral home Thursday at 3:15 p. m. Rev. Sherman L. Divine, pastor of the First Presbyterian church officiating. Interment will take place in the family plot in the Medford I.O.O.F. cemetery.

MASUZO 'MARU', UNIVERSITY CLUB MANAGER, PASSES

Masuzo Maruyama, 63, known to his friends as "Maru," passed away at the family residence, 539 South Ivy street this morning at 8:30, after six months' illness. "Maru" was born in Japan, on March 15, 1878.

Maru came to the United States in 1909, and was employed at Seattle, Wash., for about two years before he came to Medford where he has lived continuously ever since, serving during most of that period as steward and manager of the Rogue Valley University club. He had scores of friends in

southern Oregon, was a man of fine character and genial personality, and liked by everyone who knew him.

Although barred to U. S. citizenship, there was no more loyal citizen or devoted Medford booster than Maru, who was always ready to do his part when any civic service was called for.

Masuzo Maruyama is survived by his wife, Sadako Maruyama, one daughter, Teruko, and three sons, Kazuo, Yoshio and Saburo, all at home in this city. He also leaves two brothers in Japan.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Perl funeral home Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. R. W. Coleman, pastor of the First Christian church, officiating.

Interment will take place in the Medford I.O.O.F. cemetery.

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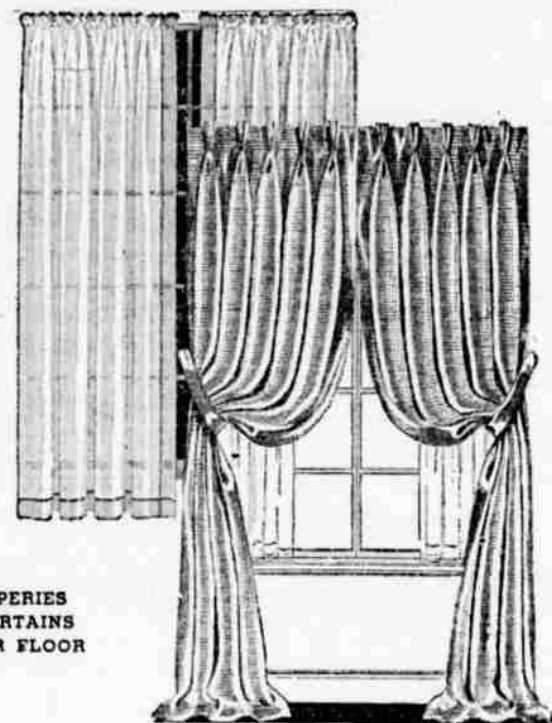
